THE STEPORD GOWER TOWN ESTATE

Like so many treasurers in England the local people take it for granted that charities are widely appreciated and recognised by all. In recent times the comings and goings of a nomadic population make it less likely that everything about their present local environment is known by all.

"The Sibford Gower Town Estate" has long been just such a blessing recognised by local folk but unknown to many recent residents.

The Secretary, Mr. Peter Baadsgaard, has been good enough to explain the mystery of this 'charity' and exactly what it represents to The Villagers of today, and writes:-

This charity originated about 1560 when a number of people (who they actually were we do not now know) contributed plots of land with the objective of helping the less fortunate in the village, and to ensure that the children were given schooling. Just how the charity functioned in this early period we do not know, but under Act of Parliament in 1773 these lands were collected into the Town Estate of Broad Sibford (the Gower) and Burdrop.

This estate comprised what is now Sibford Heath Farm, and allotment lands, together with an area on the heath (now a part of the farm) called the Fuel Lands, on which villagers could collect wood for fuel. The Town Estate charity is also owner of the original part of the Primary School and the School House as well as some woodland.

The Town Estate and Fuel Lands have long been under the jurisdiction of the Charity Commission, and since 1922 managed under a formal instument by a body of nine trustees, five of whom are always appointed by the Sibford Gower Parish Council. The trustees have to maintain the assets of the charity, and are authorised to distribute the income in three ways: one third for the school, one third for the relief and maintenance of the poor and one third for charitable and pious purposes. Funds which are not distributed are invested until they are required.

The charity therefore operates in part in the same field as statutory social services because its rules were set up long before these were established, and care must consequently be taken to ensure that its activity does not conflict with or reduce any statutory benefit. However in a real case of need the charity - the estate which belongs to the town - has the means to help. Not only the elderly or disabled, but also the sick, unemployed, those on low incomes and single parent families may justify help. A genuine need is the main criterion; it is not just a question of eligibility for statutory benefits.

Ways in which the charity can help are, for example, by making payments related to specific needs, providing facilities or items (either outright or on loan) or paying for services. But, without knowing details about a case of need the trustees can do nothing.

NOTE: The area of activity of the charity is restricted to Sibford Gower and Burdrop for direct help to individuals, but is in fact more widely felt through help to organisations in Sibford Gower whose members include residents of other villages.

The W.I. send traditional Greetings and some not so traditional recipes for Christmas.

SCANDINAVIAN SHORTBREAD

200g. plain flour, 75g. sugar

125g. butter or margarine 2 tbls. brandy or cream

Rub butter into flour, mix in the sugar and liquid, and knead lightly. Roll dough into long sausages (finger thickness). flatten slightly on the top. Brush with beaten egg and sprinkle with mixture of chopped almonds and sugar. Cut out, on the slant, into l_2^{10} pieces. Bake at $200^{\circ} c(400^{\circ}F)$ for 10-12 minutes.

MORMORS JULEKAGE (DANISH CHRISTMAS CAKE).

25g yeast

slightly less than 4 pint milk

75g butter or margarine

2 eggs

225g plain flour 75g sugar

1 tsp cardamom 75g raisins

30g candied peel

Cream the yeast with a little sugar, warm the milk and melt the butter in it. Add the rest of the sugar to the flour and mix to a smooth dough with the milk, eggs and yeast. Leave to rise till double the size then mix in the raisins and candied peel. Put daugh on well oiled baking sheet or roasting tin and leave to rise. Brush with beaten egg and sprinkle on sugar. Then bake at 200°C (400°F) for 20 minutes.

-CHRISTMAS -TREE BISCUITS (Germany)

- l lb. plain flour, ½ lb. sugar, 4 eggs.
- 1. Cream eggs & sugar (10-15 mins)
- 2. Add flour
- Roll out on a floured board and cut into fancy shapes, 3. e.g. small figures, stars, rings etc.
- Brush with beaten egg yolk and bake in hot oven
- 5. Glaze with coloured icing and tie with Christmas string and hang on Christmas tree.

CHRISTMAS FRITTERS (Germany)

3 ozs. butter

3 tablespoons water

3 ozs. sugar

l lb. flour

3 eggs

1 teaspoon B. Powder

- 3 tablespoons milk
- 1. Cream butter and sugar
- 2. Add other ingredients and beat to a dough with wooden spoon
- 3. Knead well with hands and chill in fridge.
- 4. Turn dough on to a floured board and roll out very thinly
- 5. Cut into strips 3" long and 4" wide
- 6. In the middle of each strip cut a gash and twist the ends through
- 7. Fry in deep fat until golden brown
- 8. Drain on absorbent paper and dust with icing sugar or caster sugar.

NATURE NOTES

Oct. 30th A lot of the mushroom which is appropriately known by the name of Lawyer's Wig, have appeared on our lawn over the last few days. They are said to be edible before they open and start melting away, but I wouldn't care to try them.

Nov. 4th We see pied wagtails frequently on the farm, but today we were visited by the very colourful grey wagtail, a graceful bird that seems to be fully aware of its own beauty. A few years ago we watched a grey wagtail fighting its own reflection in the door mirrors of a parked car. It would attack the mirror on the driver's side, then fly over the car to repeat the performance on the passenger side. We returned after a walk to find it still fighting itself. Perhaps it can't have beauty and brains as well.

Nov. 6th It is nice to hear that a party of long-tailed tits have been seen working their way through gardens in the Ferris. Not a common sight these days.

Nov. 15th We now see fieldfares and redwings most days in considerable numbers. In recent years they seem only to spend the early winter here and then move on, but we have seen sizable flocks in late winter on grassland around Brailes.
