Calling all dog owners in the Sibfords

There has been a case of Canine Parvovirus in the Sibfords, which has sadly resulted in the death of a dog. The virus can be transmitted simply by a dog sniffing an infected poo or even the place where the poo was if it was picked up. Similarly, if you or your dog tread on an affected area, you then tread the virus into your home. It can then be left on the floor, dog bed, blankets etc. If your dog is suddenly lethargic, vomiting, has diarrhoea, passes blood in the faeces or will not eat his food then these are the first signs. Take to the vet immediately. It should be noted that it appears to be more prevalent in dogs younger than 2yrs old. This is a highly contagious disease and I would urge every dog owner to check if their dog has been vaccinated.

LOCAL MP RE-OPENS SIBFORD VILLAGE HALL

Sibford Village Hall was reopened by local MP Victoria Prentis on Friday 30th June following a major £30,000 upgrade project.

Over the last 2 years, the Sibford Village Hall in North Oxfordshire has been transformed into a modern, low-carbon, community space through the installation of energy efficient windows and doors; new wall and roof insulation; and state-of-the-art, low energy LED lighting. The Hall acoustics have also been significantly improved, and will be further enhanced later this year with a new audio-visual system to support our hearing impaired users.

Joan Broady, Chair of the Sibford Village Hall Trust said, "Our community and private users are already benefiting from the improved comfort and appearance of our Hall, and visitors have been highly impressed by our facilities which now rival those of commercial venues. We are delighted that Victoria Prentis MP will be joining us to celebrate, and to help us thank the organisations and individuals who have made this transformation possible".

David Allen, Development Funding Manager for the Hall said, "Much of the funding for our £30,000 project has come from charitable grants and we are hugely grateful to the Big Lottery Fund, the Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment, Grundon Ltd, the Midcounties Co-operative, the Doris Field Charitable Trust, the Town Estates Charity and our village Parish Councils for all their invaluable support".

Keith Hicks, Project Manager for the Hall development added, "Special thanks also go to our Sibford villagers, for attending and spending at our fundraising events, and for rolling their sleeves up to wield paint brushes and rollers when the time came for that all important decorating and finishing work. We are very proud of what our Community has achieved together, and we look forward to welcoming Victoria Prentis and special guests to share in our celebrations on Friday 30th June".

NATURE NOTES

17th June Arnold and Ina Lamb caught a House Centipede in their bungalow. These originated in the Mediterranean region but have now spread throughout the World. They hunt at night and feed on other household invertebrates.

23rd June We held a very successful moth night for pupils, parents and staff at Sibford School. Peter and Lyn Newbold brought along a bat detector to add interest. This is a device that converts the bat's echolocation ultrasound signals to audible frequencies. Four different species of bat (Common Pipistrelle, Soprano Pipistrelle, Noctule and a Myotis species) were detected. They were catching insects over the Sibford School pond.

12th July We saw the first Hornets of the year. These impressive insects have an unwarranted reputation. They mainly eat insects although they will eat damaged or overripe fruit. They are very unlikely to sting humans.

A Kestrel has been seen frequently in Holly Tree field. When the field was cut it spent most of the day hovering over the field and diving down to catch prey disturbed by the mowing. Green Woodpeckers have also been very vocal around the field.

25th July After a long break Tawny Owls were heard calling again.

27th July A Lesser Stag Beetle was found in our garden.



By the second half of July there seemed to be a few more butterflies around than in recent years. Red Admirals seem to be the most abundant.

Kingfishers have been seen at Lamb's Pool and I have heard that a couple of the cygnets are doing well.

Transport within our Community At a recent Parish Liaison meeting with Cherwell District Council, and in the light of reductions in transport services to rural communities in the last couple of years, it was suggested that Parish Councils try to identify any transport gaps within their community. Within Cherwell there are 3 community transport schemes in place, relevant for our community, that not all villagers may know about:

- Banbury District Dial-a-Ride (Tel. 01295 257715). To join this scheme there is an annual membership fee of £5. Members can then book individual journeys in advance by telephone.
- Volunteer Connect Car Scheme. (Tel. 0300 3030125) This service is run by Citizens Advice and is supported by Cherwell District Council. If you would like to use this service or can offer yourself as a volunteer driver please telephone them and they will be able to help you.
- Cherwell Volunteer Car Scheme. (Tel. 01295 266090). Currently this scheme has 24 volunteer drivers who will arrange to drive clients to appointments (hospitals, opticians etc) on an individual basis. Details of this service can be obtained using the telephone number given.

All the above schemes will attract a payment for each journey advised on application or booking. Friends and neighbours can often help, especially in emergencies, but Sibford Ferris Parish Council would like to know of any specific difficulties experienced by villagers. DID YOU KNOW?

Harvest time:

The following is an extract from a piece written by Joshua Lamb in 1937 when he reflected on country life in the previous 70 years:

'Up to the year 1872 no introduction of machinery had taken place on our father's farm, (Grounds Farm, Sibford Ferris) and we remember how during hay time we loved to go and watch the string of mowers following each other across the field of grass or clover, laying low the beautiful flowers and exposing the nest of the partridge, landrail, quail and lark and disturbing the little grass mouse in its cosy home; or in the harvest time assisting with a sickle in reaping the corps of golden wheat. When the corn was all cut by hand, every available man, woman and child, including many of the local tradesmen, were in the habit of assisting and very considerable sums of money were earned especially when the work was done by the "piece" and days of sixteen hours were frequently made. The introduction of the reaping machine in 1872, followed by other horse-drawn implements, gradually took the place of the farm labourers, until at the present time (1937) not more than about one-third the former number are employed.'

With the end of summer's glut of courgettes, try this fresh-tasting salad, which takes only minutes to prep.

Courgette, mint & chilli salad

Serves 4

4/5 courgettes - should be firm and bright skinned, not old/soft - this isn't a salad for using up your old veg. If you can get yellow and green courgettes it looks fab. (The vicar sometimes has yellow courgettes in a box at the end of his drive! No pressure, Ronald).

1 large red fresh chilli, finely chopped
Handful of fresh mint leaves, torn

Rinse the courgettes, removing any grit or mud

Cut off both ends of the courgettes and peel lengthways with a potato peeler so you get long, thin strips

Toss them on a plate with the fresh chilli and mint leaves

Drizzle with olive oil and lemon, salt & pepper (or a nice lemony dressing)

Yes, that's right. Raw courgettes.

(This is also delicious with mozzarella torn over the top of it as a main course).

On Thursday, 20th July a group of 19 members and visitors gathered at Woodstock's Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum for a very informative guided tour. The £3.2 million museum, financed by private subscriptions, and opened by the Princess Royal in 2014, stands in the grounds of the Oxfordshire Museum and was created to honour soldiers from Oxfordshire regiments and present their history.

There was a wealth of information to absorb during the forty-minute tour and we were able to spend another hour taking in all the permanent displays, which include archives tracing the history of the Ox and Bucks Regiment, an exhibition on Winston Churchill and the Queen's Own Hussars, Oxfordshire's Prisoners of War at home and abroad, the Liberation of Bergen -Belsen, Oxfordshire Airpower, the 20th Century Soldier, gadgets used in the Cold War and more.

The museum is such a fascinating place that several people were already planning to return and spend longer there.

After this we met for a meal at the Star Inn where we were looked after excellently.

Our next meeting will be in the Village Hall (doors open at 7.45 p.m.) on Thursday, 21st September, when Oxford Historian, Liz Woolley, will be talking about 'Oxfordshire and the Spanish Civil War, 1936-39'.

I think we will be surprised at how many people in Oxfordshire responded in different ways to this war, and how it affected so many lives so far from Spain.

SIBFORD RESULTS BEST IN YEARS

Sibford School Sixth Form students are celebrating some outstanding exam results.

At A Level, a third of students gained A*s or As and the pass rate at A* - B was 51.5% ... the highest for at least eight years.

BTEC results were also outstanding with all students gaining a Distinction*.

Sibford Head Toby Spence said: "These are some fabulous results. In total, we had 46 students sitting exams in a range of 23 different subjects with top marks achieved in 18 of these. This says a great deal about the breadth of options on offer at Sibford Sixth Form, the hard work of our students and the strong support that is given to enable students to follow their desired pathways."

The results mean that Sibford students will be heading to some top university courses. Michael Burton, who gained A*s in Biology, Chemistry and Mathematics, is off to Hull York Medical School; Andrew Maclennan, who gained A*s in Economics and History and an A in Geography will be going to Nottingham to study Computer Sciences; and Harry Berks and Ben Taylor, who both gained As in Biology, Mathematics and Physics, will be heading to Bristol University, where Harry will be studying Palaeontology and Ben Biology.

Michael Burton said: "It really couldn't have gone better for me and I am really delighted that I will be able to study medicine." Added Harry Berks: "I'm absolutely thrilled with my results."

Head of Sibford Sixth Form, Cate Mallalieu-Needle said: "I would like to give my congratulations to all our students. We have seen some exceptional performances and I am especially delighted to see outstanding results for some students who, over the last two years, have risen to the challenge and achieved great success. Well done to all."

Sibford gardens open for NGS:

On Sunday 25 June five gardens in the Sibfords opened to raise money for the NGS charities and raised £1696.00. I would like to thank all our visitors for coming and for being so encouraging and enthusiastic, our garden owners for their year-long efforts to get their gardens looking as beautiful as possible on the day and all our helpers for their sterling efforts on ticket selling, plant stalls, putting up signs and suchlike. Gill Soden and her team provided wonderful teas at the village hall and raised a goodly sum for the church.

The next meeting of the Horti Society will be on Wednesday 11th October, 7.30 pm at the Village Hall. Val Bourne will be talking about The Natural Gardener. All welcome. Come prepared with money as the annual sub will be due.

In Your Garden - September

1. Now is the time to take cuttings. Shrubs, pelargoniums, penstemons etc. Use a gritty compost, don't let it get too wet, put 5 around the edge of a pot, and cover with a plastic bag. Keep on a windowsill, or in the greenhouse, but not in full sun.
2. Start collecting seeds, before the wind blows them away. I always collect sweet pea Matucana, and Cerinthe seeds. Very expensive to buy from Sarah Raven.
3. Dig up the last of the potatoes before the dratted slugs get them.
4. Divide herbaceous perennials, such as phlox, astrantias, argyranthemums, to increase your stock, or give away.
5. Nasty job, but try and clean out your greenhouse and cold frames before you need to tuck away tender plants in the autumn.
6. Keep netting on your veggie crops and fruit until all picked. The birds ate all my cherries before they were even ripe.
7. Now is the time to order your spring flowering bulbs, and to get them planted by the end of September. Tulips should be planted later, in November. Don't forget to put some lovely hyacinths into pots to have them flowering for Christmas.
8. Keep watering and deadheading hanging baskets, and deadhead dahlias, delphiniums, roses etc to prolong the flowering season.
9. Keep camellias and rhododendrons well watered – now is the time when then start to form next years buds.
10. Lift squashes off the ground to avoid rotting, and plant autumn onion sets

Although Jupe is moving to Hook Norton, I have asked her to continue her splendid gardening tips..... Ed

Another day another scam. As reported in the Torygraph 9.8.17. Royal Mail and Action Fraud are warning households about fake 'while you were out cards' purporting to be from Royal Mail. These red 'missed delivery' cards are posted through letter boxes instructing recipients to telephone a number to retrieve their parcel. The cards urge you to call an 0208 number and an automated message asks for personal details etc. There is of course, no parcel. Victims later discover they have been charged £45 for the call. The card is similar to the Royal Mail's 'Something for you' card, but in this case their crest/logo is missing. Please contact Action Fraud or TV police direct on 101.


