NATURE NOTES

I was surprised to read that many plants from garden centres being sold as "bee friendly" have been shown to contain multiple pesticides, including neonicotinoid insecticides, at levels likely to be harmful to bees! The advice is that gardeners who wish to encourage pollinating insects should, where possible, raise their own plants from seed or cuttings, swap plants with friends or buy plants that have been produced by an organic nursery.

The cold spell in early December encouraged blackbirds and the occasional Fieldfare to come into the garden to feed on windfall apples. Even in our relatively small garden we had more than a dozen blackbirds at times. Individual birds seem to find an apple and then guard it, chasing of any rivals that approach. We have also seen a lot more chaffinches in the garden this winter than we have in recent years. As well as picking up dropped seeds under the bird feeders they also seem to be pecking at the windfalls.

A kestrel is now a frequent visitor to the telegraph pole in Holly Tree field. Presumably this is a good vantage point from which to spot small mammals. Judging by the numbers we have caught in the hen-house this winter there are certainly plenty of wood mice around.

Winter is a good time to look out for lichens, especially those that grow on the twigs of deciduous trees and shrubs and are hidden by the leaves for much of the year. Many species of lichen are very sensitive to air pollution and the abundance of lichens in the Sibfords is a good indication of the high air quality we enjoy in our rural location away from major roads and polluting industry.

SIBFORD GOWER PARISH COUNCIL

A Parish Council meeting was held on Monday, 8 th January 2018, attended by six local residents. The Chairman informed the Meeting that two Parish Councillors (Peter Abbott and Alan Parkin) had tendered their resignations. The Chairman thanked them for their contribution to and close involvement with the work of the Parish Council. Two local residents (Roger Mallows and Susan Tompkins) were duly co-opted as from the end of the meeting, to serve until the elections on May 3rd. All the other Parish Councillors have served for a long time and have indicated that they do not wish to stand for reelection.

Precept: It was agreed to maintain the precept at £6,400.

Planning Matters: *The Pheasant Pluckers Inn* (formerly The Bishop Blaize): Two Councillors had attended the Cherwell Planning Committee meeting on 23rd November concerning the application for change of use, but had not spoken. The application was rejected at that meeting. A meeting with Cherwell District Council is to be sought with a view to discussing how matters currently stand and seeking to know what the District Council is intending to do. *Miramar Cottage:* A planning sub-committee meeting was held on December 4th , at which it was agreed to support the application with a letter; the application was subsequently successful. Miss Carrie Tucker asked for her thanks to be conveyed to the PC.

Highways: Potholes are a continuing problem, especially a potentially tyre damaging one in Acre Ditch, and the Clerk was instructed to contact Oxfordshire Highways seeking remedial work be carried out. Parishioners were reminded that the fastest way to alert OCC to damage to the highways was by the website Fixmystreet.

Village Pond: Damage had been caused to a part of the wall containing the water of the Village pond by contractors' vehicles employed by the local farm. A site meeting was held on October 30 th , and the farm owner agreed to carry out repair work. It was agreed to request that satisfactory remedial work be carried out by the next meeting in April.

Public Participation: It was noted that the gate leading to the bridle path at the end of Backside Lane was unsatisfactory, but that the relevant farmers were aware. A local resident again raised the subject of parking outside The Old Rectory.

Date of next Parish Council Meeting

The next Parish Council Meeting will be on **16th April 2018** in the Staff Room of the Primary School starting at 8pm. The Annual Parish Meeting will be on 30th April and take place in the Village Large Hall starting at 7.30pm. Elections to the Parish Council (if required) are scheduled for 3rd May.

SIBFORD GOWER PARISH COUNCIL

Sibford Gower Parish Council Elections

Parishioners will be aware that the term of office of the current Parish Council ends in May 2018, when new elections are scheduled.

We have been discussing this among ourselves. We have all served at least ten years, and think it is time for a new Parish Council to take over. We therefore give early notice as a group that we are not intending to stand for election again in May.

In order to maintain some form of continuity we have agreed that two councillors should resign from January 2018, and be replaced temporarily by two co-opted members who will hold office until May, when they will stand for election in the usual way. Peter Abbott and Alan Parkin have asked to resign, and the two individuals who have most kindly agreed to allow themselves to be co-opted are Roger Mallows of Yew Tree House and Sue Tomkins of Parsons Barn Farm In the meantime existing councillors new and old will seek suggestions from the community for new councillors. If we can find three more volunteers, it may be possible to avoid a formal election, which costs the Parish roughly \pounds 1000 (or \pounds 2 per household).

Of course this is an open election, and any parishioner may stand, but we hope that anyone who is interested will contact the Chairman or the Clerk earlier, so that they can be told of the process for election, and so that the retiring councillors can sponsor them.

In the past our aim has been to seek a committee balanced between various groups in the village, geographically from the pond area, from Burdrop and other parts of the village, in terms of professions, and socially from the retired, newcomers and traditional villagers. We think that part of our success over the years has been that the PC is indeed genuinely representative of all the varied elements in the village, and we would like this to continue.

Being a parish councillor is an interesting and enjoyable way of contributing to your community, and helping to make it a better place to live and work. The basic qualification is that you must have lived or worked within three miles of the parish for the last 12 months. 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DID YOU KNOW?



February 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of the Representation of the People Act 1918, which allowed some women over the age of 30 to vote for the first time. There were many women at that time working and sacrificing much to bring about changes which would eventually bring about Votes for Women. Sibford had its own heroine from these times – a Mrs Laura Ormiston Chant (nee Dibbin). Born in 1848 in Gloucestershire she trained as a nurse and worked as a Sister in the Sophia Wards of the London Hospital.



She married Thomas Chant MRCS in 1877 and whilst living in London she lobbied for the Music Hall Theatres to be cleaned up from the houses of ill repute they had become. A flimsy screen was erected in the auditoriums to segregate the sexes and a 19 year old Winston Churchill was among a group of Sandhurst cadets who tore down the offending partition and Churchill proclaimed, "Ladies of the Empire, I stand for Liberty!" In his autobiography Churchill later recorded this outburst as his maiden speech but the rioters failed to achieve their goal and eventually the Music Hall theatres improved.

Mrs Ormiston Chant –as she was known, wrote and lectured on social purity, temperance and women's rights. Her published works included pamphlets, hymns, a novel and a book of poetry. Her writing reflected many of the tensions characterising feminism in the late 18th century and early 19th century. She travelled abroad and addressed 'Parliament of the World's Religions' Congress in Chicago in 1893 and went to Bulgaria to give aid to Armenian refugees from 1894-1896. During the Great War she exhibited great courage carrying out rescue work and serving tea and coffee to survivors following devastating explosions.

In her latter years she moved to the Banbury area and lived at 41 Bloxham Road, Banbury joining the Quaker Meeting in Sibford Gower. Following her death in 1923 she was buried in the Graveyard at the Gower Meeting House and a bromide print of her taken in 1916 by Walter Stoneman is exhibited in the National Portrait Gallery.



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

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HOOK NORTON LOW CARBON



European Regional Development Fund





An opportunity to find out what Hook Norton Low Carbon is up to down the road.

Among many other initiatives, they are developing a community housing project that residents of Sibford might be equally interested in. There are a couple of Open Community Housing meetings coming up at the end of February that we would be very welcome at, on:

Tuesday February 20th at Hook Norton Brewery at 7.30pm, and

Saturday February 24th at Hook Norton Sports and Social Club at 2pm

This is a copy of a piece about it from Cathy Ryan and Tim Lunel, that is coming out in the January edition of the Hook Norton magazine at the same time as our Sibford Scene:

"It's clear that a new approach to housing is needed - a grass roots approach that springs directly from the ideas and needs of the local community. Housing costs have spiralled out of control resulting in homes becoming increasingly unaffordable and out of reach for many, but especially low-income households. The rising cost of land and pressure on land supply have helped to fuel the increased cost of building homes, but what if an alternative project that worked for the benefit of the community rather than the developer could be explored?

The community of Hook Norton has a rare and unusual opportunity to participate in an affordable and imaginative housing project using a piece of land in the village owned by Cherwell District Council. The council are prepared to transfer ownership of the land to the community by forming a Community Land Trust and this could be one way of achieving affordability, as the value of the land and developer's high profit margin would be removed from the cost of the homes. The proposed site does not add to the outward spread of the village but would make good use of a neglected and overgrown piece of land near to the Sports and Social Club. The site is compact and could be integrated into the surrounding neighbourhood by creative landscaping and planting.

It could be possible to design homes that foster a stronger community spirit and encourage social contact. A different way of living could be offered with access to shared spaces such as communal gardens and allotments that could enable neighbours to support each other and decrease the sense of isolation often experienced by many elderly people.

Lots of us would also welcome the chance to live in a home that has a kinder relationship to the environment with inventive use of local shared energy sources to allow communities to be more energy independent and cut costs. Renewable elements such as PV solar panels and thoughtful design and insulation could be intrinsic to the development along with low carbon transport options such as shared electric cars and E bikes included.

It's important that this community housing project really reflects local views so we will be working with an independent survey company over the coming months to find out what people would like to see the project provide for the village. Look out for our forthcoming questionnaire and pop up events but meantime please come to one of the Open Community Housing Meetings to make the most of this fantastic opportunity to deliver the kind of Community Housing the village needs and wants.

Affordable, sustainable, well designed housing can be transformative and enhance the lives and well-being of its occupants. It can make us all happy and it could start right here in Hooky."

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Writing Success at Sibford Gower Endowed Primary School

Children in Oak Class have recently completed topic work on the theme of 'The Book of Kells'. The Book of Kells is possibly the the world''s most famous medieval manuscript. It harks from the 9th century and is a richly decorated copy of the four Gospels of the life of Jesus Christ, which is on permanent display at Trinity College, University of Dublin.

Oak Class teacher, Miss Rylance-Murdoch, entered the creative writing of some of the children into a competition organised by the College. This was an international competition, with the University receiving around 1,500 entries from the United Kingdom, Ireland and the United States. Entries were judged by the Dean of the Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Social Studies. Seven prizes were awarded in total: 1 st , 2 nd and 5 merit prizes.

During the Christmas holiday, we were delighted to receive an email from the University, as follows:

"We were astounded with the number of entries we received, and also with the level of talent that was shown by all entrants in both writing and art categories, from primary right up to adult....I am delighted to inform you that your student's entry was selected as the winner of the merit prize in the primary category."

The winning pupil was Nettie Parish (Y5), who flew out to Dublin with her father on 17 th January to attend the prize giving ceremony. Nettie is both talented and very hard-working and this is a really impressive, and well-deserved, achievement. We are all incredibly proud of her.

Nettie's winning entry begins:

It's nearly 3 months since we left Ace Cafe London Ltd and 4000 miles later we've stopped off at another, very different Ace!

7th January

180 miles today from Aswan to Abu Simbel - straight through the desert. It's an absolutely incredible environment to drive through - exactly how you'd expect it - super intense sun and a silly amount of sand.

We're just chucking our sleeping bags out under the stars in the temple car park tonight. It's right next to the police station so super safe and a cool spot!

8th January

We're in Sudan! We spent 6 hours at the border today, going through seemingly endless processes but we finally made it to Wadi Halfa. It's not far to travel at all. We had a lovely hour long boat trip across Lake Nasser before a cheeky 50k drive through the desert to Wadi Halfa. Around 30k in to the desert, you hit the border and the fun starts. It was a ridiculous day but now we're free to explore Sudan.

9th January

Finally heading off to Khartoum. We've had some advice to put the spot tracker on a delay as the odd crook has been known to use them to nick your stuff, we haven't worked out how to do it yet and seeing as we're going to be in the middle of nowhere for the next few days we really need to keep hold of our kit. So we won't be using the tracking function - should be in Khartoum on Friday, latest Saturday.



In Your Garden - February

I hope you have all had a lovely quiet time by the fire, and have been browsing the seed catalogues for inspiration - and this year your garden will be more beautiful than ever. Lets start in the greenhouse:-

1.Fuschias can be cut back and repotted; increase watering gradually. And the same goes for geraniums.

2. You cant have too many sweet peas. Start sowing some now, in the warmth, and put them out in a cold frame pinching out the tips, when they have 3 or 4 leaves.

3.If cyclamen have flopped and look unhealthy, carefully knock them out of their pots and search for little white grubs. These are vine weevils, and you must squeeze them in your fingers for a satisfying squidge and kill them all. 4.As soon as the snowdrops have finished they can be divided and replanted. or give some away to your friends.

5.Its time to prune the wisteria back to 2 or 3 buds. Don't fall off the ladder. 6.Evergreen hedges should be pruned back now before the birds start nesting in them.

7.Cut dead or spotted leaves off the hellebores - you can see the flowers so much better.

8. Inspect stored dahlia tubers, and chuck out any going soggy.

9.Its a good time to plant trees, hedges, shrubs and climbers now. Avoid planting roses where one has been before.

10.Feeling strong? Prepare vegetable beds and dig in compost, and prune your apple and pear trees and watch out for moles - this is when they start mating and dig up your lawns, and did you remember to get the lawn mower serviced? Don't foget to keep feeding the birds!

Spinach & Ricotta Cannelloni

Ingredients

400g spinach
Extra-virgin olive oil
1/4tsp ground nutmeg
1 onion, diced
2 cloves of garlic, crushed
2 x 400g tins of chopped tomatoes
1 bay leaf

1 bunch basil Grated zest of 1/2 lemon 250g ricotta cheese 1 free-range egg, beaten 2 tsp grated parmesan 150g cannelloni (about 14 tubes) 2 x 125g mozzarella balls, sliced

- 1.Preheat the oven to 180C. Put the spinach and a drizzle of olive oil in a large pan over a low heat. Add the nutmeg, season with salt & pepper, cover and leave to sweat. Stir occasionally until the spinach has cooked down. Place in a bowl and set to one side to cool a little.
- 2.In the same pan, heat a dripzle of olive oil and gently sweat the onion until soft. Add the garlic, tomatoes, bay leaf, a few basil leaves and lemon zest and let it gently simmer for 20 mins until the sauce has thickened. Season with salt and pepper.
- 3.Squeeze the moisture out of the spinach into the bowl. Place the spinach on a board so you can chop it up. Return the spinach to the liquid in the bowl and stir in the ricotta, beaten egg and parmesan. Season to taste.
- 4.Pipe the spinach mixture into the cannelloni tubes and lay them in a 20cm x 25cm oven dish.
- 5.Spread the tomato sauce over the cannelloni. Scatter over most of the basil, lay the mozzarella slices on top, drizzle with olive oil and season. Place in the oven and cook for 35-40 mins or until the top is golden and the pasta is tender (if the top browns too fast, cover the dish with foil). Remove from the oven and let it sand for a few minutes before serving with the remaining basil

Serve with a crisp green salad and home-made bread!


Any medium-bodied red, but top of my list are Valpolicella or Primitivo from Italy, Aregentinian Malbec or for something different - try a Californian Zinfandel
