

SIBFORD VILLAGE FETE - SATURDAY 13TH SEPTEMBER, 1980 IN AID OF THE VILLAGE HALL ROOF REPAIR FUND.

Since the building of the present Village Hall nearly 23 years ago it has been a meeting place for village organisations and today it is probably in greater use than at any time in its history. It is regularly used every weekday, sometimes by as many as 3 different organisations. At weekends it provides a local amenity for parties, dances, and wedding receptions.

Hiring charges for the hall are the cheapest in the area. This is due almost entirely to the efforts of the Village Hall Committee in raising funds to help pay the ever increasing cost of maintenance, lighting, and heating.

The Village Hall Roof is tiled with cedar shingles which have a life of approximately 25 years. A recent survey of the roof has shown that half of it is in need of urgent repairs, and the estimated cost of this is nearly £3,000. If the Village Hall is to continue to be used by more than 15 village organisations then it is imperative that these repairs are carried out in the immediate future.

This year's Village Fete is more important than ever as a fund-raising event, and we hope you will support us as generously this year as in past years with gifts for the stalls, side-shows etc., and of course your presence on the day. On the reverse side you will find a list of stalls and stall-holders who have volunteered to run them. Please contact individuals personally.

The afternoon's programme has been enlarged with a number of arena events, and of course the sponsored cart-race, so there should be entertainment for all ages and tastes. Admission is by Programmes which are available from members of the Village Hall Committee. THE GARDEN IN SEPTEMBER

With bushes such as blackcurrants, aim to get an open bush, removing wood that has fruited this year and leaving sturdy young growth, well spaced out.

Spring flowering bulbs are coming on to the market now and it pays to buy, and to plant, early. For good value for money I prefer to buy locally and save the cost of postage and packing.
