

SIBFORD FERRIS PARISH COUNCIL

Dog Waste Bins

After requests from parishioners it was agreed at the last Parish Council meeting to purchase 2 additional dog waste bins.

Defibrillator Training

Unfortunately due to COVID restrictions defibrillator training cannot currently go ahead as the training is quite hands on and requires fairly close contact. The Parish Council will put out a notice when the training is able to go ahead. In the meantime there is signage on the defibrillators giving instructions on how to use them should they be required.

Village Recategorisation

Sibford Ferris Parish Council have submitted a response to the Cherwell local Plan 2040 requesting that the villages of Sibford Ferris and Sibford Gower be treated as two separate villages (as we believe they should have been during the last plan) and therefore be recategorised from a single 'Category A' village to two individual appropriately categorised villages. In a recent zoom meeting Cherwell District Council (CDC) agreed that they will resurvey all 24 Category A villages. Sibford Ferris Parish Council are pleased with this commitment from CDC and have requested that they be fully involved in the process and are given the ability to engage the community in the plans. Please keep a look out for any further communication about this process as this may be our last chance to have a say in what development takes place in our village before the government make significant changes to planning laws that could take our future out of our hands.

In Your Garden - October

- 1. It is autumn. I love this time of year, watching the leaves change colour, and seeing them spin down in the wind. I have to admit that I still like to catch them to count how many happy years I have left. Stop dreaming we have work to do. Rake up the leaves, and put them in a compost bin or better still, put them into black sacks, thoroughly wet them, and puncture plenty of holes in the sacks. Then tie them up and hide them behind the shed. It took 18 months, but mine were full of marvellous soft, black compost, and little wiggly red worms.
- 2. October is the best time to plant bare-root roses ,hedges, and trees, whilst the soil is still warm. But keep them very well watered.
- 3. Cut back perennials in the border, and divide any that are too crowded. Leave penstemons standing, to help protect them from frost.
- 4. Time to go mad, and spend some time, and money at the garden centre. Plenty of plants to buy to smarten up your pots, and any gaps in the borders. One of my favourites is Bellis Perennis, she stays small, keeps on flowering, and looks great lining a path, or just cheering up a gap. Pots of little violas, planted together with small iris bulbs are always charming. If you are buying new roses, it is always better to buy bare root ones, rather than those in a pot.
- 5. Great time to take cuttings, particularly salvias, penstemons, geraniums and flowering shrubs. Keep collecting seeds of your favourite annuals, and leave some seedheads on for the birds.
- 6. As you tidy up the borders, and cut things back, you can take out all the bamboos and stakes you have used for supports. Store them away in the shed. They tend to rot if you leave them out all winter.
- 7. Must admit I have not got my hyacinths potted up yet, but full of good intentions! They make such a nice Christmas present to take with you to a party (if we are ever allowed to party again) for your hostess, And a row of them along the dining table at Christmas looks fab.

- 8. Pick and store you apples and pears in a dry and frostproof place, but use up all the windfalls as fast as you can. Try making a batch of apple strudels, (num num), and stowing them away in the freezer. Trouble with writing about food is that I immediately feel hungry
- 9. We shall probably get the first frost soon, and that will blacken the dahlias. You can cut them back, and leave them in the ground, but only if you heap them up with soil, or woodchips, bracken, anything that will stop the ground getting frosted there. I tend to dig mine up, clean them, turn them upside down to dry right off, then put them in a big box covered with dry compost and store where they won't get frosted.
- 10. Help! The mice have got into the greenhouse and torn up some envelopes full of seeds I wanted to keep, and found the bird seed I keep in there. Big mistake. So mousetraps at once, and load them with cheese, or chocolate. They can't resist either. Neither can I. Must be time for or supper by now.

NATURE NOTES

The late Summer sunshine has brought out a number of butterflies. It is good to see a few Painted Ladies, freshly emerged Brimstones and Red Admirals which are attracted to over-ripe blackberries and plums.

On a recent walk across the Sibford School playing fields I noticed quite a large flock of Lesser Black-backed Gulls paddling with their feet to draw worms to the surface.

Caroline Long drew my attention to the Shaggy Parasol Mushrooms that are appearing in a number of field margins around the villages. These are good to eat like several other species of wild mushroom but of course you do have to be absolutely certain of your identification. There are a few extremely poisonous species some of which can be fatal if eaten.

There have been a few sightings of Elephant Hawk-moth caterpillars making their way across lawns and paths. These large brown caterpillars with very distinctive eye makings are probably making their way from fuchsia bushes where they have been feeding to find a suitable place to pupate.

At Sue Sabin's small-holding open day we ran a moth session and were able to show people a good number of Autumn flying species including a couple of the very impressive Clifden Nonpareil moths.

Having now recorded 640 species of moth in my garden I am surprised that new ones keep turning up. Of particular note this year was a very distinctive micro moth called Ethmia bipunctella. It has never been recorded before in Oxfordshire and in the surrounding counties just once in Buckinghamshire in 1921 and once in Berkshire in 1991.

Nothing on the crime front for this month. However, the following is worth a chuckle:

A Frenchman in his 80s took out more than just the fly he was attempting to swat. The unidentified man was reportedly eating dinner when he became irritated by the sound of a fly. Although we have had a few children off with seasonal coughs and colds, which is very normal at this time of year, attendance overall has been very high and the children seem really happy to be back in school with their

friends and teachers. Our new Littlest Acorn Reception children have settled quickly into class routines and are now attending school full time after a gently phased welcome into 'big' school.

As is typical of the national picture, our children are organised into class 'bubbles' with assigned adults and slightly more regimented classroom layouts, and we are doing lots of extra cleaning and washing of hands! Our pupils are managing this very well, adapting to the new 'normal' with the sense of responsibility, consideration and care for others that is typical of our school community.

Despite the need to get used to a lot of new rules and different ways of working, learning continues to be fun. Even with our focus on ensuring all pupils are quickly up to speed with any learning they may have missed during lockdown, particularly in literacy and maths, we are still intent on making sure that learning is broad and balanced across the wider curriculum with lots of exciting topic themes being explored across the school.

Our younger children are exploring the topic of Dinosaur Planet, finding out all about fossils and our local prehistory, including the fact that during the Jurassic Period much of the area local to us lay under a warm, shallow sea.

Our older children are exploring the themes of Gods & Mortals, immersing themselves in Greek myth and legend, and Alchemy Island, which has a strong fantasy focus alongside the scientific theme of changing materials.

In the first few days back, our Year 3 & 4 children (7/8 years old) explored a lovely story called A Tale of Two Feathers, exploring the difference between the daytime

and nocturnal worlds through the friendship of an owl and a kingfisher. As part of this miniproject, the children created some very beautiful and detailed observation drawings of feathers, exploring line, tone and texture. Very well done, Willow Class!

DID YOU KNOW?

Post Offices in the Sibfords – 3. The Gower

Mr Frederick Inns, great grandfather to Fred Inns who still lives in the Gower, was the first Post Master in the Gower when the post office opened in 1884. He lived on Main Street with his wife and they had nine children although not all survived. He sported a very long white beard having declared that he would never shave. One day, doing a spot of plumbing

work, he accidentally set fire to his beard. He managed to put out the fire but his famously long white beard was temporarily reduced! Fred remembers that his great grandfather always said he could tell the state of villager's homes by

how well they wrapped their parcels!

His three unmarried children, Annie, Winifred and Ewart lived in the Old Post Office after his death. The eldest, Annie was a teacher who walked to Epwell every day to teach in the school there, while Miss Kyte, who lived in Epwell walked to Sibford to teach in the village school. The must have often passed each other on a dark winter's morning! Winifred ran the Post Office while Ewart was a plumber. The sisters continued to run the post office after Annie's retirement from teaching until Winifred died. Annie eventually moved down to Barley Close House for a short while before she died surrounded by her

family. The Inns family had been providing the post office services to the village for some 75 years. John and Mollie Mulley eventually bought the Old Post Office from the Inns family in 1972.
