Nature Notes



April 21st - Heard our first blackcap of the season. Each year we have a pair that spend the summer in and around our garden. We don't look for the nest, as, with a good part of our garden being covered in nettles etc. we would be more likely to destroy it accidentally, than find it.

April 23rd - Last week I threw out some sweet chestnuts that had got too old to use, and watched a squirrel bury them at an average rate of two nuts a minute, and wondered if it would ever find them again. However, today a squirrel came and dug one up almost as quickly as it had buried it.

April 27th - Watched a grey wagtail very cleverly hovering to take flies out of the air and take them to its nest under a tree root. This is the first nest I have ever found locally.

May 1st - A handsome starling with some white tail feathers that I saw today near Home Close could well be the one that visited our bird table last year.

May 6th - Having not seen any tree sparrows locally this year, I saw two yesterday and another group of six today.

May 16th - A beautiful pair of Jays visited our garden today. If they were not such a threat to nesting birds we would welcome their return.

May 17th - We heard the bang of a bird flying into a window this morning. I went out to find that it was the male blackcap. It flew from the lawn into the yew hedge so it may be all right. Quite a few birds have died after hitting our windows over the years.

May 18th - I have not heard the blackcap sing today and fear the worst.

It is always nice to read a book that reflects your own views. I have been dipping into "A Gentle Plea for Chaos" written by Mirabel Osler, in which she makes a plea for less of the rigorous planning of gardens which seems to be so fashionable at the moment. She also feels strongly about the mania for neatness that tends to turn villages into suburbs.

May 19th - I have seen the male blackcap but still no song; perhaps it has a headache.


Saw a linnet in the garden this morning and a pair of pied wagtails having a bath in our garden pond.


May 20th - Our flycatcher has again returned from Africa to appear on its usual perch, while we were having breakfast; what navigation!

Raffle - Later in the term the PTA will be running a large raffle which will be drawn at the fun day. It is hoped that this will raise a lot of money for the PTA to spend on items for the school, so please be generous and buy lots of tickets.

SIBFORD FERRIS ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

There was a very disappointing attendance at the recent Annual Parish Meeting - perhaps an indication that a wider advertising of the event is required.

The Chairman's report included the following items -

Street Lighting - Tenders have been received and accepted from MEB for 4 light columns (to include the additional light required in Cotswold Close) to the sum of £3,242 of which we should be able to recupe approximately £2,100 from the District Council by way of a grant.

Tysoe Fire Brigade - A proposal from Warwickshire CC to close the Tysoe Fire Station had been noted and the Parish Council wrote an objection to such a closure as Tysoe give us good cover should Hook Norton not be available. We do not yet know of the final decision.

Planning - The major planning approved in the past year was Tanners Coach Yard where outline permission was given to develop this site for housing. No details as to number or size of houses has yet been applied for.

Grants - We get many requests for grants from various bodes. Some are of obvious benefit to parishioners eg Sibford Scene, Play Area and Chipping Norton Theatre. Others having a more tenuous connection make our decision more difficult eg. Citizens Advice Bureau, Warriner School, Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association. We would like to know if anyone has any views on the way we make grants - should they be extended, are we giving too many or are you happy with what we are doing at the moment?

Parish Precept - Cllr. Clipson giving the Financial Report said that the Precept requirement for 1991092 had been set at £1230 and pointed out that this figure placed the Parish at the lower end on the scale of charges for the district.

SIBFORD GOVER PARISH COUNCIL AGM

Our Village takes its 'Cue' from Eric

Last year our Council challenged World Snooker for viewing ratings - and came second! This year it decided to hold the event a week later and was rewarded with an attendance of four Councillors and eight noble citizens.

The dust covers having been removed from the table and the green baize carefully brushed, our Chairman 'cued' off, and softly grazed the reds with a gentle Report.

He was followed by John (the Clerk) Berry who smashed into the reds, sending them in all directions, and then potted them one by one - accounts - potholes - grass verges - planning - road signs - new bus timetables.

As no representative from the Estate charity was available, our Clerk comtinued onto the green, reporting that, despite many good charity donations, the annual income over expenditure had amounted to about £10,000.

John (no, not Parrott!) Mulley took the blue and reported that, after cannoning off a multitude of cushions of 'form filling' and 'bureaucrecy', he hoped that, sometime in the next decade, permission would be granted for the erection of Neighbourhood Watch signs on all roads leading to the Village.

With only one colour remaining, the referee then opened the Meeting to the breathless and expectant eight villagers. Fred (no, not Davis) Inns attacked the black - the dark sinister failure to treat our Conservation Area seriously and effectively.

Eric donned his white gloves and dashed from pocket to pocket to prevent the black from being 'sunk' as it cannoned round the table, with observations on red brick houses on skylines - wanton felling of trees - drainage - cars parked on the highway without road fund licences. In the end the referee was effective and the black remained on the table for Fred to tackle again next year.

The lights were dimmed and the dust covers replaced - as a lone voice wondered aloud about the amount of interest our Conservative District Councillor took in his Parish Council. Using his 'God-given' Filofax, which he keeps under his cap, our Chairman reported that our District Councillor had been advised of every meeting, but other commitments had prevented him attending more than once in the last three years.

GARDENING NOTES

'The Darling Rose Buds of May'

To increase your stock of roses, you can buy them, grow them from cuttings or from seed. It is also surprisingly easy to do what the professionals do, ie. budding, which is a form of grafting. All you need are some stocks on which to bud, a budding knife with a spatulate end to the handle, raffia or rubber ties for securing the bud in the stock and the rose buds that you want to grow.

Stocks can be purchased from specialist nurseries and take the form of seedlings of Rosa Canina, the dog rose, or Rosa Laxa. The latter has the benefit of seldom if ever suckering. Use a stock size of 5-8 mm. I last used D Stewart, Arreton Nurseries, Bashley, New Milton, Hants, but that was 20 years ago; you could also try Wisbech Plant Co., Lynn Rd, Wisbech, Cambs.

Stocks should be planted late in the year in rows with the stocks about 9 inches apart. Simply make a slit with a spade, slip in a stock, remove the spade and heel in the stock. It helps if the stocks are leaning slightly. Nothing more is done till May-July next year, when the sap will be moving in the stocks and in the roses off which you wish to take the buds. Plump buds can be seen in the leaf axils when the rose is just fading; sap is running if thorns snap off easily.

Scrape soil away from the base of the stock to expose the neck (between shoots & roots). Make a T-cut in the neck with the horizontal cut at the top; only cut the bark. Ease back both sides with the handle of the knife. Cut the chosen rose stem and cut down behind the bud from below slightly into the wood and out above the bud. Holding the leaf stalk (which stays on) carefully twist out the wood from behind. This should leave the pimple of the bud showing. Slip this bud into the T-cut, trim off any excess and bind with raffia above and below the bud. This will need to be loosened later as the bud takes and swells. A rubber tie avoids this.

The next January cu: off the top of the stock as far above the bud as possible. The bud, if taken, will grow out. Do not allow it to flower at first, but cut back the new shoot to encourage stronger growth from below. Tie shoots to canes in windy areas. Transplant to permanent situation in the Autumn. Cut off snag above bud and tidy any damaged roots.

This procedure is not easy to describe, so I shall be happy to give a more practical demonstration to anyone that is interested.

Standard budding is different and will be covered at a later date, as will growing from cuttings and seeds.

SIBFORD VILLAGE HALL AGM

The AGM of the Sibford Village Hall was held on 27th April; about 20 villagers attended. The Minutes of the previous AGM on 28th April 1990 were approved.

The Treasurer's Report revealed an operating deficit for 1990/91 of just over 1,000. Commenting on this, the Treasurer said that the Sibfords had a clean, well maintained village hall but most of the costs were fixed, as was the level of income from the village organisations who regularly use the hall. More support was needed from the whole community to reduce the continuing deficit, and hence preserve this amenity.

The Chairman then thanked the members of the Committee for their support during the year. In response to a question about the Appeal Fund, he explained that its primary purpose was to provide for major improvements to the Village Hall, such as the current rewiring programme. Under the terms of the Appeal, it was not really intended to subsidise the day to day running costs, hence the need for more support so that the hall could break even.

Colonel Frith was re-elected as Chairman, with Mrs Vivienne Scouse as Secretary and Commander Baseby as Treasurer; Mrs Jane Holliday was co-opted as the Booking Secretary.

The meeting concluded with a presentation from the Chairman and Committee to Miss Biddy Bennett as a token of their appreciation and thanks for her many years service on the Committee, on her standing down as Booking Secretary.

BIDDY REPLIES

In her letter of thanks, sent through the Sibford Scene, Biddy was most grateful for the book, "Getting Together" by Sir John Harvey Jones which marked her long years on the Village Hall Committee. She certainly didn't think of herself as "retired" and would continue to be available to offer advice and the benefit of her experience whenever the Committee thought it would be useful.

There were many criticisms but as most of these are the responsibility of the Editor, they are not for publication!! (Shame!) but he's working on them.


Conclusion - steady improvement: - Could do better!
