## GARDENS AND GARDENING IN MAY

April brought us a splendid show of daffodils: on the sunny days it was heartening to look out and see the tide of gold moving through the fruit trees. But it hasn't been a kind month generally: the trees are slow to break into life while the wet cold ground has not helped seeds to germinate. Let's hope that May will bring some warm days to get things moving in time for the real June growth. May is the traditional month for planting summer-flowering bulbs and tubers. Gladioli should be in the ground early in the month, in groups of 7 or 8, 4" or 5" deep on a handful of sand. Tender tubers are best started off in boxes under glass and planted out at the end of the month, or even early June, when risk of frost has passed. Lily bulbs seem expensive but they are good value for money over their lifetime, and to buy a few each year is a good investment.

In the March issue of Scene I suggested a visit to Hidcote gardens. Opposite the driveway of Hidcote is the entrance to another worthwhile garden, KIFTSGATE. On a smaller scale than Hidcote, it offers a series of gardens with a splendid collection of trees and shrubs. The house is sited on a Knoll with the banks sloping down steeply and providing glimpses of the Vale of Evesham between the pine trees. Kiftsgate is famous for roses, ranging from the border planted with Rosa Mundi to the yellow Banksian. June is a good month to visit this garden, but when I went there this week I was greeted by a mass of daffodils at the end of the drive beside the car park, and hellebores were to be seen in their unique colours in many parts of the garden. The owner sits at the receipt of custom (admission £1) surrounded by stands of plants and shrubs for sale at very modest prices - all raised in the gardens.
