Mar 29 With the dawn chorus nearing its best I realise how lucky we are to have some woodland close to our bungalow. It makes me think that the lady who Alan Titchmarsh described as "the Mrs Beeton of Victorian garden designers" knew what she was talking about when she wrote "however small your garden may be you should always set aside at least an acre for planting trees." Apr 2 A green woodpecker spent quite a time today pecking a hole in the dead tree that we see from our kitchen window. This tree is often visited by tree creepers and great spotted woodpeckers. They must find a lot of insects and grubs under it's peeling bark. It will be a sad day when it is finally blown over.

Apr 9 As we came home late last night we saw the glow of the Northern Lights. I understand that they have been seen several times ofer recent weeks. I can remember as a child being taken out to see the Northern Lights when it seemed to me that the whole sky was flowing red.

Today we had 5 siskins feeding on peanuts at our bird table. This is the first time that they have come to our table and only the second time

that I have seen siskins in our parishes.

Apr 13 Heard both the chiff-chaff and Blackcap in the garden today making a total of 28 different kinds of birds this week; the number being helped by the overlap of summer and winter visitors.

Apr 17 I cannot account for the three dead blackbirds that we found on our lawn today. They were recently hatched and were grouped together as if they had been tipped out of a nest but there was no sign of the nest and no overhanging trees or bushes from which it might have fallen.
