NATURE NOTES

Oct 23rd Saw a bird of prey, with rather short wings like a sparrow-hawk, being mobbed by rooks and jackdaws. It finally disappeared, flying westward at a great height, with me none the wiser as to its identity.

Oct 28th There was great competition for the last of the yew berries in our garden, this morning, between some visiting redwings and the resident population of song thrushes, mistle thrushes and blackbirds. Yew berries seem to be the favourite food of all these birds. These are the first redwings that I have seen this autumn, but we see fieldfares every day now. There are very few haws on the close trimmed hedges to feed them through the winter. It is difficult to reconcile efficient farming with the needs of wildlife. We used to know the fieldfares as 'felts' or 'pigeon felts' and big flocks used to feed on the hedges that had become overgrown during the pre-war depression.

Nov 2nd Planted the last of our autumn corn today. I would think that most farmers have now finished, thanks to the weather being kinder than last year. Nov 17th Saw great tits, blue tits, a coal tit and a marsh or willow tit together

on our bird table this morning.

The Garden Bird Survey that I do produces some surprises. For instance, I see we had a period of 8 weeks during August and September when we did not see a house sparrow in the garden.

ARMISTICE SUNDAY

"We shall remember them".

This year the skies were blue and the sun shone on the red poppies which symbolise Armistice Sunday.

A large throng, probably representing every household in the Sibfords, gathered around the simple War Memorial in Holy Trinity Churchyard to honour and remember those who had died in all armed conflict since the 1914-18 war.

Wreaths were laid and the names of the men from the villages who had given their lives were read and remembered together with countless others thought of silently by many of those present.

The Last Post was sounded, with great feeling, by a lone scout trumpeter and all eyes were turned to gaze upon the ground. After a pause Reveille rang out and heads were once more raised high to the clear blue sky where bird song, once drowned by the clamour of war, still echoes hope as guns rust silently.

All joined in the Service that followed and the Church was packed to over-flowing proving, if proof is necessary, that the pews of English churches are not empty but assuredly occupied in spirit each Sunday by absent tenants.

The address was given by Dame Anne who spoke briefly but meaningfully about Love, Remembrance and Service before self. Much of what she said was addressed to the uniformed contingents from the Village Youth organisations whose turnout and behaviour was a credit to themselves and their Leaders. They listened intently knowing that they are the true train bearers of our future and heralds of a better world.

The occasion, enhanced by perfect November weather, is one that will be remembered for many years by those privileged to be present.
