SCOTLAND TO THE SIBFORDS

April 20th The first day of our holiday in Scotland. We dropped the car at the highest point on a narrow road that crossed a grouse moor. A wild spot almost entirely clothed in drab brown heather with the red grouse telling us to 'go back, go back.' From there we could see a curlew on a marshy piece of ground and 13 mountain hares, including 5 playing follow-my-leader. They were just changing from their white winter coat to their summer one and looked quite patchy. They did not seem to be at all bothered by our presence. A little further on we stopped to look at a red grouse sitting on the heather covered roadside bank only about 5 yds from the car window. I was surprised also to see a pair of grey partridge and even some pheasants among the heather on the edge of the moor.

April 21st Visited a 'site of special scientific interest' at a place where limestone was once quarried and burnt, to see whether the orchids were in bloom, but we were saddened to find that motorcyclists had been using it as a scramble track and had chewed it up badly. However as we walked up to the SSSL we did see a pair of redshank, 2 blackcock and 2 brown hares.

April 22nd Walked along the side of a hill where limestone has been mined and burnt for centuries. The mine entrances in the hillside are still viable as are the tracks leading to groups of kilns. Now parts of the hillside grow masses of primroses which seemed to be in smaller but more numerous clumps than we get down south. The leaves of devilsbit scabious were also plentiful, holding promise for later on.

April 23rd After visiting Stormont Loch nature reserve and seeing a big variety of water birds and also some sandmartins, we walked through a pine wood to an area of water we had noted on the map. As we approached it the noise became deafening. The peeped through the bushes to find that it came from hundreds, if not thousands, of nesting pairs of black-headed gulls. There was also a dab chick swimming amongst them - a deaf one I would think.

April 24th Climbed Dunyat this morning. A lovely little mountain with the gorse at its best on its lower slopes. It is formed from a volcanic rock known as agglomerate which is a natural concrete with an aggregate of broken stone, most of which would pass through a 6 inch screen, cemented together with lava. Marvellous views of snow covered peaks, some very distant, from the summit. There was a raven up there too. April 26th Home again. Of all the birds we saw in Scotland, which as well as the ones I have noted, icluded hooded crows, wheatears, oyster catchers and one dipper, the sandmartins gave me most pleasure. They used to be quite common round Sibford but the old sandpits where they nested have been filled in or planted with trees. Hay 6th Found pink purslane growing locally. It had seeded itself around to make a nice patch.

May 11th A flycatcher is back on the tree by our window today.



The Volunteers, who man the telephone each weekday, have all undergone appropriate training and provide a sympathetic and non-judgemental listening service, which is confidential.

The problems presented to the Helpline cover a very wide field, ranging from personal relationships to problems at school, work or home.

Cilford Gower Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Pari 'n eting was held in the Primary School on April 21st and was attended by fourteen members of the public

In his report the Chairman stated that during the last year five council meetings had been held together with two extraordinary meetings, first to declare the vacancy caused by the death of Mr L Poulton and the second to co-opt Mr John Parmiter onto the Council.

During the year 11 planning applications had been received, discussed by the Council and commented upon. The Council had also discussed various matters with the Highways Dept. including repairs to potholes and the reinforcement of the verge past the telephone kiosk. It was anticipated that work to the verge would be carried out in the near future. New signs had been provided by the Highways Dept. to footpaths and bridleways.

Mrs Hicks has been appointed as the Councils representative on the Primary School board of governors.

A Public meeting was held last summer to discuss the introduction of a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme. The meeting was very well attended and a committee was formed after the meeting under the supervision of Mr John Mulley.

The village trees had been pruned and the Chairman expressed the Council's appreciation to Mr Gasby and Mr Stewart for their time and effort in the pruning and clearing away of the debris. Last summer a group of ladies helped by their husbands and followers spent one Saturday morning cleaning out the village pond. This proved to be a more difficult task than perhaps thought when standing on the side feeding the ducks and the Chairman expressed the Council's appreciation to all concerned for the great effort which was borne with such good humour. Mrs Anne Spicer had been appointed as Community Advisor for Civil Protection and she outlined the workings of the Community Services Volunteers which encompasses fire fighting, health and safety, nuclear fall-out and other topics. Training courses and meetings are held fortnightly at Bodicote House, and Waverly House, Bicester. Mrs Spicer called for volunteers for the organisations so if anyone is interested please contact her on Swalcliffe 690.

A number of matters were raised by the members of the public including speeding and the possibility having a speed limit, village signs on the extremities and street signs within the village, neighbourhood watch scheme signs and the lack of grass cutting and gully maintenance in the Colony.

Problems caused by the Tanners buses were also raised and discussed at length and the Council undertook to write to Mr Allpress and try to resolve the problems. Parking in the area adjacent to the pond was also discussed and concern expressed regarding the lack of access for emergency services caused by the parked vehicles in this area. The Chairman reported that this had been discussed with the Highways Dept. who had sent the Council's comments onto the Police.

Mr Baadsgaard reported on the accounts of the Sibford Gower Town Istates Charity and said that generally the Trust had had a successful year. The free bus service to Chipping Norton and Banbury, financed by the Charity, was being well used and would continue. Appreciation was generally expressed for this service. The meeting closed at 8.35 p.m.

Sibford Gower Parish Council - Annual Meeting

Following the Annual Parish Meeting the Parish Council held its Annual Meeting on the 5th May. Mr R E Payne was elected Chairman and Mrs M A Hicks Vice Chairwoman.

The matters raised at the Annual Parish Meeting were discussed at length and the Council will be contacting the County Council Highways Dept regarding signs against speeding, street signs, grass cutting and the effective cleaning of drains and gullies to see what can be done.

Neighbourhood watch signs were also discussed and Mr J Mulley gave the Council details of costs and designs for such signs, albeit the final design and numbers required had yet to be resolved.

The general problems relating to parking in the village were discussed and the request made in previous editions of the Scene for responsible parking still stands With respect to the complaints expressed at the Annual Parish Meeting regarding Tanners Coaches the Council had written to Mr Allpress prior to this meeting and had received a constructive and detailed reply in which he undertook to take steps to try and eliminate much of the annoyance, and some iprovements have taken place.
