Sibford Players raised the bar again this year, with a lively entertaining production which proved the perfect showcase for a wide range of talents. The variety show format, mixing up sketches, songs, dances and comedy routines made for a lively fast-moving evening full of surprises.

Jo Connor's brave and brilliant performance of Victoria Wood's classic keepfit comedy routine featuring unlikely step queen Hayley Bailey, raised the energy levels early on and the string of sketches which followed kept us on our toes.

Amidst the comedy there were some quirky, even poignant moments, as in the sketch where two ladies sit chatting on the pier and one admits to 'tipping her husband over the edge,' cue laughter, but then we discover she means his ashes..

Each sketch brought it's own surprises, from the lady horse riders discussing mind-boggling philosophical questions, to the shell-suited simpletons Karl and Gayle.





Moving furniture has never been so entertaining. Kat's cast danced with tables, spun and swooped with chairs and entered and left the stage with immaculate timing in the guise of everything and anything from synchronised swimmers to Beyonce backing dancers.

Not content with performing on stage, the Players had already been out and about using Sibford as the film set for an ambitious black and white Hammer horror-style movie. This surprise screening after the interval added yet another entertaining twist to the already packed programme.

Chris Cullen was perfectly cast as the evil Count Orlok, special mention to the three sisters' wigs which deserved star billing. Vampire bites, plague-struck villagers, death and terror all adding up to a big screen helping of hilarious horror.

Classic sketches from comic greats including The Two Ronnies and Victoria Wood were perfectly placed between home-grown offerings from The Players' own Dave Rowley and Ginny Bennett.

Sibford Village Hall was transformed into an impressive performance space with raked seating, lively set and excellent lighting and sound.

Hi everyone, thanks so much for following my travels over the past 15 months. We have now officially driven around the world on our scooter and sidecar. It took us 455 days to circumnavigate the globe on our ridiculous vehicle. On route we faced some of the most challenging landscapes on earth. From the sands of the Sahara, to the snows of Siberia, we faced a temperature range of +50°C to -37°C. It was an amazing experience but also the hardest thing either of us have ever done.



We returned on the 19th of January as the first people to ever circumnavigate the globe on a scooter with a sidecar having beaten the current world record for the longest journey on this kind of vehicle, 8 times over. NATURE NOTES

Yesterday was a glorious afternoon and I walked, via Burdrop, from the primary school to my bungalow in Woodway Road at around 5pm. By the school, a starling, perched on an aerial giving a selection from its repertoire. As I approached the church, two green finches, both male, churring in turn as the search for territory begins. Crosssing the sheep field, the call of a collared dove, and a green woodpecker passed by, on its low undulating flight. In the dip by the stream, two redwings watched me through the gate then flew off over the trees, where, if they were listening, they would have heard a group of long tailed tits peeping. House sparrows chatting in the ivy by the Dower House. A songthrush, singing each phrase twice, as I neared the road junction and in the distance the argumentative cawing of rooks. Meeting Megan Gilkes near The Old Bakehouse gave me another species as she had just, a few seconds before seen a goldcrest flitting in the rose on Little Thatch. I knew I would hear more house sparrows at the beginning of Woodway Road and I was momentarily taken back to the marvellous cries of the swifts there last summer. As I neared home, a large group of chaffinches accompanied me, moving in small clusters from tree to tree and a wood pigeon sat waiting patiently.

How interesting and enjoyable my walk had been...I didn't mention any of the many robins and blackbirds along the way and I do wonder what other birds I had overlooked.

During these past few weeks, I have been watching a large flock of linnets and chaffinches, probably numbering around 150, that have been feeding regularly on dropped fat hen seed in the field behind The Brambles bungalow. Fieldfares and redwings are about in good numbers on the Sibford School playing fields and feeding on fallen apples in the orchard at home. A week ago a small group of pied wagtails were flitting about on the patch left by the muck heap near the 'footpath' between Woodway Road and the Kiss and Drop entrance to Sibford School. This in itself is not particularly noteworthy but amongst them was a single grey wagtail.

A little owl was found dead in a nearby farmyard. No obvious signs as to how it died. Its plumage was that of a first year bird. Red kites are often to be seen gently flying to and fro over the fields but seeing three together in the last week of January was unusual. I was pleased to hear the call of a buzzard towards the end of January. Every evening, and actually earlier, from around 4:30pm, the tawny owls begin singing.

In the wider picture, I have heard that there are plenty of brambling to be seen in the grounds of Broughton Castle, and 22 shoveller ducks on Boddington reservoir. For much more detailed information of where to see birds in the area, visit banburyornithologicalsociety.org.uk

SIBFORD GOWER PARISH COUNCIL

Reflections on the meeting of the Council, Tuesday 12th February A personal note from the Chairman

I was struck again at the meeting of the Gower Council on Tuesday, 12th February, how indebted I felt to the lively conversation that developed around a key number of topics that had come up on our agenda for the evening. Although we have been in place as a new group of counsellors since last May, nine months is not a long time, and we hugely value the opportunity of running our thinking past our fellow villagers and getting their responses. We are always conscious that we are after all acting on their behalf. In formal terms we are anyway accountable to the electorate for the funding that supports the work of the Council, and I said in the meeting I think we are doing that incredibly well - not least because of an enormous amount of painstaking work put into reviewing and updating our accounts by Cllr David Allen and our clerk Vanessa Mulley. But when it comes to gaining a measure of what is needed and whether we are doing as much as we could be doing, that we can only gain from the many conversations of the kind we had on February 12th, and all of us have at a personal level simply by being out and about in the village and participating in its many events.

Sometimes it is not as straightforward as it seems, as we learned from Ian Sharp who joined us as the Footpaths Warden for the two villages of our community. Sometimes the issues just keep coming back as in the case of the village pond in the Gower which thus far has proved an insuperable challenge to a succession of Councils over decades. And sometimes we have to contend with the complexity of planning law and conflicting interests as is currently the case with the application still being considered by Cherwell District Council for a development on the Hook Norton road – with implications in how that is handled for both villages and not simply for the Ferris.

We touched too on the matter of speeding more work is being done by a group of volunteers from the community to come up with measures that would really make a difference.

They are not the only group that has stepped forward. The Hook Norton Road development has its own Action Group, and we talked about the invaluable, and selfless work done on behalf of the village – and in their case for over 400 years - by the Town Estates Charity. Opportunities to serve on their Board of Trustees will be coming up later in the year when several vacancies will be coming up.


In some recent research, colleagues and I have done on the origin of the Annual Parish Meeting which comes up in both the Sibfords in April, we discovered that the Annual Parish Meeting was set up as part of the Local Government Act in 1972 to foster local democracy and defined as 'a meeting of the electors of a parish' and the purpose of the meeting 'for the community to come together to discuss parish affairs' – but it turns out that there is no statutory definition or case law to determine what constitutes a "parish affair".

What did become clear is that "The Annual Parish Meeting is an entirely SEPARATE meeting from the Parish Council Annual Meeting which takes place in May and is a formal council meeting at which the Parish Councillors hold themselves to account for the previous year's activities and expenditure. But the Annual Parish Meeting is a much informal affair.

The most regular reference in all the various accounts is to the word 'community'; and we are very conscious that our own website now represents the two villages, the Sibfords, as one community.

This raised a lot of interest at the meeting of the Gower Council of Tuesday, February 12th, and we are developing a conversation with the councillors of the Ferris to consider whether for the more informal purposes for which the Annual Parish Meeting was devised and set in law, it might actually be more appropriate that for this one occasion in the year:

- we conduct the Annual Parish Meeting as one community, and that
- •we devise an event that is more celebratory of that community in character.



In Your Garden - March

Spring is coming! Let's get back outside and enjoy the birds singing, and find joy in the spring bulbs bursting into blossom. It is the start of the birds nesting season, so try not to trim any hedges where they build, and leave clumps of straw, moss or twigs around to help them make a perfect nest.

- 1. Hoe off any weeds that have dared to grow in the winter, and then mulch the borders, with compost or manure.
- 2. Cut back perennials, i.e penstemons, asters etc to where you can see new growth sprouting.
- 3. Prune the roses. Cut out any dead growth, and always try to prune back to an outward facing bud.
- 4. It is a good time to feed fruit bushes and trees, with fertiliser such as Growmore.
- 5. If you haven't done it yet, hurry up and chit your new potatoes use an egg tray to stop them lolling into each other in a brotherly sort of way, and place them in a cool, fairly light place. You should be able to plant them out by mid-April.
- 6. Now is the time to sow seeds of leeks, lettuce, onions and peas, if you have a warm greenhouse, and they can go out into a cold frame in April, to harden off before planting.
- 7. I think I reminded you to divide your crowded perennials in the autumn, but if you were naughty and left them, you still have just enough time to do it. Choose the large clumps, and take fresh roots from around the edge, leaving the central clump, which will be old and tired by now. You only need to divide them once every three years.
- 8. March is the best time to plant bare-root roses, so indulge your longing for some glorious new repeat flowering roses. Bare-root plants are always the best, and the cheapest way to buy them.
- 9. Geraniums that have been keeping you cheerful, flowering in the kitchen window sill, probably need a rest now. Trim them back, and remove some of the top soil, and then add some compost and feed them. They will soon get their energy back.
- 10. I wonder if you remembered to get the lawnmower serviced? If the weather warms up, and the grass is dry, rake it over to get rid of fallen leaves and mossy bits, and give it a fairly high cut.
