#### SIBFORD GOWER ENDOWED PRIMARY SCHOOL

All 7 and 8 year olds at our school are given the opportunity to spend 3 nights at Hill End, just outside Oxford. Here the children pond-dip, walk, feed lambs and generally enjoy and make full use of the acres of beautiful countryside available to Often it is the first time the children have stayed away from home and it can be a bit of a wrench for some to wave goodbye to mum or dad on the first day. Homesickness is soon forgotten and excitement takes over. It's hard work for the teachers, but Mums rally round and help with cooking meals, activities and tucking children up in bed. Despite the hard work, I'm sure children, staff and parents all agree that it's well worth the effort. vear our visit is in the middle of June, and preparations are well under-way.

By the time the children reach 10 and 11 years they are ready for a more challenging residential course, and Kilvrough Manor on the Gower Peninsular in Wales certainly provides that! The children have just returned from this year's trip, and as usual, are full of exciting stories. Activities include rock-climbing, abseiling, canoeing, caving, gorge-walking, swimming and bowling. In my experience, this is usually done in the cold, rain and wind! Although these activities are fairly demanding, they are nothing compared to the challenges of living together, sharing, helping each other and organising themselves to be in the right place at the right time, dressed suitably for the occasion. It is an invaluable experience, which lives on in many children's memory for years.



### Nature Notes



May 23rd, I heard a female Cuckoo give its bubbling call in our garden this morning. I am not sure that it is true that they only bubble after laying an egg, although there could well be a nest in that area,

May 25th, It is nice to hear that a Great Crested Grebe was seen on Lamb's Pool this morning,

June 2nd, I was asked today whether I could suggest a way to keep a Little Owl away from a nest box. It comes in daytime and clings to the nestbox while trying to extract the young Blue-Tits.

June 12th, I did not hear a Quail last summer but one has been calling in the parish for the last few days.

June 16th, Had an interesting walk on the Quantock Hills in Somerset, where we are staying for a few days. We disturbed an Adder that was sunning itself on the path, and it hissed at us for a moment before crossing the path to give us the best view of an Adder that I have had. On this fairly acid soil, where the N.T. has been cutting down the Rhododendrons to try to stop them taking over, we found Heath Bedstraw, Cow Wheat, Sand Spurrey and in damper parts,

Flowers

Lesser Spearwort, Yellow Pimpernel and Bog Pimpernel. Also on the hedge banks we have seen the Romping Fumitory that we have sought, in vain, in spots where it used to grow near Sibford. We also saw some Ravens, a Buzzard and several Whinchats.

June 17th. As we walked through an oak wood where the versatile Cow Wheat bloomed in profusion, we stopped to watch a pair of Pied Flycatchers carrying food to their nest-hole in a tree. Near the sea we found Bristly Oxtongue and a lovely area of Pale Flax.

June 18th, In a warm sunny valley on the Quantocks we came across a family of Stonechats flitting about on the bushes and bracken and higher up the valley some Whinchats which seem to prefer the higher ground. As well as the Small Heath butterflies, which we seem to see wherever we go, there were two Green Hairstreaks which we have not seen before,

June 19th, We varied our homeward route to visit the coast to look for the yellow Horned Poppy, We found some plants which already had green seed pods more than ten inches long, as well as their beautiful flower which opens by throwing off a cap in the same way as the Eschscholtzia.

So there you are, you unbelievers. It's true. Mozart has visited the Manor House.


A splendid evening of music and lovely ballads performed in a unique setting by the kind co-operation of Mike and Katharine, two truly generous and welcoming hosts.

For the first time for many years, the church in Sibford decided, under the inspirational ideas of Robin Spicer, to hold a Festival Weekend over the Spring Holiday period.

Various people, male & female, decorated the church - itself not an easy task, since there are few handy ledges or alcoves in our Victorian building - with a profusion of flowers of nearly every colour. We thank especially those who donated their flowers, thereby enabling the final profit to be that much higher.

Organists, young & slightly older. played for most of the Saturday opening, taped organ music was otherwise available, and the Hook Norton Silver Band ended its with sterling a involvement rendering of some nine well-loved hymns on the Sunday evening. They had earlier tried to play outside. but the flashing behaviour of the sky, which led to some deposit of rain upon the parched surface of Sibford, had driven them indoors - trombones & cornets prefer to gain merely internal dampness from the players' efforts!

Much food provision took place within the Village Hall - and some villagers enjoyed ploughman's lunches and/or cream teas over the entire weekend! Our thanks, of course, to those who prepared and to those who served the food - and sometimes they were the same people,

The Bank Holiday morning provided eager bargain-hunters with the chance to examine car boots of different shapes & sizes - although the experience of having your boot thoroughly inspected before you have turned the engine off was a new sensation for several first-time boot-owners!

The Monday afternoon was filled with the sound of merry-making as bells rang, skittles flew and tills tinkled - and some skin burned as well! Bottles were won in abundance and fruit machines whirred - even human ones! Dutch sliding games, white elephants and plants were also featured.

Lots of people came - one flower lady, passing through from Durham, said the arrangers had done well (although we knew that) - and some came more than once,

As I said before, Robin Spicer had the original idea and all credit is due to him for the overall planning in the church. The fete was in the hands of Erica Wimbush and the catering was principally the labour of Gillian Soden & Anne Spicer with lots of help, not least from Phyllis Webb.


Additionally, the Katherine House Hospice stall raised some £215 and Helen Soden's Calcutta Rescue stall/boot raised about £161,

'From the lone Shieling'

My high regard for they(?) who pen 'Nature Notes' has been raised even higher.

I write from a remote corner of the land - Inch-na-Damph, Assynt - from where some *Nature Notes* sprang last year. But I'm blowed if I can see the same abundance or variety of flora & fauna.

I have seen a pine marten; no problem there. It stood stock-still unsure of the large smelly thing, ten yards away and silently munching (raisins & Cracker Barrel, a great respite for we nature watchers, especially those with aching legs & incandescent feet) so I had plenty of time to observe before it brown-furry-flurried into a culvert.

I saw a Golden Eagle and there are some who would give their last square of black chocolate for the chance. Mind you, what I actually saw was an out-of-focus smidge in the telescope of two friendly ornithologists who assured me I was looking at the King (or the Queen? I forgot to ask) of the Scottish skies. I have also seen other birds: lots of them: so there.

I can report that some were quite big, but the others were small. Also (as people increasingly say) some were flying & some weren't; the latter possibly a wingless sub-species of pine marten? ....or more likely some rather energetic heather. I dunno.

What I  $\underline{do}$  know is that if I was shamed by the monthly erudition, I am now utterly abashed that in one brief visit here *Nature Notes* reported more wildlife than I've observed in years of visits. So ....

This winter the books & binocs come out. The studying starts. Crisp air to sharpen the focus: green politics to sharpen the will. Perhaps even a nature correspondence in the Scene? Watch this (lesser crested) space?

On the other hand is there anyone out there looking for a purely platonic relationship, to share a mutual interest in the dynamic metamorphism of Durness limestone in the region of the Moine thrust plane....?

Grounds Farm Sibford Ferris

Dear Sir,

With the better weather upon us, a brief reminder about the use of footpaths and bridleways is perhaps in order. Land owners are now, more than ever before, way-marking and keeping clear the footpaths and bridleways in the area. This should be a great help to all who enjoy to walk or ride in the countryside.

Unfortunately, along with these improvements in access, there seems to be an increasing disregard of these very paths. As landowners with both footpaths and bridleways crossing our land we have seen horses riding on ground where no bridleways go, horses on footpaths and, most worrying, many horses and riders with dogs running loose around them, even among livestock!

The problem of dogs does not apply only to horse riders. One person walking a dog among our sheep was found, when asked to put the dog on a lead, not to have a lead with them. Saying "My dog never worries sheep" is not good enough. The countryside code tells us that all dogs should be kept on a lead in livestock. This should always be the case, and farmer's land and crops should be respected as such, even where the crop is grass.


