THE GARDEN IN JUNE 1982

the last fortnight of May has seen a remarkable growth of plants in spite of dry weather and occasionally chilly winds and we need to keep the hoe going and prevent the weeds building up. It is still possible to get a touch of frost so don't be in too much of a hurry to plant out beginias and tender plants; geraniums can go out from midmonth onward, but meantime, encourage them to make good growth in their pots with a little liquid feed. Dahlias should be making good growth, ready to plant out by the middle of the month in rich, well manured ground. A ring of soot around the young plants will protect them from slugs which will soon become active when the showery weather arrives. Herbaceous plants need staking early in the season while the weather remains quiet. By this time we can really judge fairly what shrubs we have lost as a result of winter weather, but don't give up hope too soon, it often happens that a shrub looking completely dead still has some life at the roots. The top growth can be cut back and young green will break out from the bottom. You can sometimes judge the condition of a shrub by scrapingthe bark off with a pen knife and you may be pleasantly surprised to find that the stem below is still alive.

In the vegetable garden seeds have been slow to germinate so a thorough watering will help matters along. Maincrop tettuce sown in early June will probably see you through the summer months. Cabbages should be planted out, but there is still time to sow seed by the end of this month. Carrots, beet, turnip and kohl rabi will go well from June sowings. Celery should be planted out in trenches with good rich soil. Don't let it get dry - try to keep it growing if you want plump crisp sticks to lift in the autumn.
