The Samaritan collecting boxes contained £9864 as a result of the door-to-door collection gathered in recently in the Sibfords. We received a note expressing great gratitude for our generosity. The proportion was roughly two-thirds one-third Gower to Ferris, which reflects accurately the size of the two villages.

NATURE NOTES

June 22nd - The dry weather is making birds and mammals short of food I noticed an ant-hill with a large hole opened in the side by a badger, and also a wasp's nest similarly dealt with. While I was mowing a field of hay, yesterday I counted 12 mistlethrushes looking for slugs etc. that the mower exposed

July 3rd - We have heard a quail calling for several days in our barley. Once it was within a few yards of me but I still did not catch sight of it

<u>July 17th</u> - The cornbinding of winter barley is an exceptionally dusty job this year. I expect yhe dust comes from the sooty moulds that have formed on the stickiness left by the aphids earlier in the summer.

July 19th - There were masses of flying ants rising from a nest in our garden this evening. I would have liked to have had time to check on other nests to see whether they do all take to the wing at the same time. I think they must do, because I can remember seeing them like a dust cloud round the elm trees that used to stand at the top of Oddie's field.

July 20th - This is not an easy time of the year for squirrels. The ones in our garden have stripped a hawthorn bush of haws and are now working on the beechnuts, which, as far as I can see, have not yet formed a kernel, so they must be getting some nourishment from the green cases. I have also heard of a badger killing some hens recently; a sure sign that they are very hard pressed to find food. I can remember this happening twice on our farm; once during prolonged frost when a badger lifted the slide lid on a hen cub to get in, the lid dropping shut behind it My father shot that one, but not before it had killed 48 out of the 50 pullets and dropped to sleep in there. The other time was during a drought when one chewed its way into a plywood coop.

July 21st - Whirlwinds have taken up barley straw and sprinkled it over much of the Ferris during the last few days.

August 6th - Combined the last of the wheat today. Some years we have hardly started harvest by this date. Wheat has yielded well. Winter barley was almost up to average, but the grain was not very plump. The spring barley suffered most from the dry weather and gave less than half its average yield I have only measured 2.96 inches of rain in the 3 months to July, which compares with 2.83 in 1975 and 2.68 in 1976, two other exceptionally dry years.

August 19th - Picked a deformed acorn from one of our oak trees this evening. A book that I have which was written by Arnold Darlington in 1972 says that the deformity is caused by the grub of a gall wasp and was at that date confined to the Exeter area but spreading. It has been a good year for galls on oak trees. Earlier in the year there were a lot of oak apples and cherry galls on the tree between the Ferris and the Elm.
