

THE GARDEN IN JULY & AUGUST

Half the year is gone and it seems that Summer has not yet arrived, but nevertheless from now on the days will shorten and we should be able to reap the first crops. Although crops never catch up, good weather in July will make life more agreeable for

both plants and human beings.

egetables that can be sown until mid-August include cabbage marbinger and Early Market, and two reliable varieties of spinach, Long -standing round, and Broad-leaved prickly. Lettuce Little Gem and Avondefiance can be sown until the end of July. Carrot, Radish and turnip are worth late sowings. Have you tried growing onions from seed sown August/September? Solidity is a good variety: transplanted in Spring, they are ready to lift by June and make good, firm bulbs. If you have a taste for spring onions there is now a winter-hardy White Lisbon seed available for sowing August/September which will be ready to lift in the Spring.

July and August is of course the time to sow herbaceous plants in the nursery beds. Delphiniums and lupins make good growth, and, transplanted in Spring, will flower next Summer. Campanulas, pinks, polyanthus, poppies, physalis and primulas all benefit from a late Summer sowing to flower the following year. August is the month to think about next Winter's bulbs, those grown in pots and in the open ground. They will be on the market from middle to late August and it is best to buy early while the stock is fresh and you have a good selection.

Pot plants get rather tired by August. If the weather is good, stand them outside, not forgetting to water them, and add a few drops of liquid fertilizer to the can. If you can plunge the pots into the ground in a lightly shaded spot it will keep

the plants moist and healthy.
