THE GARDEN IN NOVEMBER AND DECEMBER

The last few weeks have been relatively mild and following the rain in August green growth has persisted, so Autumn has been delayed. Nevertheless, growth is dying down and it only needs a night or two of frost to really put an end to the remaining plants in the borders. The ground is in very good condition and empty spaces should be rough dug to lie open for the winter; conditions are very favourable for planting shrubs so now is the time to move those which have disappointed you this season or to plant new stock. Container grown specimens are the most satisfactory but they need to be planted with care. Knock them gently out of the pots, having first watered and drained them. Dig a good sized hole, put some peat in the bottom, not fresh manure, fork it over and backfill to about the same depth that the shrub was growing and tread round firmly. If the shrub is 2 or more feet in height, it is desirable to stake to guard against wind rock damaging the roots during the winter. A few daffodil bulbs planted around the stem will add to interest when Spring comes.

In the flower garden wallflower plants should be growing away strongly, but there is still time to plant tulips between them while the ground is warm and workable. Forget-me-nots are a useful and cheap alternative to wall-flowers and have the useful quality of seeding themselves after flowering.

We are approaching the time of year when many plants will be given as Christmas presents and sadly most will eventually find their way to dustbin or bonfire heaps. Some, for example cinerarias, are annuals and doomed to a short life, but with care their lives can be prolonged a little. All plants tend to dry out on their journey to their new home and need watering regularly, but let them stand in the dry. Azaleas must never be allowed to dry out, water regularly and when the flowers are over syringe the plant; in late Spring plant it outdoors in a shady spot; with any luck it will go on for a few years.
