# SIBFORD FRIENDSHIP CLUB (SFC)

- 1. This club was founded about 18 years ago, and for most of this time was under the leadership of Mrs. Mary Flinn. Mrs. Flinn retired last year and since then the Club has been run by a committee.
- 2. The object of the club is to bring the senior members of the villages together in a spirit of fellowship, and its' aims are:
  - a) to develop a sense of communal responsibility,
  - to organize talks, entertainments, outings and events as required by the majority of members,
  - c) to raise money for the efficient running of the club.
- 3. Communal responsibility in this context is to :-
  - a) provide help in cases of sickness, hospitalization, death etc., e.g. provide transport to visit hospital, shopping etc.
  - b) to advise on Age Concern, Action in Retirement, Finance budgeting, Disablement etc.
  - c) to give comfort in any way, and financial assistance if necessary.
- 4. The Club meets on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month exc. ept August, and usually at the Village Hall, Sibford Gower.
- 5. The subscription is £1 per year.

This club could be deemed to be an extension to the Sibford Friendly Society, which was in being some fifty or more years ago, and is believed to have been founded by the late Frank Lascelles (Pageant Master). The two banners of this Society are laid up in Holy Trinity Church. The motto of the Friendly Society, attributed to Stephen Grellet (1773 to 1855) was: -

"I expect to pass through this world but once; any good thing therefore that I can do, or any kindness that I can show to any fellow creature, let me do it now; let me not defer or neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again."

- 8. The difference between the two is that, whereas the membership of the present club is for senior citizens, the Friendly Society provided for adults of all ages.
- 9. The SFC does not have a motto to date, but we commend to our members the following :-

"If you can lend a needed hand,
Or someone's sorrow share,
If you can show by word or deed
You sympathise and care,
Please do it now - for if you wait
Another day could be too late."

## THE GARDEN IN APRIL

At the time I write, Spring is officially due in two day's time but the ground iscovered by a light fall of snow after a very sharp frost at dawn. Indeed the soil is very cold and there is little sign of growth, the daffodils are tightly rolled and the buds on the shrubs appear dormant still: to sow seeds would be to court disaster. It is evidently a season to work according to conditions not to follow the calender. Countrymen used to say "So many mists in March, so many frosts in May", perhaps we are in for a late season. As Easter is late perhaps it would be a good idea to postpone the Good Friday planting of early potatoes for a week or two. Later in the month, when the soil has really warmed up, sow cauliflower for autumn use, also cabbage and broccoli for autumn and next winter; continue sowing beet, carrots and lettuce. Dwarf french beans can be sown in shallow trenches about the end of the month and runner beans started in boxes.

There is still time to sow annuals once the soil is ready while dahlias should be started off in boxes ready to plant out in May but do protect them from frost and be guided by weather conditions. They are greedy plants and for successful flowering need rich soil and a good spadeful of manure under each tuber when planted out. As sthe seed bed empties, sow wallflowers and sweet William to plant out in the autumn for next year's flowering.
