

SODA BREAD

Many people commented after the Irish Evening that they had enjoyed the Soda Bread and asked for the recipe. It was taken from a Good Housekeeping Cookery Book. I chose not to include the sugar, otherwise it was made as set out below.

INGREDIENTS
11b plain flour

2 level teaspoons bicarbonate of soda 2 level teaspoons cream of tartar

1 level teaspoon salt

1 oz lamd

1 - 2 level teaspoons caster sugar

(optional) ½ pint soured milk or 9 fl oz buttermilk made up to ½ pint with milk. PREPARATION TIME 15 mins.

COOKING TIME 30 mins.

METHOD

Sift the flour, bicarbonate of soda, cream of tartar and salt into a bowl. Cut up the lard and rub into the flour with the fingertips until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Mix in the sugar if used. Make a well in the centre, add the milk (soured with 1 tablespoon lemon juice) or the buttermilk and mix t to a soft but manageable dough, working the ingredients with a round bladed knife. Add more milk if necessary. Turn onto a floured surface, knead lightly and shape into a 7" round. Flatten slightly. Mark into 4 with the back of a knife, set on a floured baking tray and bake in the centre of a pre-heated oven at 400 F (mark 6) for about 30 minutes. Cool on a wire rack and serve fresh as a teabread.

THE GARDEN IN JUNE 1985

Once again it has been a disappointing Spring, apart from the daffodils which have put up a splendid show, and we stand on the threshold of summer with one of the busiest months of the year before us.

There are still vegetable seeds to be sown. These include beetroot, carrots, french beans and runner beans if you didn't sow them in boxes last month, chicory, kale and successional crops of lettuce and spring cabbage. Calabrese sown in early June will provide luscious green spears from October, or even September, given reasonable weather. It is time now to plant out cauliflowers. leeks, marrows and courgettes, sprouting broccoli, brussels sprouts, celery and sweetcorn.

Annuals sown earlier may need thinning but there is just time to sow some quick-growing varieties early in the month. Candytuft, cornflower, clarkia and godetia will provide a splash of colour where needed.

We must be mainly concerned with keeping on top of unwanted growth of shrubs and weeds. Now is the time to prune the spring-flowering shrubs such as forsythia. Remove the wood that has carried this year's flowers to encourage the young growth in preparation for next year's blooms.

Keep the hoe going in beds and borders, bearing in mind that the village has been entered for the 'Best Kept Village' competition and the inspection team will have a keen eye for the

verges outside our houses. Spring flowering bulbs such as daffodils are best left where they have flowered and not disturbed for five or six weeks until the leaves have died down; whereas tulips benefit from lifting.

DOMESDAY PROJECT

During this term Primary School children all over Britain will be taking part in a mammoth project designed to update the Domesday Book of 1086.

Organised by the B.B.C., and under their guidance, our children will be collecting and collatinginformation about their locality which will provide an invaluable piece of evidence for generations to come. When all the information has been collected the final data will be put ontp our own school microcomputer. The B.B.C. will then collect individual cassettes and discs f from all over the country and they will compile the final Domesday Project.

The task should provide great insight for the children into their own environment, and will also enable them to make records of how they see their own lives. We have been given two areas of 12 sq. km. to study. In all there will be four categories for information gathering:

- 1 LAND USE The principal use of the land in our area residential, farmland etc.
- 2 PRINCIPAL FEATURES Houses, shops, telephone boxes etc.
- 3 WHAT LIFE IS LIKE TODAY Family, village, community life.
- 4 PERIOD OF CHANGE A picture of how things have changed locally.

Could you offer help? We need information, contacts with interesting people, people who would talk about their life, work, house, interests with small groups of children or who could show them things of interest in the villages.

As part of their Domesday Survey, the children have been visiting local places of worship. Here are extracts from some of their reports.

THE QUAKER MEETING HOUSE

The Quaker Meeting House is very plain and simple. Inside there are no decorations. A table is placed in the middle of the room. On the table there are usually flowers. The windows are very high so you don't look out when you are worshipping. The Quakers don't believe in showieness and so they don't have many things in the Meeting House. "ere is a list of what they don't have and what they don't do.

They don't have stained glass windows

They don't have an altar They don't have decoration

They are not baptised

They don't drink too much (and some don't drink at all) They don't wear fancy clothes

They don't have a Vicar They don't have a sermon

They don't fight wars

When you go to a Quaker Meeting everybody just walks in and sits down. Nobody speaks except if somebody reads from the Bible or says something they want everybody to hear. When the Meeting is over, the Elders shake hands and everyone can go.

The Quakers, or Society of Friends as they are now called, were started in the 1650's by George Fox. He started off as Church of England but didn't agree with the showieness. The Quakers got their name because, when they first started, when they were speaking they used to get excited and start shaking, and so people teased them and called them Quakers. In the olden days you were not supposed to be a Quaker and if you were, you would be put in prison. The Quaker Meeting House is the oldest place of worship in Sibford.

HOLY TRINITY CHURCH

Holy Trinity Church was built 145 years ago in 1840, that is, on the whole, quite young for a Church. If you were to go up in a helicopter you would be able to see that it was in the shape of a cross.

Inside it is very cold, but the air is still. The Church has very good acoustics, which means it echoes music or any

noise very well.

On the east window there are lots of signs. There are four separate pictures each showing Matthew, Mark, Luke and John as animals. There is also a picture of Jesus on the cross and the dove of peace. Then come the signs Alpha and Omega, the Greek for A and Z, the beginning and the end. The east window has a mistake: Omega is upside down.

The font is always at the entrance to the Church, by the door. On the altar in Sibford Church are the letters I.H.S.,

Greek for the first three letters of JESUS.

Altogether the Church seats 400, though on average about 30 people go. At Easter and Christmas the Church can be full.
