Children were a great love of his. He had four grandchildren whom he adored and they gave him great pleasure - but also all children were a joy to him and he would follow their activities with great interest. He visited the Playgroup regularly where the children all loved their 'extra special grandad'.

Whatever the weather - come rain, shine - or hail, he would be seen driving around with meals-on-wheels or helping out driving for Mrs Flinn's W.R.V.S. work when Miss Bennett was indisposed.

One of his greatest interests and pleasures was the Folk Dance group of which he had been a supporter for many years, following them to events all over the area and to the Annual Contests at the Albert Hall. He made many friends there and I am sure they will miss his smiling face around.

As a neighbour he was always available with a smile, a kind word or offer of help whenever he could, and I know Mr and Mrs Lines will sadly miss him for they have helped one another for many years. he showed the same help and kindness to young and old alike, to village people and to newcomers, setting an example to us all on how we can help one another, thus creating a happy community life for everyone. Owen will be sadly missed, and Burdrop does not seem the same without him, and the little green Morris on the green.

# CHILDREN AT RISK IN SIBFORD FERRIS

There is a dangerous 'deathtrap' corner at the end of Main Street Sibford Ferris, known as Simms Corner. The traffic flow has increased enormously over the last year - there are now more heavy lorries, many more buses and increased cars flowing constantly round this corner. Also a new development of houses and residents' parked cars adds to the congestion.

But there is also a great increase in the number of children living immediately round this area and throughout the village. Our concern is for their well-being and survival, as this corner must be crossed and passed-by many times a day:— going to school, meeting friends and going to play further afield. Must they always risk their lives in everyday activities?

Many residents of Sibford Ferris have signed a letter to the Oxfords hire County Council asking for recognition of the hazardous conditions, and therefore, traffic warnings, signs and restrictions to control the flow of traffic hare.

We must have these things with priority and prevent the tragedy we all fear.

VIGILANCE please for strange vehicles or persons in the village, around houses whose occupants are away. Thefts have been reported recently.

CONSIDERATION please when parking. Remember the people who "live down the lane" and may need emergency services any time of the day or night. Parking problems or obstructions should be taken to the owner, if known, or to the Police, so that they can take action at the time.

COMPLAINTS please to the District Council about the state of repair of village roads. Although the Parish Council have made repeated reports, any additional pressure may increase our chances of action when money for repairs is very limited.

THANKS to all those who have made a special effort over the appearance of their 'patch' this year. There's still time to sort out those oft reported 'little muddles'.

# GARDENS AND GARDENING IN JUNE

The first week of June sees a number of private gardens opening to the public in addition to the larger houses and grounds. Sunday 5th June offers an excellent selection locally between 2 and 6 pm. There is Epwell Mill, which also offers a floodlit wine and cheese party at 10 pm on July 2nd. Back on June 5th at Hook Norton, Harwood Farmhouse is open, and in Milton, there are the gardens of The Cottage and Port Cottage, while in Adderbury, the Old Mill Cottage is open that day.

Later in the month on June 18th-19th Oxhill has three gardens open and also some in Adlestrop on June 19th. These gardens are all in addition to the well-known larger establishments which are open continually from April to September: Batsford Park is well worth a visit for its arboretum contains a large collection of mature trees and shrubs, teas are available and there is a garden centre. Nearer home the grounds of Farnborough Hall are open every Wednesday and Saturday 2-6. The gardens of Upton House, Monday - Thursday 2-6 also. So, given reasonable weather, there is no lack of places to visit.

The cold, wet weather of April and May have scarcely encouraged gardening and seed germination, so we hope June will have better thing in store for us. Meantime, keep the hoe going to keep on top of the weeds lest they get the upper hand in wet weather. ender plants such as begonias and geraniums can go out from the middle of the month; they will be better for a little liquid feed while still in their pots to build up sturdy plants. "erbaceous plants need staking now before they gettop-heavy. In the vegetable garden, successional sowings of lettuce, carrot and spinach should be sown. Christmas Drumhead, Greyhound, Golden Acre and Calabrese should come on quickly from a June Sowing. Marrows and ridge cucumbers can be planted out from mid-month.
