Our two assistants Karen French and Nicky Barton who have given such valuable help for several years, have moved away, and David Baker, who came back to lead the Youth Club for a second time, after "retiring", now feels unable to continue any longer.

The good news is that we have an active Management Committee, funds, and some excellent sports and games equipment.

Every year the third years at the 'Warriner' get a chance to travel to Wales and spend two weeks on an outdoor pursuits course at a centre in Glasbury-on-Wye near Hay-on-Wye. Woodlands is an old house lying in large grounds which has been converted into a centre for Oxfordshire Schools to use.

The course which the 'Warriner' goes on is a two week course. During the first week you do canoeing, climbing, caving, mountain walking, navigation and a ropes course called "Jungle Gym". In the second week you choose one of these activities to specialise in for a further three days camping away from the centre and doing your chosen specialist option. You can go camping on the south coast of Wales in Pembrokeshire, to do canoeing on the sea or rock climbing on the sea cliffs. You can go on a mountain expedition in the Black Mountains or caving near Hay-on-Wye.

The weather for our group was brilliant. The sun shone every day and it only rained once. Everyone got sunburnt and quite a few of us spent a lot of time being smeared with Calomine Lotion by Alan Rampley (local policeman and school governor at the Warriner who came with us as one of the extra staff). You didn't have much time to worry about sunburn though, neither did you worry about your appearance, you looked out of place if you weren't wearing your oldest tattiest and most out of fashion clothes.

If you don't like getting wet and muddy you should not go on the course. I spent the entire two weeks soaking wet! The course is far from easy though, your muscles really ache and you get extremely tired, but it gives you a great sense of achievement and the atmosphere at the centre is really nice and homely.

I would recommend this course to anyone who is wondering whether to go or not. You will have the best time in your life and you won't want to come home. I certainly didn't!

YEAR ENDING 31ST MARCH 1988.

The past year has been an eventful one for 1st The Sibfords Scout Group and most of the boys have taken full advantage of the training programme provided by the Scout and Cub leaders.

The Cubs have achieved a remarkable number of arrow awards: 11 bronze, 8 silver and 5 gold, for which they have had to work very hard indeed. Proficiency Badges awarded have included 14 athletes, 11 campers, home helps, photographers, collectors and one cyclist badge. Three camps were held last year and all were a great success with the high point of the year the Summer Camp at Rough Close, near Coventry. Not only was the location good but the weather was perfect. The cub pack took part in numerous District events during the past 12 months and had very successful results at the swimming gala and sports day. Our young helpers are continuing to take a fuller part in pack events. Hannah Ray is now an invested warranted Instructor.

The Scout Troop, in its second year, has gone from strength to strength progressing in both badge work and competitions. Badges gained have ranged from librarian to lifesaver and collector to advanced swimmer. On the competition side the Scouts entered all the District events taking third place in Indoor Football and a first and third place in the Incident Hike. As part of the prize for winning the later competition they carried and escorted the District Flag at St. Georges Day parade, the first time it had been carried for ten years! The same team of boys who won the District Incident Hike represented the District at the County Cooking Competition and gained first place. During the year we have lost two Assistant Scout leaders putting an extra load on the Scout Leader.

I am delighted to announce that from 17th June we shall have a Beaver Scout section under the leadership of Robin Spicer. Fuller details can be found elsewhere.

The Group Executive Committee, under the able chairmanship of Gillian Soden, has provided the uniformed sections with valuable funds. Our regular newspaper collection, organised by Richard White, has raised nearly £300 and this with other fund raising events has allowed the Group to purchase a great deal of equipment ensuring the standard of training is kept to the highest possible standards.

My very grateful thanks and those of all the uniformed members to our Committee and everyone in the four villages who support us so generously. Your continuing support will greatly encourage our efforts in the future.

To many of those it was felt that to provide worship which was solely centred on the Holy Communion was, to say, the least, a little insensitive, since by its very nature the Eucharist is - or could be argued to be - exclusive as a style of worship. Accordingly therefore each PCC has made its own plans to include within its worship schedule a service - on a regular basis - which ought to include, potentially, every person living in the village.

Epwell, as you know, has been doing this for some months now, and Swalcliffe has made plans for a regular service on the 1st Sunday of each month. Sibford and Tadmarton are planning along the same lines - and local information will be forthcoming as soon as possible.

NATURE NOTES

May 24th While looking for wild flowers this afternoon, we came across some Tway-blades and Adderstongue among other interesting ones.

June 1st Spotted a buzzard high up over the farm today. Although it was only circling lazily, it soon moved across the sky on a wind that must have been much stronger than at ground level. We more often see one in August or September but I suppose that for each one we see, several go over unseen.

June 5th We have seen two yellow wagtails on our farm road on several occasions recently.

June 13th On an interesting walk this evening we watched a hare, saw a pair of Marsh or Willow Tits and a group of long-tailed tits, all within a hundred yards or so.

June 15th The wild flowers (or cornfield weeds) that I see while hoeing in the field, seem to have brighter flowers than usual this year, especially the Venus' Looking-glass and Scarlet Pimpernel. It may be due to the drier weather.

June 17th The badgers have dug out a bumble bees' nest at the edge of our grass field. The bees seem to be repairing it again so perhaps I will protect it with a heavy stone tomorrow.
