THE LENGTHENING DAYS

"As the days lengthen so the cold will strengthen, " so my Suffolk grandmother affirmed in certain tones some 60 years ago. It didn't concern me much at the time but over the years I have realised the truth of the saying. This year is an outstanding example of a warm October followed by a cold February. In recent years we have become accustomed to relatively mild winters following wet autumns but for most of my recollection real winter weather hasn't started until after the turn of the year. Do you recall the winter 1946-47? Up to the end of December the weather had been relatively mild but in mid-January the country was swept by seemingly endless snowstorms. That snow cover lasted until mid-March; roads were blocked, power cut, factories closed, livestock lost. When the thaw came, so did gales with heavy rain and floods.

Fortunately, the later the snow comes, the shorter its life will be. From the beginning of January the sun rises each day a little nearer due East and sets a little nearer due West, with the result that in February we gain $1\frac{3}{4}$ hours and in March a further 2 hours day-light. At the same time the sun is moving higher in the sky, increasing its power fractionally each day. Glasshouse owners may find to their cost that a cloudless March day can scorch their plants as effectively as August.

It is ironic that the lengthening days often coincide with the lowest temperatures of the winter. Plant life is influenced as much by light as by warmth and moisture. At the time when increasing light stimulates activity, soil temperatures can be very low indeed. Both farmers and gardeners face the

annual dilemma of whether to sow by the calendar or be governed by conditions. will be guided by the accumulated experience of generations who have cultivated the soil before them. In just four years in Sibford I have learned that I can waste a lot of energy and seeds if I sow by the book instead of using my judgement. A scientist friend who is principal of a large seed raising company is quite clear that for successful crops we must sow when the ground is right, that means good, friable soil and ground temperature not less than 42°F. day and night. Many seeds, of course, need higher temperatures than this and can be helped along by sowing in pans or trays in greenhouse, cold frame or even on windowsills. In this way we can make the best of increasing light.

New moon is on March 9th. Good sowing and growing.

It is hoped to mount a small exhibition towards the end of the month, open to all the village. A rare chance to see the school as it was — and as it is. If you can lend or give anything, or have a tale to tell, please contact Mr. Mansfield at the school as soon as possible.
