THE GREAT NORTH RUN....

SUNDAY, THE 9TH SEPTEMBER 2018

My daughter Suzie Taylor and I would like to thank our friends and neighbours in the villages who kindly supported our participation in the Great North Run. A significant sum was raised for the charity SCOPE.

Another wonderful day, large crowds on the 13 mile course, bands at every mile point, weather fine, a little warm, the shower facilities were most welcome over the last 3 miles and a magnificent display by the Red Arrows over the Tyne Bridge and at the finish at South Shields.

Suzie and I completed the course in 2H 9M and 32S, we crossed the line together but were separated by 9 places such was the volume of traffic, Suzie in 13,056 place and Dad 13,065. Just under 44,000 runners safely reaching the finish line. Although our time was a little slower than in 2017, the elderly gentleman was pleased to learn that he had finished 19th in his age group and both Suzie and I had achieved a Bronze rating for our performance.

Within seconds of the start, we crossed the official line over 21 minutes behind Sir Mo, we were picked up on BBC TV and Suzie's mobile was showing an image of her setting her watch as friends and relatives responded to the sighting. Each runner has a "chip" to record our start and finish time with further details available at 5K, 10K and 15K. A superbly organised event and delighted to have completed 33.

What next ?, We will continue our regular 5K Saturday Park Run in Spiceball Park and look forward to the Christmas Canter in and around Hook Norton in December. In the longer term Suzie and i are looking forward to 2020 when my son Jon and Suzie's son, Henry, who will make his debut, will compete as "The Three Generation's Team".

NATURE NOTES

Having spotted either a ferret or a polecat recently I tried to find out a bit more about them. It seems that they are almost impossible to tell apart when spotted in the wild. Ferrets are basically domesticated polecats and the two are able to reproduce and produce fertile offspring. Escaped ferrets have bred with wild polecats throughout Britain. Recent genetic studies have indicated that Oxfordshire may have one of the most pure remaining populations of wild polecats.

I have noticed that this year many of the oak trees around the Sibfords have almost all of their acorns parasitised by the tiny wasp that cause the acorns to develop into Knopper galls. These highly distorted acorns were not seen in Britain until the 1960s and since then have spread throughout the country. What I find surprising is that in order to complete their life-cycle the wasps also require trees of the Turkey Oak. I do not know where the nearest Turkey Oaks are to here but they are certainly not common in the area.

During July and August I was aware that Large White butterflies were laying thousands of eggs on my brassica plants. As I am reluctant to use insecticides I usually spend a considerable time squashing the caterpillars by hand once they have hatched. However, this year when I went to carry out this unpleasant task I found that the plants were covered in wasps and there was not a single caterpillar in sight. I am fairly sure that the wasps were responsible for removing the caterpillars. This is perhaps a good reason to be more tolerant of wasps. I am aware that there are situations in which wasp nests have to be destroyed but maybe sometimes they can be left alone.

SIBFORD GOWER PARISH COUNCIL

The Gower Council report of the meeting at the Village Primary School on Monday, 17th September, 2018. *A personal note from Hugh Pidgeon, Chairman of the new Parish Council*

Well not so much a report as a sketch! The full minutes will be appearing on the Sibfords website over the next couple of weeks.....

Thank you to all of you who joined us on September 17th for making it such an entirely delightful and convivial evening. As much as anything else, I enjoyed looking round the room filled with close on 40 people still in clusters and small groups talking long after the meeting itself had closed! This is so very much what all of us on the Council had always hoped to see: members of the community meeting each other, talking about matters of importance to them and through all that informing us as councillors in the decisions we needed to take over the coming months.

The reflections and conversations through the meeting covered a wide range of topics from the provision of a defibrillator for the village, to the ongoing maintenance of the Millennium Field, to contentious footpaths and controversial developments – in this case, at the crossroads in the very heart of the village – and whether we might transform the Annual Parish Meeting next summer into a celebration of the community itself, involving both Parishes and showcasing some of the many activities, organisations, clubs and societies that have brought such life to our village. We honoured Peter Hardman stepping down as our clerk, welcomed Vanessa Mulley as our new clerk and confirmed Trina Crilley as our new 5th Councillor!

Most heartening of all for us was the way in which so many of the exchanges concluded with clear indications of support and offers of help. Richard Irons got the support he needed to create a working group to look into the options the Council might have to properly address the speeding issues that disturb two areas of the village in particular. John Wass, who joined us a guest from the Ferris council is to join forces with Trina Crilley similarly to investigate the options involved in acquiring a defibrillator. Tony Skowronski has his working party set up to make light work of tidying the Millennium Field. I read out part of a letter I had received from Andrew Finding who spoke of how warmly welcomed he and his wife Josephine had felt by the community and saying they would be delighted to show the site to anyone concerned about the positioning of the footpath route alteration in the field next to their new home at Haynes Barn. The controversial development in question is the sale of Mawles Barn and the plots of land that adjoin Pound Lane and run behind the housing along the Main Street. Winning start to the term for Sibford riders

Sibford School equestrian teams got off to an impressive start at the beginning of the school year when they competed in the NSEA and Unaffiliated ODE at Swalcliffe Park Equestrian.

Riders competed in three categories ... dressage, show jumping (over 80cm, 90cm or 100cm jumps) and cross country.

DID YOU KNOW?



Banbury Michaelmas Fair



King Henry II (1133-1189) granted a Charter to Banbury to hold a Fair over the Whitsun weekend. In 1329 Bishop Henry of Lincoln petitioned King Edward II for an extension to the Charter to hold two eight-day fairs annually in Banbury. The first started on Ascension Day and the second started on the Thursday after Whitsun.

By the 19th century the Michaelmas Fair was instituted which combined all fairs into one held annually in October. By this time the fair had three main functions:

- Sale of livestock – the Business Fair
- Hiring of Servants – the Statute Fair
- Enjoyment of sideshows – the Pleasure Fair

By tradition Banbury Fair had always been a hiring Mop and Joshua Lamb writing in 1937 and reflecting on 70 years of Country Life records a time in the mid 1800's when his grandfather recalled:

“The mention of Parson’s Street calls to mind how at the time of Michaelmas Fair that thoroughfare used to be crowded with young men and maidens seeking situations, and with Masters and Mistresses in quest of Carters, Shepherds and Dairy Maids. The Register Office and Labour Exchange were as yet unknown and this hiring business was transacted almost exclusively there: intending shepherds wore a bit of wool in their hats while the carters were recognised by a twist of whipcord.



DID YOU KNOW?

Families were usually much larger than is the case now, and the young men as well as their sisters were glad to get away from home for a change and take situations in other villages, and they were often hired at these fairs to attend to matters about the house, and would lodge and board with their masters and lasting friendships WERE sometimes made...

An amusing incident occurred between one of our ancestors and a hired employee who, on completing his first year of service wished to make a change, and to his master's enquiry as to why he wanted to leave replied that "the bacon was too fat". Sometime afterwards the same person applied to be reinstated, but our grandfather told him that the bacon was as fat as ever. His reply to this being, "I have learned to bread it well, Master." He had evidently in the meantime been where scarcity was the main difficulty."

By the end of the 19th century these practices were described as having 'the character of an Alexandrian slave market' and the advent of Labour Exchanges and the increased use of newspaper advertising for the hiring of staff were welcomed.

The Charter remains in place and Banbury still hold a Michaelmas Fair in October each year.

In Your Garden - October

1. This is a good time to plant trees and hedges, and you can move shrubs and perennials too, but remember to water them frequently.
2. Wallflowers and primulas are on sale now, so brighten up your front doors, and porches, with pots to add colour as the days get darker.
3. Colchicums are flowering now in my garden, and nerines are about to burst into colour. My schizostylis should be looking gorgeous too, but I don't think they liked being moved to a new garden, and are sulking. Ah well! There is always next year. But autumn flowering bulbs are great to boost up the colours, just when everything else is fading. So try ordering some.
4. Just a reminder...have you ordered your spring bulbs yet? Don't plant the tulips until November.
5. Tender plants will need to be moved to a sheltered porch or a greenhouse before the frosts arrive, and potatoes should be lifted before the slugs ruin them.
6. Lawns are going to need some TLC after this scorching summer; scarify and treat them to a weed and feed fertiliser.
7. Dahlias will be blackened by the first frost, so then cut them down and lift very carefully, trying not to damage the tubers, and store in a frost free place. Or you can leave them in the ground, and pile more compost and straw or bracken, to help protect them from freezing.
8. Fleshy leaved alpiners – auriculas, echeverias, aeoniums etc that have been outside in pots, need to be kept absolutely dry and frost free in the winter. Under the staging will do nicely, but do keep them dry.
9. Now is the time to top dress the borders with compost, manure, leafmould – whatever you've got – the soil will be tired, and like us gardeners will need reviving with a tonic. Is it drinkies time yet?
10. I hate to mention it, but you really can't put off cleaning out the greenhouse, and if you need to help keep it from freezing, line it with bubble-wrap. It does work, but, my goodness, its a fiddly job, and can lead to marital disharmony rather easily. Men find bubblewrap and cling film rather difficult to handle.
