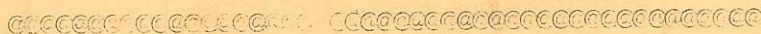

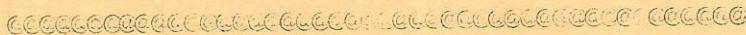
MEALS FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

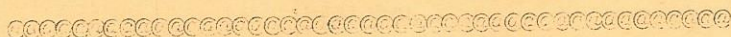

Nature Notes

Sept. I think that badgers will eat most things. I hear that one has been taking apples and pears from the lower branches of bush trees during the drought, but stopped when the rain came in the third week of September, when other food, probably worms and slugs etc, was drawn to the surface.

Sept 25th This morning there was a covey of grey partridge and upward of a hundred chaffinches and greenfinches feeding on shed cornflower seed at the farm.

Oct 4th Finches certainly seem to find cornflower seed very palatable. There was a charm of Goldfinches, between fifty and a hundred strong, on a patch of cornflower in the farm garden today.

Oct 13th I hear that a buzzard has been seen in Sibford recently, but I have not been lucky enough to see it, and I expect it will have moved on by now.

Oct 16th We are getting a very good crop of Spanish chestnuts from the tree in our garden. Our weather this year has suited them, being nearer than usual to that of their native Mediterranean area.

The enormous crop of apples, many still unpicked, reminds me of the old rhyme:-

Michaelmas time and a little before
Half the apple goes with the core;
Christmas time and a little after
It's core and all and "thank-ee master."

Oct 19th I picked some seed heads from a wood sorrel plant that we have in our garden only to have them explode in the warmth of my hand, throwing the seed for several feet. Unlike the pods on some plants that open suddenly to scatter the seed, after exploding this seed head is still intact, but it has somehow thrown out the brown seed and some other pieces about the same size as the seed, which look like chips of white polystyrene. I think these must be their power source.

What is Civil Protection?

Civil protection is concerned with planning for the care of those caught up in a major disaster, natural or man-made. Such a disaster could be caused by an earthquake, extremes of weather, a transport or industrial accident, chemical pollution or the effects of war.

While the 999 emergency services cope with the immediate effects of most disasters, some require more resources than are normally available. Some emergencies present problems which need co-ordination on a larger scale.

To provide this essential back-up, the emergency services and many other professional and voluntary organisations work together to prepare plans which can be brought into effect if and when needed. This overall function is known as civil protection.

BETTER LATE THAN NEVER

Forty years after the end of World War II, young 'Ted Haynes', eldest son of the late 'Ted' Haynes and Catherine (Bessie) Haynes of Sibford Ferris, has recently received from Russia, a Commemorative Medal, as a token of appreciation of the part he played whilst serving on board Royal Naval Destroyer's as a Gunnery Officer, escorting Merchant Ship Convoys to their country.

Ted volunteered for the Navy in 1940, signing on for seven years, and served on Destroyers, H.M.S. Winchelsea, Newark and Impulsive, being actively involved in the sinking of the battleship Scharnhorst on December 26th 1943. His last two years were spent on board the Aircraft Carrier Indomitable.

He joined as an Ordinary Seaman in 1940 and had attained the rank of Chief Petty Officer by his retirement in 1947.

He was still involved with the Navy for twelve years after 1947, being a R. V.R. 1st Lieutenant in the Sea Cadets in Ashford, Kent, where he has lived for the past forty four years, ill health forced him to resign.

His Mother is the proud owner of a photograph of him escorting the late Lord Louis Mountbatten when he inspected the Cadets.
