

CRICKET - Banbury and District League

Whitnash v Sibford Sibford batted first on what proved to be a remarkably good wicket, despite the mornings rain. Sibford, looking for their first victory of the season, got off to a flying start and never looked back. Captain, David Inns, scored 52, his first half century for Sibford and then the middle order all made runs. Adrian Lamb, 29, Roger Gilbert, 22, Bill Barton, 23 and David Lamb 22 were the main contributors. Sibford were eventually all out for 174. For Whitnash Bob Partridge took 5 for 34.

When Whitnash batted they found the task of scoring the required run rate too much for them against a tight Sibford attack. Only Bob Partridge managed any significant resistance scoring 21. They were all out for 83 with all 5 Sibford bowlers taking at least one wicket.

Alveston v Sibford Sibford batted first on a difficult wicket and were bowled out for 64 with Roger Gilbert scoring 25, Nigel Fletcher 12 and Jason Tustain 9 not out. Alveston had little difficulty in scoring the required runs, losing only 3 wickets in the process.

Goerge Clark Cup: 1st Round - Warmington v Sibford This match had to be played in the evening following rain on the Saturday that it was scheduled for. Sibford made a good start with David Inns scoring 18, Russell Mobley 26 and then Roger Gilbert weighed in with 23 not out, including a 6 off the last ball of the 16 eight ball overs allowed. Their final score was 91 for 6.

Warmington were tied down by some tight Sibford Bowling particularly by Roger Gilbert who bowled 8 overs 5 for 28. Warmington were left needing 17 off the final over to be bowled by David Lamb. Tight bowling by Lamb left them 13 runs short of the Sibford total. Lamb finished with 2 for 29.

Sibford can now look forward to a semi-final match at Radway on 27th June.

Warmington v Sibford Sibford batted first on a wicket which proved to be very slow with variable bounce. All the batsmen struggled and the highest scores were David Lamb 14, Jason Tustain 11, Percy Turner 11, Russell Mobley 10 and Phillip Gilbert 10 as Sibford reached 77 all out. Pete Hedges, who spun the ball prodigiously, took 4 for 21 and Alan Smithson 3 for 20.

Warmington did not find batting any easier against some very tight Sibford bowling. In an exciting finish Warmington were bowled out just 5 runs short of their target with only one of their 40 overs remaining. A. Farley with 30 was Warmington's only batsman in double figures. John Simms with his leg spin was Sibford's hero taking 5 for 31 while Adrian Lamb took 3 for 23 and Roger Gilbert 2 for 6.
