

NATURE NOTES

May 21st - Found a group of three eggs, probably bullfinch's, lying together on the ground five yards from the nearest bushes. Only one of them was broken. How they got there I don't know, unless human hands were involved.

May 28th - The second flycatcher has now joined the one that has been here for the last eight days. They were both here by May 19th last year when the weather

was warmer and there were more flies about.

June 11th - Saw a nice selection of wild flowers at the edge of a cornfield today including pennycress, wild mignonette and a good patch of field madder.

June 13th - While we were watching a mistle thrush feeding two young ones on the lawn, two long-tailed tits flew into the rose bush above them. We seldom see

long-tailed tits in the garden.

June 15th - A spotted woodpecker was working its way up the electricity pole in Mannings Close this morning. It found something, probably a spider, when it got to the insulators and carried it off to feed the young one that has been following the old bird round recently. We went to Traitor's Ford this afternoon. While I was catching a bullhead for our grandchildren to see, my wife saw two mink. Mink are multiplying at an alarming rate and their import would prove to be an ecological disaster. I have heard that they are taking nearly all the eggs of water birds on some rivers.

June 19th - There is now a good variety of mushrooms and toadstools around.


We found three field mushrooms this evening.

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
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The Friends' School.

ECOLOGICAL PLANTATION

I understand that interest has been expressed regarding the newly constructed "farm road" across the paddock situated next to Temple Close. Well may I first welcome the interest and second deprecate the fact that it was not addressed directly to us.

However let me try to amend the situation through this "open letter". In co-operation with the Oxfordshire Environmental Office Vera and I are creating an "Ecological Plantation" on the old paddock land adjoining Temple Close and Buttslade. It would involve the planting of hedges and a selection of trees ranging from beech and oak to wild cherry, wild pear, purging buckthorn and dog wood. In addition wild flowers, already being germinated in the greenhouse, will grow freely throughout and we hope that this venture will create a further village amenity.

You may know that our gardens are open to the village from time to time and in fact at any time, by arrangement, and if anyone would particularly like to see our plans for the plantation please do not hesitate to call us and see for yourselves. In the meantime there is much need for preparation of the land and this will require farm and horticultural implements to be transported to and from the site which explains the need for the farm road.

We hope that you will bear with us while this work is being done and like ourselves look forward to the prospect of an improved village environment.

GARDENING NOTES



More Darling Rose Buds of May

As promised last month, I will now give advice on making Standard Roses. In the Autumn, take a spade, secateurs and a strong pair of gloves and search the hedgerows for strong, straight Dog Rose stems on their own roots. Alternatively, buy Rosa Rugosa stems from one of the addresses given last month. Plant either in a nursery bed or where they will eventually be required. In the case of the Dog Rose, cut off the top to the required height in January. It is in the resulting side-shoots that the buds are inserted in June/July, preferably in three of these shoots and facing upwards. For Rosa Rugosa, the buds are inserted in the main stem. Care will be needed to see that wind does not blow out any new shoots as they lengthen. As with bush types, cut off the wild growth in the next January. Suckers can be a problem, from the main stem on Rugosa and below ground as well on Dog Roses. Remove all suckers as soon as they are seen. Do not forget secure staking, which will also be needed in the nursery bed.

Moving away from Standards and seeking to avoid suckers, try growing roses from cuttings. They will, of course, be on their own roots but will take longer to establish because of this. Cuttings are usually taken around October. Take well ripened wood of the current year's growth and prepare these to about nine inches long, cutting straight below a bud at the bottom end and at an angle above a bud at the top end. Using a site sheltered from North and East winds, dig a trench, place a generous amount of sharp sand in the bottom, place your cuttings about two-thirds covered and firm in well. Re-firm if lifted by subsequent frosts. Move to a permanent site no sooner than the next Autumn or later if growth is weak.

Roses can be grown from seed but as the seed coat is very hard they need to be stratified. Place the seed in a tray of sandy compost ensuring that they are well covered and also protected from mice and birds. Put the tray in a north facing spot where it will be well frozen from time to time. In early Spring bring into the warm and wait for results. Rugosa rose hedges are very easy this way.

Success with this may tempt you to attempt your own hybridizing - but that is another and lengthy story. Roger Powell
