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Nature Notes



June 24th. When we visited a local wild flower site we were greeted by the cooing of the only turtle dove that we have heard this year. We saw common Spotted Orchids, incuding one pure white one, Pyramidal Orchids and Clustered Bell flowers in bloom and Ringlet, Marbled White and a male Common Blue butterfly on the wing.

June 29th. We have not seen a Nuthatch in the parish for several years but early this morning I saw two of them and a Tree Creeper on the sunny side of our Cedar tree. A good variety of Damsel and Dragonflies have visited, or perhaps hatched from, our our garden pond this year. We saw two Broadbodied Libellula yesterday and a Four Spotted Libellula was

laying eggs in the pond today.

July 2nd. I have always thought of Sand Dunes as a habitat for a very limited range of plants but here on the Gower in South Wales, where we are staying for a few days, they are veritable wild flower gardens. We have a long list of plants that we managed to name which includes Evening Primrose, Sheepsbit Scabious, Pyramidal Orchid, Restharrow, Bloody Cranesbill, Sea Bindweed, Sea Holly, Hoary Stock, Thyme, Eyebright, Common Centuary, Carline Thistle, Yellow-wort, Kidney Vetch, Common Storksbill, Everlasting Pea and on the rocks & cliffs, Sea Lavender, Rock Samphire, Yellow Samphire, Rockrose and Fleabane. We also saw an old Elm tree that is still apparently healthy. It leans out over the sea-washed rocks at Oxwitch so it may be that the salt air kept the disease-carrying beetles away.

July 14th. I have measured two and a half inches of rain here in the last two weeks, while at Sezincote near Moreton-in-Marsh my brother has measured four and a half inches.

July 15th. Saw a Humming Bird Hawk Moth in our garden today and I have heard of another probable sighting.

Aug. 11th. I looked at two wooden field gates, no more than half a mile apart, that were struck by lightning in last Sunday nights storm. One had a piece split off the falling post and a split top rail at the head end but no charring. The other was a more spectacular strike which had set the hanging post on fire and completely burned away the gate heel leaving only the ironwork.

Dear Sandra has laboured long on our quaint printing presses and the whole village sends her hearty thanks and best wishes for much happiness in her new home.



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

WESTWARD HO! WITH SIBFORD PLANT HUNTERS

Inspired by Mr Walker's slides and to commemorate the 1492 voyage of Admiral Columbus, 30 intrepid Sibford Horti Society members chose July 4th to venture westward in search of wondrous gardens & rare plants. Our expedition took us into distant lands, far beyond the Warwickshire border, even beyond the legendary Avon, nigh unto the city famed for its apples, its beautiful china and its strange & piquant sauce.

Our captain, a Tysoe flatlander confused by the mountainous Sibford terrain, set off due South. With great aplomb, 'Jolly Roger' Powell strode to the bridge and quietly provided course corrections, and within a few miles we were on our intended heading - Westward Ho!

After travelling across many miles of fertile farmland, past orchards laden with fruit and through hamlets with strange & even coarsesounding names, we finally reached our first goal - Spetchley Park, the second home of the Berkeleys.


We alighted with some trepidation, this being our first meeting with a genuine Berk, whose family name has oft been taken in vain. We need not have worried - we were greeted warmly and provided with refreshment & delicious homemade cake.

We then set off to explore the 30 acres of gardens, borders, rose beds, copses of trees & shrubs, and the lake & vast lawns with their magnificent views of the imposing Georgian mansion.

One group, who ventured down the West Border, profited from the expertise of Jolly Roger, who appears to be on first (& second) name terms with nearly every plant

in the universe.

A second group was led down the (East) garden path by Barry, who confidently used his golf umbrella to point out the subtle differences between grass & gravel. When he admitted that this was the full extent of his botanical knowledge in a nutshell, he didn't know his artemesia from his eleagnus - we wandered off, to search for the



peacock, whose shrill call could be heard throughout the Park. A magnificent bird, whose shimmering colours rivalled those of the flower & rose borders.

After lunch we dispersed again, to revisit our favourite corners of the Park. Roger returned with pockets stuffed with seeds of the pomegranate tree (watch out for next year's Sibford garden sales!).

The Spetchley guide book claims it is 'a garden for all seasons'; one could add that it is also 'a garden for all men', since most of us found something new & exciting to tuck into our memory banks, and to draw us back another year.

There could hardly be a greater contrast to the vast Spetchley Park, which has developed since Tudor times, than our second goal, Stone House Cottage Garden, which has been developed, just since 1974, from a derelict kitchen garden of less than an acre,

It is now a haven for many rare: & tender trees, shrubs & plants, skillfully cosetted in 'rooms' formed by hedges of yew, box &

prunus, and enclosed within a 9ft brick wall, with three 20ft brick towers with iron windows & balconies, all built by the owner since 1980. Again, a garden to be revisited another year, with the bonus of a nursery - the owner even provided wheelbarrow service to our vehicle for the many rare plants purchased by Mr You-Know-Who!

On our journey home we stopped for tea - unaware that we were in an area inhabited by sheep-shearers who had run out of sheep to fleece, However, it was still a very enjoyable day and many thanks are due to Sheila Baseby for all her hard work in organising every detail of our 1992 expedition,
