THE GARDEN IN SEPTEMBER

Back to work and, we hope, to more reasonable weather so that we can enjoy the remaining flowers of late summer. While we are doing that there are many seasonable jobs to keep our hands employed. Raspberries, unless you are fortunate enough to have the variety Autumn, need to have this year's fruiting wood removed, leaving four or five stems of new growth on each stool, tied firmly to your wires or stakes for protection against the gales to come. Loganperries, and presently blackberries, should be treated in the same way. If you have not slready done so, prune blackcurrants by removing surplus older wood, leaving a well-shaped bush open in the centre. Most climbing roses are ready to have the old wood cut out and next year's flowering wood trained where you want it.

The beginning of the month is the last chance to sow onions and lettuce to stard over winter; Solidity makes a good hard onion to harvest next June. Lettuce: Winter Density for outdoors and Premier, Valdor and Windermere for growing in frames.

Early flowering daffodils and hyscinths are on the market (quite literally in Barbury on Thursdays and Saturdays), and planted now will have a good start in life and will reward you in the winter. The more expensive ones (treated) for Christmas flowering will be available in October. These are for forcing. Plant five at a time in a mixture 2 parts peat, 2 of leaf mould, 1 loam in 6" or 7" half pots: plunge in 8"-10" depth of moist peat in an odd corner of the garden and bring out on 1st December, gradually accustoming them to warmth and light in the house. Or may be you have found a better way to grow them!
