NATURE NOTES

Like February March ended with a spell of sunny weather. This brought out the next flush of Spring flowers including Red Campion, Ground Ivy and Bluebells.

It is certainly worth a visit to Whichford Woods to see the Bluebells once they are in full bloom (late April/early May).

Even closer to home there is a nice patch of Shining Crane's-bill on the verge of the road between the Gower and Ferris. It is very pretty and is sometimes grown as a garden plant although it is classed as a noxious weed in some states of America.

Joanne Gilkes spotted a male Orange-tip butterfly on 31st March.

In sunny weather mining bees seem to have been particularly active this year including a very small species called the Common Mini-miner (there has got to be a joke there somewhere!).

The Starlings around the Sibford school playing fields have learnt to imitate both the building alarms and a referee's whistle.

I was pleased to add a Dotted Chestnut moth to my garden list. Although still classed as nationally scarce it is a species that is spreading. The caterpillars feed on apple leaves including dead leaves on the ground – a good reason not to be too tidy in the garden.



Bill Crabtree has requested on behalf of local beekeepers that people should keep watch for Asian or Yellow-legged Hornets. They are highly aggressive predators of honey bees and native insects. The abdomen is brown with a single yellow segment unlike the native Hornet which has a yellow abdomen with brown markings. If spotted a photo should be sent to <u>alertnonnative@ceh.ac.uk</u>.



SIBFORDS SOCIETY

After our brief AGM on 21st March, Keith Hicks began his lively and informative talk on the' History of Sibford Village Hall 'with a poem by Frank Lascelles, pageant master, who lived in the Manor House and provided a large wooden hut that was used as a village hall between 1919 -47. Prior to this, events had been held in the Village School and also in the dining room of the Friends School. After Lascelle's death it was discovered that his estate, including the hut, was heavily mortgaged, and could not be saved. There were many meetings and fund raising events and eventually the present hall was built and opened in 1957. In 1999 the new extension was added and finished in 2001.In 2016 the hall was treated to a makeover and opened by Banbury MP Victoria Prentis in 2017. It continues to be the hub for our communal activities.

On Thursday 16th May Dr Gillian White will be talking about 'Queen Victoria – a Life in Portraits', perfect timing as Victoria would have been 200 on 24th May .We see" a winsome toddler develop into the soul of a nation".

PLANT SALE

In Your Garden - May

 If you planted your veggies inside, start hardening them off. Put them to stand outside during the day, but remember to bring them in at night, until all danger of frosts is over. If you have a greenhouse, you can now start planting seeds of courgettes, sweetcorn, and beans. Your new potatoes might be ready to earth up, and you can still plant another row - it's not too late.
 If you hurry up you can still divide perennial plants, such as aster,

sedums, agapanthus and crocosmia, to make more plants.

3. Now is a good time to plant strawberry runners. They like a warm spot (who doesn't) and are easy to grow in a raised bed, and that makes it easier to put netting over them. Surround the plants with hay or straw, which lifts the fruit off the ground, and away from the slugs.

4. Time to give the roses some TLC. Scatter some granular rose fertiliser around them, and spray at once is you see greenfly or leaf spot.

5. Try and find room for a picking border. You can sow hardy annuals, poppies, nigella, cerinthe, marigolds, larkspur, nasturtiums, and have a blaze of colour to pick when you want.

6. As the daffodils are fading, cut off their heads, but leave the leaves to die back and feed the bulbs. Do not tie them into neat little bundles. You can lift and divide large clumps of bulbs now.

7. Garden centres are stuffed with tempting plants. One of my favourites is bellis perennis - jolly little fat daisies -, and they look great lining a path. They will flower from May to October if you remember to dead head them regularly.

8. The lawn needs mowing every week now, and keeping the edges trimmed makes a huge difference. We are just waiting for the frosts to finish, and then we can put down moss killer - half our lawn is shady, and it gets full of moss. Nice and bouncy to walk on with bare feed though!

Rambling roses are on the ramble again. Tie them in, and shorten if necessary. They're a bit like naughty dogs, or errant husbands. Be firm.
 And it's time to sow herbs in pots, and put them in a sunny place near the back door, or on the kitchen window sill. Basil and coriander are always needed. Mint can go in the shade, and is best in a large pot, as it likes to ramble as well. Rosemary is so beautiful I have mine in the flower bed.


