

THE GARDEN IN OCTOBER

It has been a remarkable season. As if to reward us for the severe winter weather, crops have grown apace and yielded well: the potatoes have grown to a remarkable size and tomato crops have been quite exceptional. With a little luck frost may hold off for a week or two yet so we shall be able to enjoy the runner beans and dahlias a little longer.

With the ground still relatively warm and moist, don't forget the autumn sowing of lettuce, onions and spinach. Lettuce such as Winter Density, Windermere and Premiere will mature in the spring. Arctic King and Imperial Winter are hardy for wintering out of doors and produce good, tight heads in the spring. Onion Solidarity and the new winter-hardy White Lisbon can be sown now as can spinach Greenmarket.

October is the month to start cleaning up the shrub borders and t this gives an opportunity to look hard at your stock and discard any that are leggy and worn out, and consider re-aligning beds to give a better show next year. Autumn planting gets shrubs and plants off to a good start in warm ground; work in some peat when planting, but save the fresh manure to mulch the shrubs when they come into growth in the spring.

This is a good month to take cuttings of hardy shrubs when you are tidying up if you have frames or greenhouse for overwintering them. Bring out of the frames pots of cyclamen which can be started into growth; repot them if necessary, but they prefer to be underpotted, so remove the top 2"-3" of soil and replace with J.I.2, soak the plants thoroughly and put them in a light place in a warm room.
