NATURE NOTES

The relatively mild and wet winter has probably resulted in some of the migrant birds from the north being slower to arrive in large numbers this year. The certainly seem to have been fewer Redwings and Fieldfares around on the school playing fields than normal.

Now is the time to start looking out for the first of the spring flowers starting to appear. The gorse bushes around Swalcliffe Common were certainly in full bloom in December and January.

Looking back over my moth records for 2019 I was surprised to find I have managed to add 77 new species to my garden list including Satin Lutestring, Crescent Dart and Silver Cloud which were all firsts for Oxfordshire. Other notable records included Clifden Nonpareil a species that has been described as the Holy Grail of the moth world.





It is a large moth with bright blue stripes on its hindwings. During 2019 sightings of this moth were being reported throughout Britain and it even made it into the national press. Having heard that one had been seen resting on the Rollright Stones I started putting my trap out every night from 15th September and was rewarded with individuals caught on 20th and 22th. I also caught a specimen of the related Dark Crimson Underwing a nationally scarce species. The scientific name is Catocala sponosa. 'Catocala' means 'beautiful below', in reference to the brightly coloured hindwings. The species name 'sponsa' derives from the Latin for fiancée or bride. Linnaeus started a convention of naming moth species with brightly coloured hindwings in a matrimonial context. It is thought this refers to the brightly coloured undergarments worn by Scandinavian brides!

Iain Brown has also been running a low wattage moth trap on his balcony during 2019 and has recorded 170 species including five that I have not seen in Sibford. (Garden Dart, Sallow Kitten, Pine Hawkmoth, Bird's Wing and Shark).



1877 - A New Lending Library for Sibford

Among the many important political and social reforms of the mid 19th century was the Public Libraries Act of 1850. However, while this allowed municipal boroughs in England and Wales to establish public libraries, few were built until Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1887 precipitated the setting up of several dozen. Then, during the 1880s and 90s private philanthropy saw the construction of a vast number of small and medium sized libraries.



Sibford established its own Lending Library at a village meeting held on 10 December 1877 under the chairmanship of the Vicar, Rev Edward Stevens. £24-3s-6d was donated for the purchase of books together

with an offer from villagers of a number of books to start the library. A list of twenty one rules was drawn up by the fifteen strong committee governing the conditions and quarterly charges for membership and the term for borrowing books. The Library was to be open in the Gower School Room on Mondays between 12 to 12.30pm and 7 to 8pm. Every household was visited by a member of the committee so that all villagers should understand the purposes and benefits of the library and all books donated or purchased were covered with brown paper by the ladies of the committee.

At the end of the first year the library contained 320 volumes and a further 70 books were added for the following year at a cost of £20-7s-4d. During 1878 the total number of volumes issued was 3088 so villagers were certainly making use of their new facility. The operating costs of £35-9s-6d included the new books, bookcases, bookbinding, printing, repairs to books and an inkstand, ink and a candlestick for use by the Librarian. The accounts were presented at the Annual General Meeting and a tea was served to members and their families by the ladies of the committee at a cost of 6d each.

By 1896 the tea was augmented to include an entertainment comprising songs, recitations, musical solos and readings ending with the National Anthem - God Save the Queen (Victoria). The final entry in the Minute Book was the report given at the Annual Meeting on 20 January 1898 when several rules were amended. An entertainment followed led by the Sibford Choral Society together with many other items including songs, recitations and glees provided by villagers and friends. "Miss Daisy Thame ably presided at the piano during the greater part of a most enjoyable evening."

There was a balance of £4-10s-9d in the Lending Library Accounts adopted in January 1898 but as this is the last entry it is not clear whether it continued into the new century. *Maureen Hicks*

In Your Garden - February

February is an excellent time to refresh and rethink your garden, whilst borders look bare, and shrubs are leafless. Give it a thought - it doesn,t always have to look like this in winter. If you have room for an evergreen shrub or two, try eleagnus, pittosporum, garrya elliptica or hammamellis. A dark box or yew hedge always help to add architectural interest, and snowdrops and white hellebores always look twice as dramatic in front of a clipped dark yew hedge. Talking of snowdrops, try and find time to take a walk in some of the local places that glitter with snowdrops (if the sun is out). Evenley Woods, Painswick Rococco garden, Colesbourne Park, and, my favourite, behind the church at Great Tew. Enough chatter, there are some jobs to do:-

- 1. Lift and divide clumps of snowdrops when they have finished flowering.
- 2. Continue to plant roses and shrubs as long as the ground is not frozen.
- 3. Have you ordered your seeds? My early sweet peas are just popping through in the greenhouse.
- 4. It is time to start chitting early potatoes.
- 5. When winter flowering shrubs have finished flowering they can have a gentle prune, but don.t prune ornamental cherries, plums and almonds before June, otherwise they can get silver fungal, and it kills them off fast.
- 6. On fine days, open up the greenhouse, cold frames and conservatory doors, and let the breezes in.

- 7. If the weather warms up, and the lawn is dry, you can mow it with the cutters on high. Trimming the edges makes the garden look smarter.
- 8. Time to get the ladders out and prune the wisteria. Be tough with it, no more wispy branches.
- 9. Watch out for moles, as February is when they get madly busy.
- 10. If you have pots of cyclamen suddenly drooping, they may have vine weevil; Tip them out, and if you find the roots nibbled and little white sluggy things in there, pinch them out between your fingers.

Squelch.Really satisfying. Then repot with new compost.

THE SIBFORDS HISTORY SOCIETY

At their meeting on 21st November, a larger than usual audience heard Keith Westcott give a fascinating talk on the Broughton Hoard

Keith's interest in th past started when diving on shipwrecks as a member of the Banbury Sub-Aqua Club asking when, how and why the ship had been lost. His interest in metal detecting used responsibly, could be of value historically.

in 1996, with permission from Lord Saya & Sele, he investigated trackways near Brouhgton Castle moat and found 16c & 17c coins. Further coins were found and declared Treasure Trove. They can now be seen in the Ashmolean Museum in Oxford.

Following the discovery of a lead-lined sarcophagus in 1963, containing the remains of a woman who dies in the 3-4c, his curiosity was aroused. His thoughts were that a burial of this importance must be in the vicinity of a large settlement. On investigating locations, he found a piece of hypocaust tile which led him to believe that beneath the soil were significant ruins. Scans of the area revealed the outline of a villa the length of which compares to Buckingham Palace but to excavate the entire area would cost in the region of £2m Clive Warner

The Sibfords History Society Social Evening 2020

The social evening will be based on the diaries of the Reverend Stevens, vicar of Sibford Gower and Sibford Ferris from 1874 – 1878. He kept a diary with daily entries and referred to the parishioners and others whom he met.

It would be fun if you were to come in a costume to represent one of the characters in the diaries. This list of occupations in Sibford in 1877 might help you. They include: Bailiff, Baker,Beershop, Blacksmith, Bread seller, Butcher, Carpenter,, Carrier, Clock Cleaner, Coal Seller, Dairyman, Farmer, Independent, Inn Keeper,Labourer, Lawyer, Lunatic, Machinist, Mason, Master Plumber, Miller, Molecatcher, Painter, Pauper, Roadman, Sawyer, School Master, Seamstress, separated from husband, Servant, Shoemaker, Shopkeeper, Surgeon, Surveyor, Tailor, Thatcher, Vicar, Widow.
