#### NATURE NOTES

MAR 3rd I saw a Muntjak on Swalcliffe Common this morning. They now seem to have spread over most of the South Midlands. One more case of an introduced specie multiplying at an amazing rate.

MAR 4th Since the banning of the agricultural chemicals, that 20 years ago brought the sparrow hawk close to extinction in this area, they have made a remarkable recovery. We frequently see them now, and one settled for a few moments in a tree just outside our window, while we were having breakfast today.

MAR 10th Birds are taking more food from our bird table than at any time this winter. It may be that some people have stopped feeding them, now that the weather has improved. MAR 13th A lovely warm day. The first frogspawn appeared in our garden pond today. A water boatman landed on a black plastic sheet that we were spreading. I tried to carry it to the nearest water but it took to the air again. I had always thought that they only flew at night. We have only seen one peacock and one brinstone butterfly. On such a warm day I would have expected more to come out of hibernation. I hope this does not mean that very few have survived the winter. It is amazing how the call of the herring gull carries. When I heard their calls this afternoon I looked up, expecting to see them just above my head, but I just managed to spot them, wheeling at a great height.

MAR 14th I picked up six more water boatmen from the plastic sheet this morning and put them into a cattle trough. I suppose that the shiny black plastic must look like a stretch of water to their eyes.

Have you ever researched the history of your village, tried to date a building or searched for an old photograph of a local scene? If so, you may be interested to learn of the establishment of a new "Centre for Oxfordshire Studies" by the County Council on the second floor of Oxford Central Library in Westgate.

This exciting new venture, due to open in the summer of 1991, will draw together resources relating to Oxfordshire from all sections of the Department of Leisure and Arts to create a centrally located resource centre.

The Centre will comprise the present Local Studies collection of books, pamphlets, maps and photographs with the addition of material from the County Museum, Oxfordshire Archives, the Site and Monuments Record and the Countryside Section. The aim is to make all these resources more readily accessible, and to this end new technology such as on-line catalogues and video-discs will be

brought in where appropriate and when funds permit! A Keeper of Photographs and Oral History took up post at the beginning of January to develop and exploit the county's holdings in these fields, and specialists from various services will be available for consultation. The Centre will be headed by Dr Malcolm Graham, who is well known to many as the Local Studies Librarian and author of several books on Oxfordshire's history.

As well as being a hub for research and study, it is hoped that the Centre will also offer an introduction and stimulus to visitors who have an interest in their environment. A display area will be created where attractive and informative material can be exhibited, including items presently only available on request, and local societies and groups will be encouraged to make full use of the facilities.

## HARRY WILLIAMS/LAMBS POOL NATURE RESERVE

This Five Acre reserve was given to the Berks. Bucks & Oxon Naturalist Trust by Mr & Mrs J.A. Lamb of Sibford Ferris. It is also named in memory of Harry Williams who was its manager until his death in 1987. Since great emphasis is now being put on wetland conservation by all conservation societies, not only in this country, but in Europe also, such a reserve as this one is of great importance.

As well as the preservation of areas where wildlife is known to be threatened, the trust also liases with farmers and landowners to encourage and advise them in nature conservation on their own land. It also, through the "Watch" Groups instructs and encourages children in the protection and preservation of wildlife.

On May 12th the foxholes reserve near Kingham holds its open day. This is an excellent opportunity to see at first hand the work of the Trust on 100 acre woodland reserve. Guided walks, teas and other attractions forchildren provide an excellent outing for the family. On 22nd June Mr & Mrs Henbrey of Virginia Cottage are kindly holding a coffee morning. 


