

On April 21st a wheatear flew up from our road, but must have moved on as we haven't seen it again. A few years ago a pair stayed throughout the summer and probably nested, as a young one that had been run over by a lorry, was picked up from the road,

April 24th. Saw a leveret already half-grown. We have heard a great spotted woodpecker drumming frequently over the last few days. Noticed a place where badgers have dug their way under the wire netting that surrounds our garden.

April 27th. This morning we had two short recitals from a nightingale that may have been disorientated by the unusually thick fog and had, excusably, mistaken our garden for scrubland.

May 16th. A few days spent near Dartmouth has made me realise how precious few pieces of natural flora we have left locally. As well as the beautiful Devon hedge-banks there is a lot of land along the coast, mostly owned by the National Trust, where flowers abound. We came upon a slow-worm that shone like polished copper, lying across the path. It did not move even when I touched iv. We also saw several painted-lady butterflies, which looked very smart considering that they had flown in from southern Europe or Africa. I expect it will be another week or two before they get here.

# SIBFORD CRICKET CLUB

Sibford opened this season as they closed the last, with two defeats. In their first match they faced last years champions, Cropredy. Sibford batted first and with new captain David Inns batting well, they reached 52 for the loss of only 2 wickets. However the loss of Inns, 23 and Adrian Lamb, 16 signalled a Sibford collapse to 64 all out, with Micky Allen taking 8 wickets for just 9 runs. Cropredy knocked off the runs for only 2 wickets. The only interest was whether John Simms could complete a hat-trick spanning 2 seasons. He took 2 wickets from the last 2 balls he bowled last season, but failed to take the wicket he needed in this game.

The following Saturday Sibford again faced strong opposition in the shape of Wroxton. Wroxton, batting first, ran up a total of 175 for 9. Roger Maycock, 46, Sid Hall, 39, Trevor Neville, 21 and Paul Neal 15 were the top scorers. Sibfords' reply started well as they scored 47 for 1 off the first 10 overs largely thanks to an innings of 41 including 4 sixes from Adrian Lamb. However Sibford then collapsed to the bowling of Trevor Neville 6 for 15 and Roger Maycock 4 for 25. Russel Mobley with 13 was the only other Sibford batsman to reach double figures as they were all out for 76.

Sibford must now look for improvement. Having played 2 of the strongest teams in the league they will now be hoping for a winning run to establish them near the top.

# PROPOSED CONSERVATION AREA FOR SIBFORD GOWER

As the Chairman of the Parish Council announced recently in his report to the Annual Parish Meeting, the Council has decided that it would be desirable to apply for the establishment of a Conservation Area for Sibford Gower.

Under the Town and Country Planning Act 1971 a Conservation Area must be "an area of architectural or historic interest the appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance". The Chief Planning Officer of Cherwell District Council has prepared a plan of an area which he could support as a conservation area which includes the old core of the village and the valley between Gower and Ferris.

The Parish Council has not yet discussed the Planning Officer's suggestions, but meanwhile would welcome views and comments from residents of Sibford Gower and Burdrop. A copy of the map is on the Parish Notice Board and Council members have copies, as has the Clerk, Colonel Frith. They will be happy to show them to anyone interested (by appointment).

When the Council has considered the proposal they will call an open meeting in order to establish whether it has support from a majority of the residents before making a formal application to the District Council.

#### The Warriner School French Exchange 1987

My first day was spent mountain walking, finding our own way back to the Centre with the help of a map. Next day we went rock climbing and abseiling which was a great laugh because I was scared. I did all 3 climbs and Colin the Instructor said I was quite good. We had to abseil off a 75 ft. viaduct. In the second week I chose to do canoeing as my special activity and we went to the seaside in Pembrokeshire. We went on a few sea journeys around the islands and along the coast but I felt a bit seasick. We did some surf canoeing which was fun but we often capsized so it got a bit cold but it was a good laugh.

I would recommend the trip to Glasbury for anyone as it shows you how fit and courageous you really are.

# GUIDED WALKS IN THE COTSWOLDS AND IN THE CHERWELL COUNTRYSIDE
