Since their arrival in September 1972 great improvements and changes have taken place in the School, and they will be sadly m missed.

Tributes have been pouring in, and a significant point was made by the School Committee Chairman when giving his annual report on June 14th. It was that, since the School's foundation in 1842, about 5,500 pupils have attended; the Greaves regime has accommodated just about 1,000 of these.

We all wish them a long and happy retirement in their new Lakeland home.

The new Head is to be James Graham, a Quaker and family man, until recently Headmaster of Fearnhill Comprehensive School, Letchworth.

SPONSORED CART-RACE

As part of the fund-raising activities for this year's Village Fete, a sponsored Cart-Race will be held, probably at the start of the afternoon's entertainment.

Starting and finishing in the Village Hall grounds, teams of three (two pushers and a passenger) will set off at intervals of 30 seconds and race against a pre-determined time round the Burdrop Loop.

There will be a prize for the fastest time in each of two classes: teams aged 14 years and under, and teams aged 15 years and over.

THE GARDEN IN JULY AND AUGUST

The rains of June have made good the drought of May and pushed along the growth of the lawns and our weeds and made us reach for the shears before the evergreen hedges get out of control Growth is the order of the day as if plants know that, with midsummer past, we have started on the downward path of the seasons; but nevertheless we are coming into the time of harvest.

Broad beans are the first crop to enjoy, together with dwarf French beans, which, incidentally, can still be sown for a late crop. Other vegetables can be sown until mid-August, including cabbage, April, Harbinger and Early Market; spinach Winter; onion Solidity; and the new Japanese types that will produce bulbs for to harvest next June. Lettuce Avondefiance and Winter Density, sown up to the first week in August, will yield crops by October.

July is a good time to sow perennial plants in the seed beds. Lupins and delphiniums, perennial chrysanthemums, pansies, sweet williams will make sturdy plants fit to set in their permanent

positions in the Autumn.

Don't forget to buy, or at least order, your winter flowering bulbs by the end of August. The specially prepared bulbs for Christmas flowering will come later, by the end of September, but the ones for outdoor planting should be put in at the end of August or early September. If you have any of last season's indoor pots left in the plunge pit, get them out and clean them up ready for planting out of doors. Plant outdoor bulbs quite deep with at least 6" of soil over their noses and a handful of peat under the base.

All pot plants, whether indoors or out, need some liquid feed after the strenuous growing time of the last few weeks, and make sure they don't dry out in the sunny August days.
