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
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Nature Notes



Aug. 20th. I was interested to hear that a Roe Deer as well as two Muntjac were seen in a harvest field in Sibford Ferris today.

 $Aug.\ 25th.$ The Wheatear that I saw on some ploughed land today was probably making an early return to winter in Africa. It was the only one that I have seen in Sibford this year.

Sept. 8th. Watched two Nuthatches in the garden. They are probably the same ones that I saw in June, as I have heard them on several occasions in the intervening period, so I hope they are going to stay in the area. They seem to walk down the

tree trunk just as easily as they walk up it.

Sept. 9th. The feeding habits of the Elephant Hawk Moth caterpillar that I spotted feeding on Willowherb are very interesting. Starting at the edge of the leaf it rapidly chewed its way across the leaf to the midrib then extended its neck to reach the next swath. After a few swaths the extended neck did look rather like an elephant's trunk. I suppose this method of feeding saves it having to move its huge body so often.





Sept. 12th. A Marsh Tit and a Goldcrest were among the numerous birds that we saw while having breakfast this morning.

Sept. 18th. It is some years since we have had such difficult harvest weather. I saw a crop of Wheat recently that had buckled down like over-ripe Barley, leaving the ears very close to the ground. It will take some exceptionally good weather to dry crops like that now that the days are so short. The quality of most of the Wheat is well below that normally required by flour millers but the rise in the price of imported Wheat that will follow the devaluation of the pound could make them lower their sights a bit.

All the layout details are finalized when the material from the CF-2 discs is assembled on my AMSTRAD prior to printing out the final version for subsequent 'cutting & pasting'.

If you have access to an AMSTRAD but don't use LocoScript - don't let that deter you; as long as you can type with one finger (like me), I can show you, in 10 minutes, all you need to know to become a valuable asset to the *Scene*.

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
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
BEHIND THE 'SCENES'

News and Information



A competition for an Autumnal Basket arrangement of flowers (8" max) will take place.





SUCCESS AT SIBFORD

The new City and Guilds Diploma of Vocational Education has been successfully piloted in the Sixth Form at Sibford School. During the last year students have been introduced to the world of work and developed vocational skills, and are among the first in the country to be offered places at polytechnics on the strength of their achievements at Diploma level.

Sibford's excellent training facilities have doubtless contributed to this. Students work in the school's walled garden, conservation area and the two shops, and help out at a Day Care Scheme for elderly people run by the local community. During 1993 they will also be working in the new Business Centre which will be opened in the New Year.

The national press has recently made specific commendation of Sibford's work, notably in the Financial Times and the Times Educational Supplement. A Polish television crew will shortly be filming the Sixth Form at work, and other educational establishments have been very interested in what Sibford has to offer. Visitors have included representatives from schools or colleges - both locally and nationally. Gill Manthorpe, Head of Sixth Form, has even been running training sessions for other staff in Boston, USA!

The new academic year for Sibford's Sixth Form has started with an "Understanding Industry" course, lasting for three days. Many local businesses, industrialists and managers have visited the school to give a lively and expert overview of industry and business. Gill Manthorpe, comments: "Without our local business contacts our course would not be as rich or as effective; we are very grateful for their time and contribution to our "Understanding Industry" course, and also for their provision of work experience placements during the year".

The students receive a certificate at the end of their "Understanding Industry" course. John Bridgeman (Managing Director of Alcan International) presented these to students in the School's Drama Studio in the Summer.

From next week students will start in earnest another challenging year on the Diploma of Vocational Education. The School will continue to lead the way by offering a course that combines vocational and academic study so successfully.

If it is decided to provide tokens they would be available in the new financial year beginning in April 1993.

Grants were made to The Theatre, Chipping Norton and towards the cost of producing The Sibford Scene.

The problem of the state of the village water supply was discussed and the Council was shown a sample taken recently by a local resident. It is hoped that the Supply Manager for Thames Water will be able to attend the next Parish Council Meeting when affected residents could put their complaints directly to him. No. The service is confidential so you will not be asked your name. If you're enquiring about services available locally, you will be asked the area where you live and your GP practice.


Will Health Info Line give me medical advice?

No. The service offers health information, not medical advice or diagnosis. The staff are information specialists, not doctors or nurses.

What kind of information is being offered? A wide range including:-

- details of local services eg. GP's, hospitals, clinics, etc.

- how to cope with specific illnesses and conditions
- how to take care of yourself and your family
- details of local self-help groups and voluntary organisations.

ORGANISTS!

An extract from an article by Robert Munns

Organists are a superb breed. They come in all shapes and sizes. Perhaps the most exotic are those who move and work in the rarified environs of royal chapels and magnificent cathedrals. They seem to be members of a race apart, and can be briefly seen gliding, hunched-shouldered and silent, down endless cloisters or up winding staircases animated - and how - only when sitting at the console.

Then there is the show business organist. To him performance is a highly developed art. Legs, arms, hair, all fly windmill-like in a positive flurry of activity. He is always a consummate artist to his fingertips. Such players tend to pounce on their instruments; cat-like claws flash out to withdraw stops, music is turned over in a positive tornado of panache and action. The whole effect is most impressive. At the other end of the scale are the modest, nervous organists, usually to be found in country churches, sitting at the console only because noone else is capable of, or prepared to, have a go. They probably learned the piano as children and have adapted as best they can to the more demanding requirements of the organ. The extent of their repertoire, which nevertheless by everlasting practice they ensure is of a high standard, is around the Handel's Largo mark. They cope manfully with the hymns, though they often get lost in the psalm pointing.

Last, but bu no means least, there is that disappearing species much prevalent in little country churches when I was a child, the copiously feathered and possessive elderly lady organist. This breed terrifies the small congregation with their firm and heavy tread, their jutting chins and the display movements of the plumage usually adorning their extravagant headgear.

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
Their playing is frequently of the organo pleno style, noise rather than accuracy being the watchword. They guard their organs as possibly they might their jewellery. The key is secreted who knows where, and should any prospective organ student have the temerity to approach their instruments, he is met with baleful looks and aggressive gestures. The net result of this is that when the organist is not available to officiate at her duties, either because old age has rendered her incapable or because she has had a difference of opinion with the vicar/churchwardens/deaf old man who sings too tunelessly and lustily in the front row of the congregation/opinionated chorister who insists that the hymn speeds are all wrong, when she can no longer assert and enact her role of fear and wrath on this weekly religious platform, no fledgling organist exists to take over the organ seat.

How many country churches and chapels or establishments, I wonder, have been the victims of such so-called musical personages?
