### NATURE NOTES

#### June 2019

The first half of May was certainly cooler and with less sunshine than would be expected for the time of year which may have had an effect on the local wildlife.

Despite this several people have commented on the large number of Orange-tip butterflies that have been seen this year. Ann Bishop also reported seeing a Holly Blue butterfly on 3<sup>rd</sup> May. These are the most likely of the blue butterflies to be observed in gardens. The spring generation lay their eggs on holly (female holly trees only) and other flowering shrubs where the caterpillars will eat the developing flowers and berries. The second generation of adults that appear in late summer lay their eggs on ivy.

Iain Brown drew my attention to the sighting of a Red-rumped Swallow at Grimsbury reservoir in Banbury. This was the first sighting of this species ever in this area. Nationally it is a rarity with only 500 sightings in the last 70 years.

A pair of Bullfinches are now frequent visitors to our garden bird feeders. Like the Goldfinches they seem to be particularly keen on sunflower kernels. In addition to the usual birds we have also seen a blackcap in the garden on a couple of occasions.

The highlight of the past month for me was catching a Silver Cloud moth in my garden moth trap. This was the first time this species has been recorded in Oxfordshire. They are very scarce nationally and are mostly confined to the Severn valley although a few have been recorded from Warwickshire.

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# NEWS FROM SIBFORD GOWER ENDOWED PRIMARY SCHOOL

Although preparation for the national SATs has been a focus for a number of our children this half term, we have still found the time to have fun in our learning.

Our younger children are exploring the theme of 'mini-beasts' (small invertebrates such as snails, slugs, beetles, centipedes, worms, earwigs, caterpillars). The learning in school has inspired some of the children to be creative on the same theme at home, including Sholto making a 'Grand Bugapest Hotel' for the minibeasts that live in his garden!

Our beautiful grounds and natural areas provide wonderful habitats for all sorts of wildlife. The love and respect for nature that our focus on outdoor learning inspires in our children, combined with our lessons and assemblies exploring global matters, means that many of our children have a keen interest in current affairs linked to ecology and care for the environment. Some of our KS2 children have independently set up a group focusing on the key environmental issue of plastic pollution. 'Octopus Power' is intent on reducing the plastic pollution in our local environment by promoting plastic free packaging for snacks in school but also by collecting any plastic wrappings that do come into school to recycle into a plastic bench. Our own Mrs Williams is supporting with this project which fits in with the bigger picture intention Octopus Power has of trying to reduce the plastic in our seas. Their current strapline is, "Remember, a little bit of plastic can go a long way"

There were a number of stalls at the recent Sibfords Parish Meeting that linked to environmental matters. A group of our children attended this event on a more light-hearted note though. Valerie Vet, our wonderful peripatetic singing teacher, was joined by a choir of our pupils who performed to the audience in a packed Village Hall.

As always, our children were exemplary in their behaviour and attitude and they sang beautifully – what wonderful ambassadors for our school!

Henry and Dominic completed their walk at 10pm on Sunday 7 April after setting off from Bath Abbey in the early hours of Saturday morning.


Dominic said 'The walk was great but very tough. We did end up having to sleep, but only for 2 hours from 5am until 7am. In total we walked for 37 hours.'

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
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### FRIENDSHIP CLUB

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# 6 SIMPLE STEPS TO TRANSFORMING OUR VILLAGE POND INTO A HAVEN FOR WILDLIFE

- 1. Relocating the fish to a nearby lake is the first step to creating a natural, more balanced environment in our pond. Currently, the fish are adding to high levels of nitrate and phosphate in the pond (through their waste) and this is one of the main causes of the unsightly, suffocating algal blooms. They also stir up the sediment (further affecting water quality) and uproot plants, while the large size and number of fish in the pond means very little native invertebrate life survives.
- 2. Once the fish have been removed, native plants such as hornwort, marsh marigold, soft rush and pendulous sedge can be established. These will not only start to get the pond's nitrogen cycle functioning better (reducing and then hopefully eliminating the dreaded algal blooms), but they will also create wildlife-friendly habitats and add year-round interest and splashes of colour. Because the pond is so shallow and heats up quickly in summer (another factor accelerating algal growth) the new pond planting will shade the water and keep it cool.
- 3. The pond used to teem with frogs and newts. Removing predatory fish will help, but we can also add amphibian-friendly features to the pond. For example, by creating one or two small rock piles against the pond wall, frogs will be able to gain easier access when they return to spawn in the spring. Establishing plants around the pond's margins will also provide much needed shelter.
- 4. The pond shouldn't be viewed in isolation. The surrounding area is equally important to wildlife. The grass bank on the far side of the pond could be managed as a 'mini nature reserve', full of pollinator-friendly wildflowers like cowslip and ox-eye daisy. A woodpile would be used by hibernating amphibians, while native shrubs (like *Viburnum opulus*) would attract birds and insects. It's crucial that this area runs right up to the pond's edge and is left undisturbed.
- 5. Of course, the pond should also be 'people friendly'. Although the wildflower meadow should be managed for wildlife, other areas should provide access for pond dipping or for simply enjoying the view of the pond. The planting plan for the pond has been designed with this in mind. For example, standing by the roadside, pendulous sedges frame your view across clear water (with reflections of the sky), to the meadow beyond, while the new Viburnum shrubs integrate the pond more naturally into its surroundings.

6. We should quickly notice an improvement in water quality once the fish have been removed. However, the success of a wildlife pond essentially relies on it being left alone to naturally evolve through various stages of succession. Emptying and cleaning the pond at regular intervals is a recipe for disaster, destroying the invertebrate-rich, silty habitat on the pond bottom and upsetting the pond's delicate balance. Patience and subtle maintenance (such as occasional pruning of submerged oxygenating plants to maintain areas of open water) could reward us with a healthy, varied and beautiful pond that's teeming with frogs, dragonfly larvae, water beetles and pond skaters.

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# HORTI SOCIETY

Robert Longstaff Of The Oxford Project came back to talk to us on May 8th Here are some of his observations and tips...

Use companion planting. Alliums tend to mask the scent of carrots from carrot fly. Camomile is in flower in late May and is good for pollinators. It is an ideal companion plant. Weak camomile tea helps damping off as it is a mild antiseptic.

Robert uses a no dig method of gardening (yes!) The top 2" of soil holds 80% of microbes, bacteria etc. and very few veg. plants have roots that go down further than 12". So double digging is the last thing you should be doing. Feed the soil naturally with compost. Compaction harms the fungal hyphae vital for root health, so walk on the beds as little as possible.

Include Citrus, rhubarb leaves and onions in a compost heap, but not whole potatoes. Chop them up first. Add perennial weeds as long as you burn them or drown them for a few weeks first until they are slimy. The best ally in your garden is the worm, but don't put earthworms in your compost. They will die of heat and are different from composting worms. Keep your compost fairly wet and add urine to the heap. (Nice touch Robert).

And lastly, because let's not end on a sour note, if you see a weed, hoe it off and never let weeds seed.

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# In Your Garden - June

# At last! It is June, and the garden is bursting with colour, with the extra light and warmth of the sun!

But it means the weeds will sprout up with renewed vigour, so keep hoeing regularly.

- 1 You can now safely plant your beans and cut-and-come-again salads. I am sowing lambs lettuce in an old piece of guttering we'll see how it goes.
- 2 If you have gaps in the border, now is the time to fill them in with annuals. Try cosmos, and nicotiana. The tall white nicsylvestris is great at the back of the border. I am planting mine with some tall apricot foxgloves.
- 3. Roses are coming in to bloom, so watch out for greenfly, and pick off any leaves with first signs of black spot. You can use a spray to get rid of both of these. Companion plants for roses that always look good are nepeta (cat mint), and lavender. They compliment each other.
- 4. Delphiniums are leaping ahead, so make sure they are firmly staked, and do other tall perennials as well. Pea sticks work well for this.
- 5. When the spring flowering shrubs have finished flowering, they should be pruned straight away, e.g.Deutzia, Philadelphus and Weigelia, so that the new flowering growth has time to mature.
- 6. Keep tying in climbing and rambling roses, and help the clematis and sweet peas to fasten on to their fences and walls.
- 7. If you planted new trees and shrubs in the spring, make sure they are well watered until they have established good roots.
- 8. Now is a good time to take cuttings of fuschias, hydrangeas, philadelphus and spirea. And you could try layering philadelphus, wisteria and lonicera.
- 9. If you have hanging baskets, try and fix up a hosepipe that can water them for you it is so exhausting trying to reach up with a watering can. Better to lift them down and stand them in a tray of water.
- 10. Try and visit some other gardens loads of them are open in June for the NGS, and you will gain inspiration from them. And there are often really good plants to buy, and the teas! Oh the teas! Scones with cream and jam, homemade cakes bliss.




# VILLAGE PEOPLE

For many years between the wars and until he died in 1950, Theodore Lamb lived the life of a recluse in a shack on Sibford Heath. A skilled watch and clock repairer, Theodore plied his trade around the local villages. He travelled around, sometimes on a bicycle without tyres, sometimes on foot, and usually with some form of truck loaded with junk and in the winter, his fire in a bucket as well.

He played various musical instruments and posed for photographs for which

he charged a fee of half a crown (12.5p).

He always paid for his small needs, although when his clothing, which was often made from sacks, became less than decent he was banned from Banbury and had to wait at the door of the village shop to be served. He was always totally honest and completely harmless despite his appearance.

He was an immensely strong man and once pulled a chicken hut for many miles back to Sibford taking several days over the journey. It is thought a childhood trauma may well have explained his later lonely existence.

When he was a how he saw his

When he was a boy, he saw his father fall from the chestnut tree by the

village pond when he was knocking conkers down for the boys. He broke his neck and died.

When he went up to Oxford to do his medical during the First World War, he would not say a word. They got so fed up they sent him back again, so he never went into the army.

He eventually contracted pneumonia and died, aged 70, in Banbury hospital, the nurses respecting his request not to cut his long matted hair - he said it would spoil his appearance! Money which he had entrusted to the vicar was sufficient to pay for his funeral, attended by many paying their last respects to a long-to-be-remembered Sibford character.


