

NATURE NOTES

"Greenhouse effect" which has maintained a nice balance of global temperature for millions of years but is now being upset by the increase in emissions of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases. The increase in temperature that could result from this is a matter of great concern. I read today that temperature records which date back to 1856 show that this year will be the 6th year out of the last 10 with a higher average temperature than any year prior to 1980. The record year was 1988 but 1990 will probably break the record again. This may just be a chance warm spell or it may not. It is a daunting thought that in a world with so many developing countries we may need to reduce emissions to pre-industrial revolution levels to reverse the process.

Oct 23 I was surprised to find field madder in bloom on a bare patch in the lawn this morning.


Nov 2 We have found more mushrooms this year than for several years past. I suppose in total they might add up to a pound or two. This is a far cry from 1899 when 3,353 lbs were sold from the farm to Boxolds of Banbury for 3d a pound - a total price of £41.18.3d. These were picked at about 100 lbs each day. I have heard that salt was applied to the most productive field, but whether anything more was done to encourage them I don't know.

Here at last is a contribution to the parish magazine of Sibford.

A COUNTRY CHRISTMAS IN UGANDA

"Will our November salaries - or perhaps September, or October, for primary teachers - come before Christmas?" my neighbours are wondering. Not much chance of a big spending spree here!

For most people, Christmas means having sugar in their tea - and plenty of it - and the only beef meal they will have in the year. Perhaps even the children will get some. If the husband can afford it, there may be new clothes for the family. Relatives get together in each others' homes on successive days to feast, and usually to drink traditional millet beer through tubes from a pot. No-one gets left out of the celebrations.

The neighbouring Catholic church is far too small for all who come to Mass. An altar is set up on the steps of the mission house. The concourse in front— is packed with people, standing, kneeling, or sitting on the palm mats they have brought, and joining in the local Padhola—style music, which goes with a swing.

Our Church of Uganda building is decked with purple and white bougainvillea, in vases and strung on wires above our heads. There is even a branch from a conifer. We are also packed out-all the children have to sit on mats on the floor, and people are squashed up in the pews. Most of the hymns surprise me by being translations of English favourites. 'See amid the winter's snow' is very popular. The weather here is hot and humid, but everyone sings with gusto. The central truth is the same - God has come in His love to share our lives as a human being.

"Walwa gi nedelo maduong", everyone greets each other. "Congratulations on the great day!"

VILLAGE HALL QUIZ

This popular annual event took place on 8th November. When we say 'popular' it has to be admitted that it was attended by rather fewer people than in previous years, though whether this was to do with the event, the publicity or counterattractions is not clear. Nevertheless all who cam enjoyed themselves.

As usual the Questionmaster, perhaps more widely known as the Vicar (even though technically he is the Rector!) had assembled groups of wide-ranging questions for each of the teams. Also as usual, even though the range of questions for each team contained similar categories, those not on the stage often claimed to be able to answer more of other teams' questions than they could manage of their own. And, again as usual, there was a marked lack of discipline in the audience who, when they thought they knew the answers uttered them in tones that could, . and sometimes did reach the contestants; all part of the fun, except perhaps for the Questionmaster and any members of teams who needed help and were hard of hearing!

Seven teams took part, some geographically selected and named, others representing their village organisation. It was good to see a young team of Warriner pupils ('The Warriner Wallies') entering and performing with credit even though, as someone has to, they came last in the final order; sad, perhaps to see the Church, winners in earlier years, unable to compete. Perhaps they did not wish to risk embarrassing their spiritual leader by winning, or worse, coming last.

The average number of points gained for the general questions was 36 (out of a possible 60), and for a string of musical questions including both pop and classical, 31 out of 54. The 'Horti' with 42 and Home Closers with 39 mounted a good challenge on the general questions. The former's knowledge of pop music let them down (26 on music) into 4th place, the latter held up well with 35. But they were beaten into second place by one point by the winners. The Cub Scouts (adult) team retained the Flinn Cup which they had won last year, scoring 41 and 34. Teams not already mentioned were, in final order of merit, Friends (3rd), Barley Bodgers, and Playgroup.

Once again we were indebted to the indefatigable providers of refreshments, to Keith Hicks (Mr Technics) for sound and vision but especially to Timothy Wimbush for finding the time and enthusiasm once again to provide no fewer than 210 questions for the evening.

An Evening of Local History

One Saturday evening in late October John and Beryl Gibbs from Hook Norton showed slides of the Sibfords in the early 1900's together with many of the old Hook Norton Railway and ironstone works. As the century draws to a close it was interesting to be reminded of how our villages looked at that time. There were pictures of Friends School classrooms and pupils, and several of Club Day celebrations in the village, even one of Eric as a boy holding his father's hand! Mrs Gibbs provided a fascinating background commentary on the slides,. with additional information and clarification from Mr Gibbs and from members of the audience who recognised friends and relations.

It was a rare opportunity to understand how different life was in Hook Norton and the Sibfords in relatively recent times. We are grateful to Mr and Mrs Gibbs for generously sharing their hobby with us and for providing an evening of old-style village entertainment. It would be good to have a repeat performance sometime in the future for those who missed it, and perhaps another evening on other villages and topics they have researched.



The competition at the November meeting, for a Book Mark, was won by Miss Harris, 2nd Mrs Cox, 3rd Mrs Grasby.



GARDENING NOTES

Some will say "Who wants to be in the garden in December", but a good gardener is not a fair weather one and there is always something to do. If you want an indoor job and it rains there are plenty of seed catalogues on offer and also for plants and trees for delivery in the Spring. One of the joys of winter "gardening" is planning for next year. Trees and shrubs can still be planted during open weather. Provide protection for newly planted evergreens, especially conifers, until they get their roots down and can fend for themselves ridy up in the greenhouse and ensure that there is adequate ventilation. Too much moisture can cause rot to set in to those plants. Remove fallen leaves from plants and alpines generally. If you have any seeds which need stratifying or just need a spell of winter cold to assist in germination put them in jars of compost and place in a north facing position with a wire or net covering against mice. Finish digging over your borders and vegetable plot to allow Jack Frost to do the hard work of breaking down clods for you.
