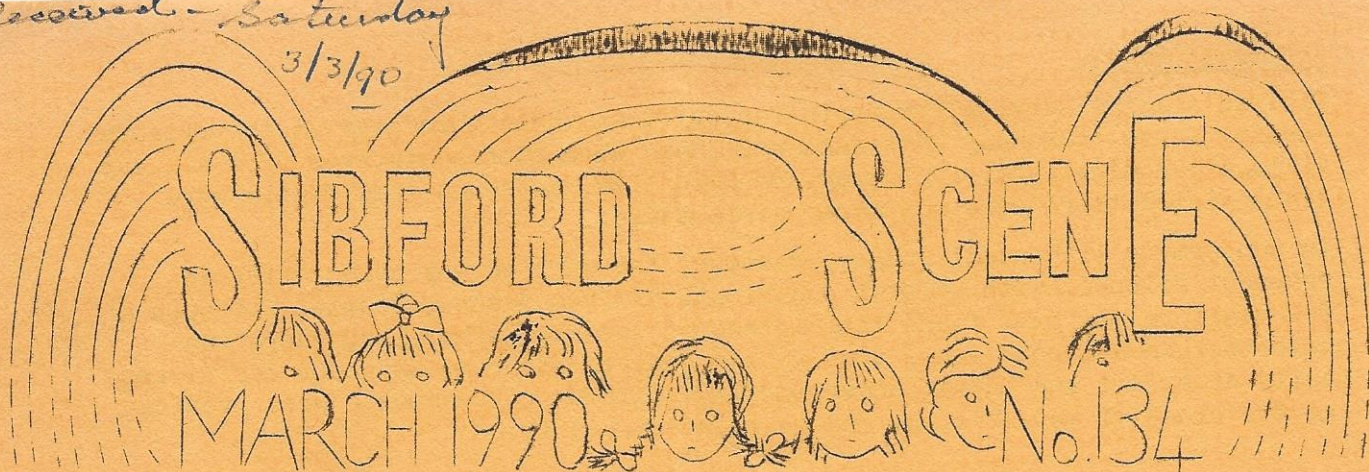

HELP LINE

Sibford Ferris Parish Councillors have recently been informed of a Communications System being supplied by Cherwell District Council to any elderly or disabled person who feels they might benefit from such a facility. Basically the scheme consists of a special telephone receiver which is rented from the District Council and which enables the person in need to contact a volunteer on call who guarantees to respond immediately to the request for help. For the scheme to be viable it would be necessary to have a small group of volunteers to provide cover on a rota basis. ## BLENNHEIM PALACE, Woodstock.

I really must this year, and particularly now I live so near, visit the above. While I was again 'passing through' Woodstock recently, I stopped off to find out a little more about this attraction - I only looked through the entrance gates but what a magnificent view. Just to visit the Park would roll away the stress.

The Park is open daily (9 a.m. - 5 p.m.) throughout the year and charges, at time of going to press, are £2.50 per car (50p for pedestrians) but I understand this is shortly being increased slightly. Coaches are welcome and there is an inclusive ticket.

The Palace is open daily to the public from the 12th March this year until 31st October, from 10.30 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. (last admission 4.45 p.m.) The individual inclusive admission charges are:

The tour of the Palace takes about an hour. NATURE NOTES

Jan. 25th - During today's exceptionally powerful gales, the trunk of one of our scots pine trees snapped in two places simultaneously, the main of the trunk falling across the telephone wires, while the top passed over some other trees, coming to earth about 40 yds away. An engineer tells me that the stresses in the trunk could have been similar to those in a hacksaw blade, that when bowed, will always break in more than once place. We also lost some major branches from the cedar in our garden, which now lacks protection from the south-west, since a row of ash trees was felled a few years ago.

Jan. 27th - A group of people using ferrets managed to get 21 of our rabbits today. This may check the increasing population which, on our farm, is at its highest level since the arrival of myxomatosis.

Feb. 12th - While demolishing an old building, I found that a supporting post was made from an old wooden pump. The 4 inch hole bored precisely down the centre and copper lined for the bottom 18 inches, was filled almost to the top with moss which must have been put there by nesting tits.

Feb. 13th - A bluetit with a hooked beak and a twisted tail feather has visited our bird table for the last two years. As it was having difficulty feeding, I trapped it and clipped the hooked upper mandible back to the same length at the lower one. I watched to see if it would come back to feed and was amazed to see another one with identical deformities; so I treated that one likewise, cutting away a full half inch of beak. It seems to have helped them considerably. I would think that they must both be from the same family.
