NATURE NOTES

We have been asked to take over providing the Nature Notes for the Sibford Scene which we are happy to do but would welcome any contributions from anyone else in the villages. The easiest way of doing this is to e-mail us at anewbold@fsmail.net.

While writing this I can see Sparrows, Robins, Dunnocks, Pigeons, Collared Doves and three species of tit (blue, great and coal) on and around our bird table. These can be seen at almost any time through the daylight hours joined occasionally by Long-tailed tits, Green Finches, a Nuthatch and Greater-spotted Woodpeckers. The very occasional visit by a Sparrow Hawk results in an hour or two when the other birds keep away.

On the subject of bird tables the RSPB recommend that you should avoid using peanuts, fat and bread at this time of the year since these can be harmful to adult birds feed them to their nestlings.

Feeding birds can help them through times of food scarcity but some species also rely on a good supply of caterpillars and other invertebrates. It is estimated that Britain is home to 3.5 million pairs of Blue Tits. A typical nest may contain 6 nestlings each of which may consume 100 caterpillars each day. Gardeners can help by reducing pesticide use to an absolute minimum and leaving rotting logs, twig piles, leaf litter, seed heads and hollow stems where invertebrates can survive the winter.

In addition to the birds mentioned above it is good to see Blackbirds joined by an occasional Fieldfare feeding on the last remaining windfall apples from last year's crop.

As the warmer weather approaches it is worth looking out for the first of the Spring butterflies. These are likely to be the species that spend the Winter as hibernating adults. (Brimstone, Small Tortoiseshell, Red Admiral, Peacock and Comma).

GREAT TASTE

GOOD OLD-FASHIONED BORSCHT

Serves 6

Ingredients:

500g raw beetroot, peeled and grated

500g red cabbage, finely shredded

3 tbsp tomato puree

2 tbsp red wine vinegar

125g butter

1 litre beef stock (I use veg stock)

1 medium onion, grated

1 carrrot, grated

S&P

1 tbsp brown sugar

Lob the betroot and red cabbage into a large saucepan. Stir in the tomato puree, vinegar, half the butter and the stock. Cover, bring to the boil and simmer for $\bf 1$ hour

Melt the remaining butter and saute the onion and carrots until golden. Add to the beetroot and red cabbage mixture. Cover and simmer gently for a further 15 minutes. Chuck in the S&P and add the brown sugar. Throw some sour cream to garnish.......

DID YOU KNOW?

A survey of headstones in the churchyard at Holy Trinity Church

The Quaker Meeting House has a full and accurate record of every burial in the Meeting House Graveyard but this was not the case at the Anglican Church of Holy Trinity.

The church and graveyard receives many visitors during the course of a year, some of whom are seeking to find the final resting place of family members who are thought to have been buried in the village. In 2004 members of the Sibfords' Society carried out a survey to record all the headstones in the graveyard and to produce an index of those buried in the churchyard whose headstones remained. The original 1840 graveyard was extended in 1903, 1939 and again in 2009.

Over a period of several months members examined every headstone recording its shape, overall size, any inscription plus any other unusual features. The area south of the church, included the majority of the oldest graves and those surveying in this area often found themselves on their hands and knees or even fully extended on the ground to decipher parts of headstones which had sunk lower in the ground.

Once recording was complete an alphabetical index was completed and a copy of the final survey was printed and left in the church to be used by visitors. It is updated periodically.

Hugo Seely has lived in Sibford Gower for over 20 years, where he runs his small building, carpentry and plumbing business. Married to Caroline, they have two children – India and Toby - both of whom are grown up even though their mother won't let them ...

Why Sibford?

We moved here to a safe house in 1993 after my career in MI6 ended abruptly.

Your business:

I've lived and worked in the village for 24 years and the village has always been very good to us. It's rare that I work outside of the Sibfords. My business has developed over the years. I trained as a boat builder originally which gave me a wide knowledge of many disciplines, although I've yet to build my boat. Over the years I've progressed to building projects: kitchens, bathrooms, small extensions. Every project and house is different and I enjoy the variety and the creative input. Back in January 1842, nine-year-old Lucy Endall became the first pupil to register at Sibford School.

History tells us she arrived by carrier cart, bringing with her everything a young school girl might need including a straw bonnet, a cloak, two gowns and two pairs of stout shoes!

175 years later, current pupil Sofia Mattinson, also nine, stepped into Lucy's shoes to mark the school's official birthday.

Sibford Head, Toby Spence, said: "It's very exciting to think that we welcomed our first pupils back in 1842. We will be holding events to mark the 175th anniversary throughout the year and look forward to celebrating with pupils both past and present."

As part of the commemorations, a special Choir Festival will be held on Saturday 1 April at St Mary's Church, Banbury, when Sibford choristers will be joined by pupils from Quaker schools in West Yorkshire, Essex and Northern Ireland.

This exciting musical collaboration will feature a combined performance of Fauré's Requiem. Each choir will also perform a piece of their own choice.

Entry to the Friends Schools Joint Choir Festival is free but there will be a retiring collection in aid of BYHP. All welcome.

In Your Garden - March

- 1. It is time to get the lawn into shape. Rake out the moss, overseed bare patches, trim edges and when it has the first cut, keep the mower blades on high.
- 2. Clear out any weeds and mulch the borders with well-rotted manure or garden compost.
- 3. Finish pruning shrub roses by the end of the month, and prune Hydrangea paniculata to the lowest pair of strong buds.
- 4. If you have a heated propagator you can start sowing tomato seeds, and peppers, chillies, cucumbers and aubergines.
- 5 Shallotts and onion sets can be planted out towards the end of March. Plant 4 inches apart, in rows 12 inches apart.
- 6. In the greenhouse prune and re-pot geraniums.
- 7. Time to cut back lonicera now.(honeysuckle) and prune buddleia back very hard be brutal it flowers on new wood.
- 8 Divide summer flowering perennials now, such as Astrantias, Hostas
- 9. Coppice cornus and salix at the end of the month, to give you coloured stems next winter.
- 10 On a fine day, clean the glass of the greenhouse, banish spiders nests, look under the pots and the staging for slugs ugh and it is O.K to put slug pellets around your vulnerable plants in the greenhouse, but try not to use them in the garden. We all want to get some hedgehogs back into the village.


