THE GARDEN IN OCTOBER

October, the first month of Autumn, time to tidy up: burn the perennial weeds such as dandelions and docks, compost the annual weeds. It is best to have a permanent site for the bonfire, preferably near the compost heap. Small bonfires all over the garden only succeed in sterilising patches of ground.

Take down runner beans, store the rods, compost the haulm and leave the roots in the ground until Spring to conserve nitrogen. Lift beetroot, carrots, swedes and store in a shed in dry peat. Watch then during the next few months, nice are very fond of beet. I lost a lot last year.

Bring in cyclamen that have summered outside, top dress or re-pot, feed and keep in unheated greenhouse or cool room. Cut back growth on Pelargoniums to shape up and take cuttings for new plants next year. Sweet pea growers won't need to be reminded to sow now two or three seeds in a 3" pot and grow on in frames or cold greenhouse during winter.
