Visitors to the churchyard may have noticed a new headstone. It replaces the overgrown patch marked only by a rusty hurricane lamp on a stake. In 2003, a traveller called John had been living in a tin shed below the Elm Crossroads in the Ferris. After spending a bitter winter in this makeshift home, and through the generosity of passers-by who would take food or some warm clothing, John had become a well-known local figure, and people would often stop at his shack for a chat.

Sadly, one morning in April, he was found to have succumbed to the privations of living in a tiny tin shed with no door, and he had died during the night. Those who had supported him raised the money to pay for his burial in the churchyard, and I carved a wooden headstone to mark the final resting place of 'John - a gentleman of the road.'



The following ten years took their toll on the hastily sourced and unseasoned oak of the headstone, and so this year I carved a new one out of a lovely old piece of re-cycled teak, and installed it at the beginning of November.

John came to us with nothing, and I am pleased that, through the kindness of strangers, he has found his place in God's Acre.

Pam also reported seeing a Red Admiral butterfly in the sunny weather on 1st November.

The charity Butterfly Conservation has published the results of the 2018 Big Butterfly count. Given the hot sunny weather and increased participation in this annual event it was disappointing that numbers of several of the more colourful common butterflies were lower than in previous years. Small Tortoiseshell, Comma and Red Admiral were all down significantly. The was better news for the Holly and Common Blues.

Sue and Chris Beach managed to get a good photo of one of the Red Kites that seem to be appearing more frequently in the skies above Sibford on sunny days. I always find it difficult to get photos of birds in flight.


Tawny Owls seem to have been particularly vocal during October and early November. This is the time of year when the young are dispersing and the adults are establishing their territories.

I have noticed more Magpies and the occasional Jay around the Sibford school grounds this year.

This year seems to have been exceptionally good for hedgerow fruits including blackberries, sloes, rose hips, haws and apples. This should be of benefit to the many species of animal that rely on this source of food.

this is a reminder for all of you living in the Gower that the next meeting of the community's council comes up on Monday 10th December. It will be held as before in the village Primary School, and is at the new time of 7.30 pm.

We have had a great start to the second half of the Autumn Term here at Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School.

The public turn-out, the atmosphere and refreshments were excellent, and the fireworks were just wonderful!

On the Monday following this display, our Year 5 and 6 pupils headed off to Condover Hall in Shropshire for a five day residential with our wonderful staff members, Mr. Stotesbury, Mrs Humphrey and Mrs Williams. They had an amazing time, taking part in a range of adventure activities including abseiling, buggy building, climbing wall, rocket launch, rope walk and initiative exercises, a sensory trail, laser quest, grid stones, tunneling and circus skills, a nocturnal safari, archery, aerial challenge, initiative exercises and then some more abseiling. The weather held up for them, despite some appalling weather back here in Sibford Gower, and the children finished their final day with a camp fire under the stars.

Our children love having the opportunity to work together on projects in mixed age groups, especially if these projects have an art & design, cultural or science focus. While our Year 5 & 6 children were away on their residential trip, back in school we implemented a week long, cross-curricular, cross-phase mini-topic, with a focus on R.E, the arts, literacy & 'topic' maths. Friends in Flanders

Sibford School marked the 100th anniversary of the Armistice by welcoming Linda Palfreeman, author of the book 'Friends in Flanders'.

Linda spoke about the work undertaken by the Friends Ambulance Unit (FAU) during the First World War.

"Most Quakers were of the opinion that any war was directly opposed to their beliefs and to the 'law of love'," she explained. "However many of the younger men in particular were anxious to carry out work in the war zones. They wanted to share the dangers and the deprivations being suffered by their countrymen who were risking their lives at the front and they believed that one way to do this was by creating an ambulance unit."

Linda outlined some of



the work undertaken by the FAU, particularly in Ypres where the men worked tirelessly to try to alleviate the suffering of the townsfolk and where they faced the added challenge of a typhoid epidemic.

Their actions were greatly appreciated by the people of Ypres as a letter subsequently published in the Quaker magazine 'The Friend' reveals: 'Neither ourselves nor our poor will ever forget your generosity towards us,' it reads. 'We shall always keep a very happy memory of the English Ambulance ... its only object had been to spread benefits around us and to distribute true comfort during these mournful days.'

Anna Jo Mathers, Assistant Head, Learning and Teaching, at Sibford School said: "It was a real pleasure to welcome Linda, her talk was inspirational."

On 25th October Victoria Huxley, authoress of 'Jane Austen and Adlestrop – her other Family' gave us a fascinating exploration into Jane Austen's connection with her village. Jane visited Adlestrop on several occasions when she stayed with her uncle, the Rector, at The Parsonage and called on her wealthy relatives, the Leigh Family, who owned Adlestrop Park .Victoria's thorough research into Jane's life and the influence of her 'other family' on her work led to a book full of information, anecdotes and at times moving insights into the fortunes of a young woman during the Regency period. The book can be borrowed from our Archive Room.

Victoria says that when we next walk through Adlestrop she will meet us and show us 'The Plunge Pool' at Adlestrop Park!

On 15th November Liz Woolley introduced her award —winning film 'The 66 men of Grandpont,1914 -1918', an excellent community project which with painstaking research uncovered the lives of the 66 young men whose names are on the war memorial in Liz's local church ,St Matthew's, South Oxford .Their descendants pay tribute to them and the film investigates who these young men were and how they lived, up until their lives were cut short so tragically. Margaret Drabble, who lives in the same street as Liz, summed up the film beautifully by saying that it was more moving than some of the great memorials. Today was probably the last chance we'd get to explore Vladivostok as we've had word that we should be starting the process of getting the bike out of customs tomorrow. If all goes to plan we should get it out on Friday and the we'll spend the weekend working on the bike before heading west on Monday. .

With it being such surprisingly glorious weather we thought why not take the Funicular up to the observation deck. What a cracking spot it is too. It gave us the chance to look out over the whole of Vladivostok and it was quite the view. It's only our third day in Vladivostok so we're still trying to work it out but it's a pretty cool place!



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HORTI SOCIETY

On Wednesday 14th November we had Howard Drury, horticultural broadcaster, speaker and writer, to talk to us about plants that give colour from winter to spring. Howard's delivery was somewhat idiosyncratic. He embraced technology with enthusiasm and gave us, at times, more of a son et lumiere than a talk with illustrative slides. The slight whiff of misogyny was not meant to be taken too seriously, and what was undeniable was his mastery of his craft. Howard understands plants and what they like best. Some of his tips

Plant panolas (a cross between a pansy and a viola) rather than pansies as they will flower at lower temperatures.

Protect greenhouse plants by covering them with fleece rather than bubble wrapping the greenhouse.

Spray the pole of your bird feeder with WD40 to deter squirrels and if you feel particularly vengeful, a 'tilt and spin' contraption will have them spinning off at a pleasing trajectory. Feed birds with sunflower kernels NOT peanuts Plant winter irises deeper than the RHS advice

Don't cut grass back until February or March

Mulch hellebores with leaf mould and don't cut the leaves back too early as the plants depend on the leaves for food.

The evening ended on a high note with Val Law's excellent mulled wine. This is the last talk of the year and the next speaker will be on March 13th 2019 when the inestimable Tom Duncan will be talking to us on 'plant selection, successes and failures'

In Your Garden - December/January

- 1. It is a good idea to insulate the garden tap before it freezes up. Disconnect the hose and put it away in the shed.
- 2. Have a look at the borders and see where there are gaps you could fill with some new flowering shrubs, as now is the best time to buy them. Daphnes, mahonia great in shade and Lonicera winter beauty are all treasures to please you in the dark months.
- 3. You can now prune apple and pear trees, except for those grown spread out against a wall.
- 4. I have a little group of Iris unguicularis, tucked under a south wall, in well drained soil. They start flowering in December and January. You can pick a few stems and they open in the house, with a lovely primrose scent.
- 5. You can sow Sweet Peas now, and have them flowering early. Plant them in long pots, or loo-roll centres, and keep them in a cold frame, or greenhouse. Mice are particularly fond of them, so set a mousetrap near. I find they can't resist chocolate, so rather than cheese, I set the trap with that. Hard to resist though when you are working in the greenhouse with a mug of coffee, and feeling peckish.
- 6. Where you have pulled out all your veggies, you can warm yourself up with digging the soil over, and adding some manure.
- 7. If your roses have had black spot, try to rake off all the leaves from underneath them, to prevent it coming back next year. And spray them against black spot early in the growing season.
- 8. If we get snow, carefully shake it off the branches of shrubs particularly camellias which have flowering buds on already. The branches can easily snap under the added weight.
- 9. Cheer up your patio and front door steps with pots of violas, and cyclamen, with bulbs planted beneath them to come through later. When your hyacinths start to flower do not put them in too warm a room, but keep them in a cool, light windowsill, otherwise the flowers and leaves grow too tall, and go over too guickly.
- 10. Now is the time to sit down by the fire, look at all the seed catalogues, and dream of what you might plant for next year. Think of white foxgloves, tall nicotiana, chocolate cosmos.... asparagus...strawberries....woops I'm feeling peckish again. Have a lovely Christmas, and Happy New Year.

Message from Thames Valley Neighbourhood Watch Association.

On most new credit/debit cards you will see a wireless symbol which informs you that your card uses Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) technology. This allows you to simply tap your card on card readers to make payments of upto \$30 on each occasion.

It will come as no surprise however, that with minimal effort, villains can create an RFID reader with which to steal your details and dosh. They can also download an app onto their smartphones to achieve the same result. They only need to brush past your pocket or bag with their device to do this. You may not even notice this happening.

The Card Defender is a sleeve card holder which provides RFID blocking technology and protects contactless cards from being read. Police recommend that anyone carrying contactless cards should have one or more of these Defenders.

Gifts at Christmas

urrently, all troops serving in overseas conflicts are sent a Christmas parcel of small luxury items to recognise that they are serving abroad and away from their families at Christmas time.

This tradition started in 1914 when all those serving in the First World War were sent a small tin containing a few items including chocolate and cigarettes to help raise morale at a difficult time. Many had expected the War to be 'Over by Christmas' but this turned out not to be the case.

The Overseas Club was formed in 1914 to encourage children to raise small amounts of money to provide funds to buy these small items. Those who raised larger amounts received a certificate from the Overseas Club in recognition of their efforts.

The people of York led by the Lord Mayor sent a Commemorative Tin to all the men who were serving abroad and who came from York. Each tin contained a solid block of Rowntree's chocolate wrapped in paper. It was a pressed steel tin with a hinged lid, printed with a design incorporating the flags of the Allied nations and an inscription, which read:



The Lord Mayor of York, John Bowes Morrell and the Sheriff, Oscar F. Rowntree, send best wishes for a Happy Christmas and a bright New Year to all York men who are serving their King and Country. Christmas 1914.

A nationwide appeal for donations was organised by King George V's daughter Princess Mary. The items including chocolate, cigarettes and a picture of Princess Mary were packed into five-inch long tins which were paid for by the Sailors and Soldiers Christmas Fund. It is thought that more than 355,000 were sent to troops serving on the Front Line in 1914, although due to the pressures put on the postal service some soldiers did not get theirs until 1916.


