NATURE NOTES

Caroline Long saw her first May Bug or Cockchafer on 14th May. These large insects are not as common as they used to be and are normally seen when they are attracted by house lights.

Sue Etherington-Smith came across a deer with its fawn on the track between Field Barn and the Sibford School pond. The deer ran off but the fawn laid in the grass enabling her to get a photo of it.

I think that Tree Creepers may have nested in the Sibford School round house. They were certainly flying back and forwards between the nearby Larch tree trunks and the round house. Not surprisingly round houses don't seem to be listed as nest sites by the BTO or RSPB! The birds normally nest under pieces of bark peeling off from tree trunks and attempts have been made to design nest boxes to provide similar conditions.

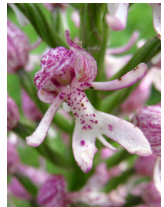
It is good to see the House Martins back at the end of the Sibford School swimming pool once again. This year they are not lacking in mud to repair or build their nests.

Within days of adding sunflower kernels to the foods on offer to the birds in the garden, Goldfinches and Bullfinches have become frequent visitors to the bird feeders.

We have seen several Orange-tip butterfly caterpillars feeding on the developing seed pods of Jack-by-the-hedge. One per plant as they are cannibalistic.

Going further afield we visited Hartslock nature reserve near Goring where the very rare Lady and Monkey Orchids grow and also a hybrid between the two species. It is certainly worth a visit in late May or early June to see these spectacular flowers.

This is how Her Majesty's Inspector, Sue Cox, described our wonderful school following our recent Ofsted inspection.

She went on to say, "Relationships are warm. Pupils are considerate and well-mannered towards adults and each other, and their behaviour is good. They speak with pride about their school and personal achievements... Pupils spoken to during the inspection feel safe and are confident that any worries are quickly dealt with by their teachers."

Things continue at their usual busy pace here. Upper school is often alive with the sound of singing (and the occasional cockney accent!) as the older children prepare for their summer performance of 'Mary Poppins' which will take place in our local Village Hall.

Sports Day is just around the corner and we are looking forward to the installation of our new circuit and play equipment on the mini-field. Children and staff are making the most of the fine weather to be out and about in the school grounds. We recently initiated the Daily Mile during our annual Healthy Week for all of our children, from Reception up to Year 6. The children really enjoyed this. It was lovely to see them encouraging each other to keep on going and they impressed themselves with the improvement they could see in their running stamina after just five days.

Our younger children have recently visited the Cotswold Wildlife Park and have been doing lots of learning activities linked to this as part of their Animal Magic topic. This was also another great opportunity to invite parent volunteers into school as part of our work, in partnership with them, to provide the rich and varied learning opportunities that our children enjoy and that make our school the exceptional place that it is.

In addition to the recognition by Ofsted of all the good work we do at school, the formidable writing ability of many of our older children was recognised at the recent Deddington Literary Festival. Climbing Everest one step at a time

Pupils and friends of Sibford School took on a race to the summit of Mount Everest.

For one week, at the start of PE lessons, pupils took part in a one minute step activity as part of their warm ups.

And on Saturday 16 June, at the school's annual Open Day, they successfully completed the 58,070 steps required to cover 8,848 metres ... the height of Mount Everest.

The sponsored Everest Challenge is one of a number of events that have been undertaken by the school to help fund a new climbing wall.



Sibford Head Toby Spence said: "We are very excited about the climbing wall which will be coming to Sibford in September 2018. We are very fortunate that our parent association is jointly funding

this exciting venture alongside school funds.

"However, the Everest Challenge was a chance for the whole school community to get involved with the fund raising. Successfully completing 58,070 steps in just a week was no mean feat. We entered Saturday with 1,936 steps still to complete but, thanks to support from parents, friends and even old scholars, we were able to reach the summit of Everest during our Open Day celebrations."

SUE SABIN

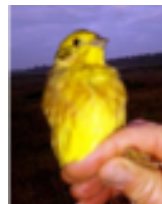
Twenty eight years ago, I arrived in the Sibford area, teaching at Swalcliffe Park School, playing around with microlights and living as a lodger with Tony Sabin at Leys Farm. Within five blissfully happy years, Tony and I had married and produced four wonderful children.

I first started teaching at Sibford School, I'm guessing, around 2001, and now teach in the Support For Learning department. I have lived at The Brambles bungalow in Woodway Road for almost eight years and throughout that time have been both inspired and supported and by Bill Crabtree. Some big changes have taken place during that time, the most noticeable, the children have left and the animals have arrived!

Bird Ringing

For the past 6 years I have been involved with the Banbury Ornithological Society and have trained and qualified as a bird ringer. My

bird knowledge has gone from zero to 'not bad, still a lot to learn', but I find the study of birds and in particular, handling them, completely fascinating. I ring as often as I can, on the BOS reserves, all within about 5 miles of Sibford. In early August, I will join a team of bird ringers giving a demonstration at the Countryfile Live event at Blenheim Palace and for the third year, I'm off to Lundy Island in September to ring, mainly migrants, to add to the scientific data already amassed there.



Smallholding

Finally, after being inspired by John Seymour, many many years ago, I am lucky enough to venture into the world of self-sufficiency. A realist or a dreamer...? Not sure which I am...perhaps a bit of both as I'm living the dream, but balance my time with a super job at Sibford School.

Pigs

The pigs arrived last October; Esme O'Brien and Peaches Malone (the boss), as ten week old weaners. They are Oxford Sandy and Blacks, a rare local breed, hardy and well natured. The job of these pigs is to eat up vegetable surplus, clear and fertilize the ground, and produce piglets that will be managed for pork. I am currently discovering the tricky process of AI, but when it's successful, a first litter of 8-10, around late autumn will be very welcome. Esme and Peaches have a life of pig luxury; wallowing in mud may not be your cup of tea but these pigs love it and seem generally happy and content.



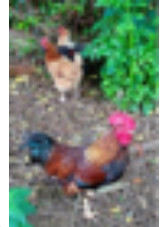

Chickens

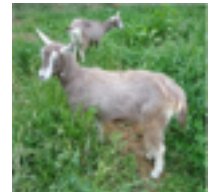
The flock started with two Black Rock point of lay pullets and four rescue hens. Pete Simpson then gave me a handsome cockerel and the family grows steadily using a small incubator. Currently I have 9 laying hens, 3 pullets and 4 just hatched chicks. The ex-battery hens are still laying well 16 months after they were saved from slaughter. Cockerel chicks find their way to the plate at around 6 months old (realist) and the girls spend their days in a large open run, eating, scratching about, preening, bathing and laying eggs. To avoid the fox, they are all kept close to the house behind an electric fence and always shut up at night. I would like a 'chickenopolous', River Cottage style housing system so that they can roost and rise as they choose but that's for the future (dreamer).



Goats

I have eggs, meat, vegetables...now I need milk. Goat's milk tastes lovely, makes beautiful cheese, has less sugar, more Vitamin A and B6, potassium and anything else I can think up to argue the case for getting

goats. Rosie and Sofie are 15 month old sisters born to a pure-bred herd of rare breed Toggenburgs; although originating in Switzerland, are a recognised British goat breed. Tony and Tom, have built them a wonderful home with an impregnable fence (dreamer) and a massive felled tree for their love of climbing. They are very inquisitive, love attention and they too will produce young. Their kids will hopefully arrive next spring and then the work to make milk and cheese will begin. The kids will very likely be reared and sold on (realist), leaving the goatlings (first kidders) to produce milk for up to two years before being rested and mated again. Bill and I will be taking Rosie and Sofie and the best of his prize winning Hebridean Sheep to Moreton-in-Marsh show in September.



The smallholding is not a money-making venture; it is a way of life. There will be produce to sell for sure but as I discovered when rearing turkeys for Christmas with Tony in the past; it is hard work to break even, let alone make any profit.

I have been encouraged and helped by my friends in the village. Joanna Gilkes, Karen Heron, Pete Simpson and my family who step in to farm-sit when I am away, and for that I am very grateful.

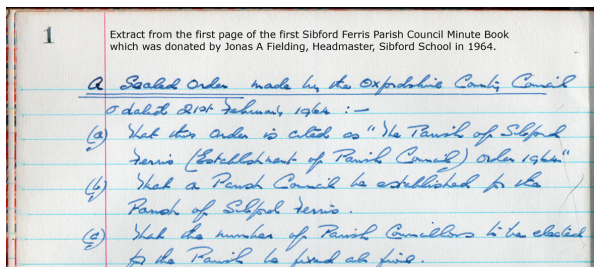
The formation of Parish Councils

Civil parish councils were formed in England under the reforming Local Government Act 1894 to take over local oversight of civic duties in rural towns and villages. The act created two new types of local authority, parish councils and rural district councils to rationalise the large number of bodies which existed for a variety of activities such as public health, secular burials, water supply and drainage. It also finally removed secular duties from the local Vestry committees and gave them to the new parish councils.

Prior to 1894 both Sibford Gower and Sibford Ferris had separate Vestry meetings which were held at least once every year. Following the Local Government Act of 1894 Sibford Gower and Burdrop accepted a sealed order from the County Council to form a Parish Council comprising five elected Parish Councillors. The Parish Council for Sibford Gower and Burdrop celebrated its centenary in 1994 by holding a party in the Village Hall when the original Minute Book was displayed having been borrowed for the occasion from the Oxford Records Office.

Sibford Ferris however did not form a Parish Council at this time but continued as a Parish Meeting holding meetings as necessary but at least once a year to consider village matters. It was not until 1964 that a sealed order from Oxfordshire County Council cited the establishment of Sibford Ferris Council comprising five elected parish councillors to comply with the provisions of the Local Government Elections Act 1956. The first Chairman was Mr E C Flinn with Miss A Viney and Messrs JW Canning, A B Horn and J A Fielding serving as the remaining new parish councillors.

Councillors from both Parish Councils continue to serve their communities in a voluntary capacity and Minutes of their meetings are recorded on the village website: thesibfords.org.uk

In Your Garden - July

1. July is the last month to sow veggies, but if you are quick you can sow beetroot, carrots, lettuce and spinach to eat during the winter. Don't forget to eat your courgettes whilst they are small, otherwise you'll get monstrous marrows - too boring to eat.
2. If you have a greenhouse, keep turning plants around to prevent one-sided growth. Take cuttings now of fuschias and pelargoniums. If you have nothing else to do you can also sow seeds of primulas for flowering next spring!
3. Daffs and hyacinths can be lifted, and dried under cover. Throw out any rotten ones, and store the best ones in an airy shed. I hang mine up in those nets that oranges come in. It keeps them dry and away from mice.
4. Pinch out the growing tips of dahlias to encourage side growth, and tie the plants in to a supporting stake.
5. Keep deadheading the roses, except for some of the once-flowering shrub roses, which have stunning hips for autumn decoration.
6. I have been sowing seeds of biennials for next year - hollyhocks and white foxgloves. I need some height at the back of the borders in my new garden. They will be planted out into the veg patch to grow on - that is if the cats next door don't keep scratching them up and ing there. I've bought a Kalashnikof water pistol!

7. After delphiniums have flowered, cut them right back to about 4 inches - it may feel very severe, but feed and water and they will come again.
 8. You can take cuttings from pinks now. Choose a non-flowering shoot, pull it gently away from the parent plant, with a bit of bark attached. Trim off some lower leaves and plant in sandy/gritty compost. They take quite easily.
 9. Arrange some care for watering your garden when you are away. Sibford is such a friendly village with nice neighbours, that I know you will all help each other.
- 10...You can leave pot plants in a tray of water in the shade, and to avoid dehydration all around, a jug of Pimms helps everyone to flower better. Have a good holiday!

In Your Garden - August

1. Plants may be very dry by now, so keep watering and continue to deadhead.
 2. If the lawn has grown too long whilst you were away, give it a light cut, with the blades raised. Hebes and lavender need a light pruning when the flowers are over.
 3. Hedges can be pruned now the bird nesting season is over. You can prune berberis, photinia, escallonia, privet and box now. If you need to plant a new hedge, it is better to wait until September through to March, and buy bare rooted plants. And they are cheaper.
 4. Rambling and climbing roses that are not repeat flowering can be lightly pruned and tidied up now.
 5. Go round the garden and collect seeds. I especially like to collect my old varieties of sweet peas, and cerinthe. Nigella and aquilegias will have scattered themselves all over the garden by now. Just enjoy them.
 6. Pick the last of the strawberries, and pot up some runners if you need some new plants for next year. Or give some away.
 7. Irises that have got too crowded can be split up and divided now. Cut the new rhizomes away from the tired old centre, plant shallowly, and trim the leaves back, cutting them on an angle from the side to the centre.
 8. Bulbs can be planted now - colchicums, daffs, Madonna lilies, and prepared hyacinths and narcissus should be planted now if you want them out for December, and plunged outdoors, or at least covered up with black plastic till they peep through. Must admit, I never get mine flowering in time for Christmas!
 9. Hardy geraniums that have worked hard all summer can be cut back, watered, and that will encourage some new growth.
10. Oh No! Its time to get the ladder out again, and prune all the long wispy straggly bits off the wisteria. Leave the big chop for February. He will need encouraging. Have a nice time making jam and chutney.
