

WATER!

At last there is to be a new water main from the Sibford Gower crossroads, along Pond Lane, down Bonds End Lane and finishing at the Parley Close footpath.

The Water Authority say this is to alleviate the problems of poor pressure and discoloured water in the area. There have also been many bursts in recent years.

The work will begin in the week of September 17th and last for two to three weeks during which time vehicular access to Bonds End Lane will be restricted between 9 a.m. and 4.30 pm A notice is enclosed for residents, asking them to take out any vehicles that will be needed during the day and park them clear before 9 a.m. Access will be restored after working hours, and at any time should the emergency services be required.

The Water Board regret the inconvenience this will cause, but perhaps that is a small price for an improved water supply.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Parish Councils have heard from the Severn Trent Water Authority and Cherwell District Council concerning two areas of major interest and concern to those living in rural communities.

Pollution by silage. Each year serious damage is caused by discharges of silage liquor into the area's streams. The Water Authority would like to collaborate with the farming community advising and assisting in eliminating this problem. Contact the Divisional Scientist for our area of the Water Authority for help or advice.

Straw and stubble burning. New byelaws have been passed to govern the burning of straw and stubble. A new maximum fine of £2,000 has been introduced for conviction following contravention of these byelaws. Full details are available from the Parish Clerk, Mr W. Johnson, Burdrop House.

THE GARDEN IN SEPTEMBER

We are back to work again, but with a difference. We are now able to relax and assess the result of our season's work. We can enjoy the lush colour of the dahlias for a week or two yet to be followed by the chrysanthemums, but don't forget to put the late varieties under glass about the middle of the month — by this time you can easily be caught by an unexpected frost.

There is still time to sow seeds of stocks East Lothian or Beauty of Nice to grow on under glass for Spring flowering. Another attractive and very useful plant to sow now is the schizanthus which will flower under cold glass next Spring. Known as the poor man's orchid, it provides a mass of colour. In the vegetable section, a September sowing of lettuce will provide a cutting next April, especially in cold frames. Winter Density or aldor are suitable varieties.

The most important job now is the planting of bulbs to flower at Christmas and New Year. Careful selection will give continuous colour from mid-December to April. Don't overlook the less well-known bulbs which can add to the pleasure of colour surprises: iris danfordiae, ixias pushkinia, libinotica are attractive little flowers and east to grow.
