#### FAMILY WORSHIP

\* Towards the end of last year the Parochial Church Council of Holy Trinity Church considered what the church could do to provide the sort of services which would attract young people and, of course, their parents. There was a feeling that there might be many for whom the regular services of the Eucharist could be somewhat daunting.

It was decided to have a monthly Family Service on the third Sunday of each month. A small committee was formed to plan the services.

The intention was that there should be a basic structure which would eventually become familiar to those who came and which would be the same as that used in other parishes in the benefice, so that anyone unable to attend a service here in a particular month could feel at home in Epwell or Tadmarton. Within that structure the committee had complete freedom to devise whatever form of worship seemed appropriate.

The plan was to engage the interests and use the gifts of people of all ages. While it was hoped that children would come and from time to time take an individual part, parents and older people would also be invited to become involved in the planning or actions of the services. Each service would have a theme on which the readings, hymns and prayers would concentrate. Thus far there have been guitars accompanying some of the hymns, a violinist playing before the start of the service, families giving readings and children as well as older people leading the prayers. There is a wealth of talent available to be used and, it seems, interest to engage it. Indeed there is already a short list of volunteers to take part in one way or another and numbers attending the services are growing in a most encouraging way.

# Main points discussed at the Parish Council Meeting held on 27th January 1989.

year of Mr. L.W. Poulton.

Various details of communication systems for the elderly and details of the 0.C.C. Cold Watch Scheme were discussed and details and leaflets are available from the surgery.

#### NATURE NOTES

Jan. 27th. Still very mild. A large patch of Iris reticulata in full bloom, also miniature daffodils and Iris stylosa. On the debit side, fungus diseases, that we normally associate with the summer months, are evident on the winter cereals. The winter barley, that looked so well in the autumn, is now suffering from the effects of mildew, and I understand that Yellow Rust, which we usually watch for in June and July, is showing up on certain varieties of winter wheat.

Jan. 29th. Quite a sharp frost this morning. Where a few pints of water had collected on a plastic sheet after yesterday's rain, the ice was quite thick and in the middle it had formed an ice stalagnite almost 3" tall, and the top 2 inches not much thicker than a pencil. This puzzled us, as it was in an open position with no chance of drips from above, until we noticed that it had a hollow core and had a lot of bubbles frozen into the ice. We concluded that some rotting vegetation in the water must have produced bubbles of methane which kept a hole open in the ice, and as they surfaced carried drops of water which froze on meeting the cold air, to form a tube, which, oddly, had one flat side on it, but I suppose air movement might account for that.

Feb. 19th. The weather is quite ridiculous. The array of spring flowers looks more like April than February. The first daffodils by our lane are open today. In c ntrast N.W.Scotland has had over 30 inches of rain already this year, which is more than our annual average.

#### DOGS FOULTING FOOTPATHS AND CRASS VERGES - BYELAWS

New byelaws, carrying a maximum fine of £100, have been enacted relating to dogs fouling a "footpath of any highway or a grass verge which is not more than 4 metres wide and is adjacent to the carriageway or footway of a highway". Cherwell District Council have requested that the Parish let them have details of where it would be appropriate to display byelaw notices. Cherwell District Council has appointed a dog warden, Hr B Hosband, to enforce these byelaws and to collate detail required if further byelwas relating to open spaces and recreation grounds are to be made.

The Parish Council would like to hear from anyone who has views as to appropriate locations for such notices or any other areas not covered by the present byelaws that they consider should be covered, either direct or by caising the matter at the Annual Parish Meeting on 21st April.

One of the prime concerns when making these byelaws is the risk from the disease toxocara canus which occurs when a round worm infestation, often carried by dogs, reaches the back of the human eye. This at worst can lead to blindness especially in young children.
