NATURE NOTES

The local Tawny Owls have continued to be very vocal throughout the winter months. They are a crepuscular species being active at dusk and dawn.

On New Year's Day John and Becky Skinner observed what they thought at first was a plastic bag but on closer inspection turned out to be an egret on the farmland between Epwell and Shutford.

If you are feeding garden birds on a bird table it is important to give the table a thorough clean occasionally. It is thought that Greenfinches in particular have suffered as a result of disease spread when they visit bird tables. If possible it is also worth moving bird feeders around to give the ground underneath a chance to recover.

I read recently that under wildlife legislation nest boxes should only be cleaned out between September 1st and January 31st.

On a walk around Lamb's Pool just after Christmas we caught a glimpse of a Kingfisher flying from the bushes on the bank across to the island.

A dead fox on the Hook Norton road attracted a number of scavengers including four Magpies, a Buzzard and a Red Kite on one occasion.

Unusually, I recorded Diamond-back moths in both December and January. They usually occur in the summer months. The caterpillars of these small moths can be a serious pest of brassica crops. They are a species that migrate from mainland Europe, sometimes in enormous numbers. In 1891 they caused massive crop losses and much more recently, in June 2016, it is estimated that millions entered Britain along the Norfolk coast.

Any contributions for the next Nature notes would be most welcome. It would be really good to have something from the children in the area – perhaps the first sighting of a butterfly in the Sibfords this year?

We have had a very positive start to the Spring Term here at Sibford Gower Endowed Primary. The children have come back after the Christmas break, full of energy and ready to learn.

The younger children are exploring topic themes based on nursery rhymes and traditional tales with their classrooms have been set up for role-play and small world play to support this. The book corners look amazing!

The older children are exploring the theme of the Mayans. To support and enrich their learning linked to this topic, they will be making a trip to Cadbury World in Birmingham where they will learn about Mayan Myths and Legends, as well as finding out about the Mayan peoples' involvement in the early history of cocoa in c. AD 900.

Pupils in Year 6 have travelled to Oxford to take part in a Junior Citizen workshop during which they experienced eight different safety scenarios and had the opportunity to practice making a 999 telephone call. During the sessions, the children are taught a variety of life skills which focus upon how to keep themselves safe whilst potentially helping others who may be in difficulty or distress, and they are encouraged to make decisions which they may face during a real life emergency.

We have also welcomed visitors from Oxford-based charity 'One-Eighty' who have run a training workshop with Years 5 & 6, which these children will in turn run with our Year 3 and 4 pupils. The project is called 'Make Me Smile' and is an awareness raising group intervention specially designed for primary school children to teach them about mental health through storytelling, creative play, group work and resilience skills.

There has been lots of fun after school as well, with a new Dance Club and a Karate Club which the children say are brilliant. Spanish Club are writing their own songs, all in Spanish, which they are then going to record to make a CD. They have already performed a play to parents, again, all in Spanish.

The PTA January Disco was brilliant; organised by our amazing PTA with the services of our very own DJ, Tony Cran. It was loud and flashy – everything that a great disco should be – with some brilliant dancing and very glamorous outfits! Thank you PTA for all that you do for our wonderful village school.




SO - WE THINK IT'S COLD HERE!



In Your Garden - February

1.Forced hyacinths and narcissi that were wonderful in the house at Christmas, can be left outside in a sheltered place now, to finish dying down. Store them in a dry place, and replant in the garden next autumn.

2. Cut off old leaves on your hellebores, to prevent leaf spot spreading, and to let the blooms show through.

3. Wisteria should be cut back now to two buds - please take care up the ladder, and get a patient person to stand at the bottom and hold it. And summer flowering clematis can now be cut down to about 6 inches from the ground.

4. Now is the time to prune evergreen hedges, before the birds start nesting - privet, yew and laurel.

 Clean out leaves, twigs and moss that are blocking the greenhouse gutters. Check that dahlias stored in a dry frostproof place, are still healthy. Chuck our any getting soggy, and don't start planting them until March.
Deciduous grasses, pennisetum, deschampsia etc, are looking a bit tired

and tatty now, (me too), so it is time for a hair cut.

7. I frequently find I have planted things in the wrong place, so last September I went round and labelled everything that needed moving, such as further to the front of the border, or further back into the shade. So that is keeping me busy when the ground isn't frozen, or frost forecast.

8. Divide clumps of snowdrops when they have finished flowering.

9. You can start chitting new potatoes now, and you can also start planting some vegetable seeds inside the greenhouse, including broad beans, Brussel sprouts, leeks and kale.

10. Force your rhubarb now, under an upturned pot. Put a few slug pellets around them, where the birds won't spot them., and it won't be long before you have delicate, pink, yummy rhubarb for pudding. Jupe Hitching

1. Fake tv licensing emails.

Action Fraud has received in excess of 5,000 reports about fake emails and texts purporting to be from TV licensing. The messages have links to genuine looking websites which are designed for the same old purpose - thieving your dosh and personal details. It's a scam. Do not engage in any way.

2. Courier Fraud.

We've had this one before.

Crooks make contact by telephone purporting to be police officers or bank clerks. They have some basic details such as name and address. They give a telephone number for the victim to call and check that they are genuine. Of course this is not genuine but goes straight back to the fraudster pretending to be a different person. They then offer a number of reasons for wanting your details, such as: money has been removed from your bank account and local staff are suspected, or a suspect has been arrested and police need access to your account for evidence, and local businesses such as jewellers or currency exchange shops are operating fraudulently and help is required to secure evidence. At a weak moment this may be v. plausible - but just another scam.


