AUTHORS IN THEIR SEASONS

Every year at this time Dickens is remembered. He is inseparable from Christmas as is the Christmas pudding, and often more digestible. We are served with Scrooge and Tiny Tim on radio, if not on television; if we're lucky, we may get a portion of Pickwick, this is jollier stuff. There are splendid word pictures of the robust companions bowling down to Dingley Dell for the holiday, "the wheels skim over the hard and frosty ground, the horses bursting into a canter...as if the load behind them: coach, passengers, codfish, oyster barrels and all were but a feather at their heels". A few pages on we read of the great, festive party followed by the Boxing Day sport on the frozen lake. But Dickens is not always a winter man. The friends journey down to Kemt again in the summer to play in the historic cricket match against All Muggleton. "The wickets were pitched and so were a couple of marquees for the rest and refreshment of the participants". Stout fellows these Pickwickians.

True English writers are conscious of the changing seasons and variable weather that have shaped the character and way of life of our race. H.E. Bates has been likened to a an Impressionist painter; here he describes the changing seasons in a dingy little shoe-making town: "Spring came to Evensford about the end of April with shabby flowerings of brown wallflowers on allotment grounds, with dusty daffodils behind the iron railings of street front gardens", but a little later we read that in the grounds of the great house... "by May the spinneys were thick with bluebells. The air all day long was soaked heavy and sweet and almost too rich with the scent of them and the juiciness of rising grass".

Many writres rhapsodise over midsummer but surely no-one better than R.D. Blackmore in 'Lorna Doone' when he tells of 'Girt Jan Ridd' pausing, sickle in hand, to gaze across the Devon landscape quivering in the sunshine, hoping to see his beloved Lorna.

These are but a few samples of the buried treasure to be found between the covers of English books, hardback or paper. Our County Libraries are well stocked and librarians most helpful - and of course, the long evenings of the winter months are the greatest opportunity for reading and enjoying books
