



THE GARDEN IN JUNE

It has been a difficult Spring, very dry, with sometimes hot days and cold nights, so seed germination has been slow and growth erratic, but the recent rain has helped things along. The ground is in excellent condition for seed sowing and, as the days warm up, germination should be good, so we can catch up with April's work.

In the vegetable garden, maincrop sowings should be done early in the month: carrot, beet, lettuce will go away rapidly. Runner and dwarf french beans ca be sown although there is still a risk of frost for a week or two. If sown in boxes, they can

be protected if necessary.

By the middle of the month it should be safe to plant out geraniums and begonias. Meanwhile, give them some weak liquid feed to build them up. Pahlias will be sprouting in their trays and providing young shoots for propagation. Keep them moist and in good light and they should be ready to plant out in late June / early July. Dig a good-sized hole and put some well-decayed manure in the bottom if you hope for large, well-flowered plants.

There is plenty of maintenance work in the garden this month; hoeing, pruning early-flowering shrubs, staking herbaceous plants before they get out of hand. Spring flowering bulbs should be left until the neaves have yellowed - they are storing up next year's food supply. There is no need to tie them up,

just tolerate the untidiness for 5-6 weeks.
