


THANKYOU



In Your Garden - June

How thankful we all are to have a garden, whilst we are in lockdown; with lunch outside, comfy steamer chairs, and books waiting to be read, it felt like a holiday. Lovely flowers, weeds and lawns all growing up a great speed, so we had better catch up with the jobs. There are plenty!

1. Push a hoe through the borders where it is weedy, and check that the taller plants are staked.

2. Cut the lawn once a week, and always trim the edges.

3. Privet and box can be trimmed back now, check first there isn't a birds nest there. Magnolia trees can have a trim this month too.

4. When flowering shrubs have finished, i.e. philadelphus, weigelia, deutzia etc., they need pruning. Leave it any later and you won't have so many flowers next spring.

5. Clematis Montana will have finished by the end of June, so untangle the stems and give it a hardish prune.

6. You can now take hardwood cuttings of lavender, rosemary forsythia and caryopteris, and softwood cuttings of fuschias and hydrangeas.

7. Bugs! Keep checking for greenfly, whitefly, (look under the leaves) lily beetles, caterpillars, vine weevils, and my favourite – slugs.

8. I took down the bubblewrap keeping my greenhouse frostproof a few weeks ago, and it all needed a hasty spring clean. I spend hours in there, ("fidgeting with my plants") apparently, pricking out seedlings, planting them out, potting on cuttings and feeding and watering. Apparently I talk to the plants too, but I do rather miss all my friends at the moment....

9. Any newly planted trees and shrubs will need regular watering, unless we have a soaking wet summer..

10 All plants will benefit for a liquid feed, and veggies will need watering every day as they grow. Bedding plants can go out, and dahlias will need bamboos to keep them upright. Enjoy June. Roses everywhere, scents, colours, birdsong, tea and cakes on the lawn, hopefully with our friends and children soon.

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NATURE NOTES

The Spring flowers seem to have put on a good display this year helped by the unusually sunny weather on many days in April and early May. The Bluebells on Swalcliffe Common have been commented on by several people.

In the past I have noticed empty shells of the Roman or Edible snail on the Common but this year I have seen a few live snails so there is obviously a colony there.

There seem to have been even greater numbers of Orange-tip butterflies than usual but I have not seen as many Brimstones this year. Several people have reported seeing Holly Blue butterflies These are the most likely of the blue butterflies to be observed in gardens. The spring generation lay their eggs on holly (female holly trees only) and other flowering shrubs where the caterpillars will eat the developing flowers and berries. The second generation of adults that appear in late summer lay their eggs on ivy.

It has been good to see a young Grass Snake in our garden pond along with several Smooth Newts. Megan Gilkes has reported seeing a full-grown Grass Snake (over 3 feet in length) heading toward the Sibford School pond.

Anyone collecting wild garlic for use in cooking may have noticed that there are two distinct species. There is the native broad-leaved Wood Garlic or Ramsons and there is the Triangular-stalked Garlic which has much narrower leaves. The latter is an invasive species brought over to the UK from the Mediterranean. Both are equally good to eat.


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SIBFORDS WALKING GROUP

GREAT TASTE

QUICK KIMCHI

Ingredients

1 chinese cabbage	3 garlic cloves – crushed
1 in piece ginger, grated	2 tbsp fish sauce
2 tbsp chilli paste	1 tbsp caster sugar
3 tbsp rice vinegar	8 radishes, coarsely grated
2 carrots, coursely grated	4 spring onions, finely shredded

Method

1. Slice cabbage into 2.5cm strips. Throw into a bowl, mix with 1 tbsp salt, then forget about it for 1 hour. Make the kimchi paste by blendng the garlic, ginger, fish sauce, chilli paste, sugar and vinegar toether in a small bowl

2. Rinse cabbage under cold water and dry thoroughly. Chuck it into a large bowl and toss through the paste along with the radishes, carrots and spring onions.


Now - serve straight away, or do what I do and pack it into a large jar, seal and leave to ferment at room temperature overnight, then shove it into the fridge. It will keep for up to 2 weeks, so that you can eat it whenever you fancy - great for breakfast!!




















POET'S CORNER



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DID YOU KNOW?

'Sibford 1939 – The War Years

Some memories from Terry Cemm – a cousin of Ina and Arnold Lamb

I started school at the Gower in September 1939. There were two classrooms separated by a heavy sliding door and a smaller room where Tilly Tarver was the infant's teacher. Her room had a well-guarded open fire which was used in the winter to thaw out the crate of third of a pint milk bottles into which the milk was frozen so that it pushed the cardboard top an inch above the bottle. There was a large brown cupboard in which were kept teaching aids and other treasures. On the other side of the fireplace was a large rocking horse on which good children were rewarded with a ride, I can't remember ever being allowed on it! The senior room, where Mr Chard was teacher, with his liberal use of a ruler to rap you over the knuckles, was his method of teaching maths. I can't remember much about the room, but I can remember his treatment of my knuckles.

Outside, there was a small tarmac play area, a little field which had a stool ball pitch on it, and behind the school, a steep bank with grass, trees and bushes under which I remember a large snake-skin being found. This caused some consternation. In winter, the tarmac was used for an icy slide, which was very popular with boys and girls. Boys played marbles, whips and tops and football with tennis balls. Girls played hopscotch, skipping, ball games and chanting games such as "The farmer wants a wife" into which the boys were dragged.

Walking to and from school we had to carry gas masks; various bags and boxes quickly got worn out so used large round Grapenut cereal tins and thick rope which lasted a long time. Air raid warnings were given by the policeman riding around both villages on his bicycle, blowing his whistle with a white board hung around his neck with "air raid warning" in red on it and "all clear" in green, when he turned it round.

The journey to school often started in Joe Canning's milking shed, when his son Mick and I would collect up the twelve cows, walk them round the track into the road at the top of Mannings Hill where David Dyer would join us and help take the cows to a field in Burdrop where we left them to be collected after school and returned for evening milking. So that Mick could play cricket, I often helped him to do his jobs chopping mangolds, chaff cutting and loading stalls with hay and cow cake. In those days Joe sat on a three-legged stool milking with his head against the cow, singing songs such as "Linden Lee" and "The Kerry Dancers." The milk would be poured from the bucket into the cooler and run down into a churn which was loaded into his three wheeled Raleigh van from which he delivered it to the door and ladled it out into jugs and bowls.Watch out, watch out there are scammers about
