After a long wait, at 4.15 p.m. approximately (just as the light was beginning to disappear...) the "amateur" jockeys mounted their steeds and made their way from the famous paddock to the even more famous racecourse at Cheltenham.

The Forty at 40 Stakes was about to be run with goggles pulled down and upon the wave of the Starter's flag, we were off! And the first away was Parlet, my trusty mare from Devon, and me - off into the gloom. For a few glorious seconds we were in front (I don't think anyone knew that at the time because the commentator could not see us, never mind distinguish the silks of my grandfather (grey with a red cross and gold cap) - everyone just has to take my word for it...). However, with much mud flying we were passed and Parlet ran as well as she could in the "heavy going". For one mile and a half we galloped, and we rode a good finish and passed the winning post in 7th position (out of the 11 runners). Those in front consisted of a "grade one" racehorse, which won the crystal vase, then Peter Scudamore, Jonjo O'Neill, an ex jockey, a stock broker who is also a proper amateur jockey, a horse from David Nicholson's yard, and so on - so all in all the little mare did very well considering the competition! However, with Cheltenham mud sprinkled all over my face and a Cheshire cat grin, I returned to the hallowed ground of the Jockeys Changing Rooms to put away my kit to step outside, into the spotlit darkness, as myself again. With an extremely deep and happy sigh, I knew that I had done it! Ridden in a race at Cheltenham and the memories of this will stay with me for, well - at least another 40 years!

I was thrilled and delighted by everyone's generosity and willingness to sponsor me! The Spastics Society anticipated that all the jockeys would raise £10,000 for their work with people with Cerebral Palsy. Hopefully they may receive more - and at the last count, the pledges and donations from you all, including some corporate support, totalled well over £3,000! Oct. 20th. A Heron was seen recently standing by a puddle on the farm road. It flew away as the car approached but was back again by the time it returned. I can't believe that it has been wet so long that fish are breeding in the puddles.

Oct. 26th. A flock of Redwings, with perhaps some Fieldfares, which I estimated at over 300 birds, flew down the valley between the villages this morning. Perhaps the cool weather has made them move south slightly earlier than usual.

Oct. 29th. A Nuthatch came to some fat that I had hung up for the Tits. Only once before, about 10 years ago, have we seen one at the birdtable.

Nov. 10th. Now that we have put out nuts and sunflower seed for the birds, two Nuthatches are coming fairly regularly.


Nov. 14th. Scolding noises from the Mistle Thrushes drew my attention to a flock of Redwings, which in spite of the efforts of the Mistle Thrushes to keep them off, were managing to get some of the berries from our Yew tree.

Nov. 15th. The report by the World Meteorological Organisation that the Ozone layer, which protects the Earth from the lethal Ultra Violet rays, is thinning at an ever increasing rate, is very worrying. I hope that some good comes of the meeting in Copenhagen this week to discuss the future of the agreement to phase out the use of CFC's etc that are causing the trouble. There seems to be a lack of true commitment to the agreement by some countries. I am hopeful that the change of President will bring a different attitude to the problems of global pollution from the USA. A lead from that quarter would be a great help.


At the present time the Beaver Colony is a small group, ten in total, and only one of the boys comes from Sibford itself.

NEW, TENTATIVE HANDS AT THE HELM

Our village(s) has more than its rightful compliment of Captains of Industry and Air Liners - Marshalls of Education - Commanders of Banks and Financial Institutions - Major Farmers and Church Pillars - careers which provide fulfilment as well as helping to pay the school fees. But what of our next generation? What of them? The press devotes forests of newsprint to delinquents and their activities but such young people are very much in the minority. The Sibfords abound with wonderful, wonderful youths - so many in fact that there is no room to give justice of space to all. We select but two purely as representative of all such young citizens today.

Mathew Abbott left school a year ago and decided, like so many sensible eighteen-year-olds, to see for himself a world reported as quite different from the affluence of North Oxford. He travelled in Nepal and North India feeding his appetite for wonder and beauty. Then he arrived in Calcutta and both his experience and his concern for others changed direction. So alarmed was he that human beings could be allowed to live in such appalling conditions with little food and - far worse - no hope and quite destitute of love that he joined a voluntary organisation called "Calcutta Rescue" working in a street clinic that gave help through concern to over 300 patients a day. The experience will remain with Mathew for the rest of his life. He is at university now but one day the Scene hopes to persuade him to write for us an article regarding what he saw and how it effected his feelings for others.

Our second pen sketch concerns Cadet Petty Officer Peter Mulley of the Banbury Sea Cadets - T.S. Harvester Unit. Each year four young men are selected, one each from ATC, ACF, CCF, and Peter's unit, SCC, as "Lord Lieutenant Cadets" to parade with Oxfordshire's Lord Lieutenant, Sir Ashley Ponsonby, when he meets royal visitors to the county. It is obviously a great privilege to have one's name put forward but to be selected is an honour supreme and that is exactly what happened to Peter after parading before a selction board consisting of three fearsome serving officers. On October 26th Peter attended the investiture at Oxford and was awarded his badge of office by the Lord Biedtenant himself. This is one of the highest awards in the Sea Cadet Corps. Peter must feel a certain satisfaction that all his efforts have been thus rewarded but, we his fellow villagers, are proud of his achievement - Well done!

Let's hope Her Majesty sees fit to "nip over to these 'ere parts" while Peter holds his office. After which we shall expect an article for the Scene.

Sibford Gower Parish Council

The following letter was received from COTSWOLD COUNTRY SERVICE.

You may be aware that a substantial part of Oxfordshire now lies within an area designated as the Cotswold Area of Outstanding Beauty following an extension by the Secretary of State for the Environment last year.

This designation not only denotes the area as one of particular value and sensitivity, for which special policies are embodied in Structure and Local Plans, but also attracts special funding by the Countryside Commission and 20 Local Authorities constituent to the area.

The Cotswold Country Service sets out to promote better management of the AONB and in doing so promotes the Cotswold Warden Service, a voluntary group which last year performed over 30.000 hours of work in the countryside. Its activities range from patrol and maintenance of rights of ways to undertaking conservation work; a programme of Guided Walks is devised and widely advertised, providing over 200 walks each year and the Service undertakes countryside promotions and interpretation to the public.

In order to provide an equitable spread of our resources, we need to expand the work of the Warden Service in Oxfordshire. At present there is a small core of volunteers living near the Gloucestershire border and they undertake some work in Oxfordshire. We also bring volunteers from Gloucestershire to undertake special work projects on footpaths in association with Oxfordshire County Council. However, we wish to increase the number of volunteers in Oxfordshire to around 40, in due course, and intend to use various means to attract new members. Experience shows that there is a large number of persons of all age groups interested in promoting and protecting the countryside and who are prepared to give time and energy on a voluntary basis. In parts of Gloucestershire and Avon, for example, we have to set limits on numbers recruited, given high interest. The Service provides training, tools and equipment and pays expenses.

If anyone in the village has, or would like to have, an interest and involvement with the type of work undertaken, please contact the Clerk, Petra Berry (462) and she can put you in touch with a full-time Ranger attached to the Countryside Service.

At our meeting held on 3rd November, Mr. Houchin, Water Supply Manager from Thames Water, came to discuss the complaints of a number of residents in the partsh about the standard of their water supply. He did acknowledge that a sample shown to him at the meeting was not acceptable and promised to investigate both individual complaints and the situation generally. However the really important thing is that attention to parishes is given simply on the basis of number of complaints received. This means that those who shout the loudest are likely to get help rather than consideration being given to the seriousness of the problem. Whilst this seems an odd way of doing things we need to be aware of how Thames Water works and to conform to their system.

DO REMEMBER THEREFORE THAT YOU SHOULD PHONE THAMES WATER ON 0345 200800 WHENEVER YOU HAVE A COMPLAINT NO MATTER HOW TRIVIAL OR SHORT LIVED IT MIGHT BE.

By doing this you will help our parish to improve their position in a queue covering a vast area.

Since the inception, in April, of the Day Centre at Sibford (Friends) School, the number of local elderly visitors who receive, between noon & 3.00pm on alternate Wednesdays, a cooked lunch, social activities and tea; has gradually increased from 5 to 12 and the number of local volunteers has increased from 7 to 15. During term-time a lot of the chores (eg. fetching meals from the cafeteria, setting tables, serving, escorting visitors by mini-bus & car, taking meals out) is undertaken by an enthusiastic group of senior students, under the supervision of their harassed Head of Sixth Form, Gill Manthorpe. The local volunteers attend on a rota basis, assisting where necessary. Everyone joins in the lunch & participates in the social activities.

During the long Summer break the Day Centre was operated by the volunteers, including the preparation of home-cooked lunches; there were a few hair-raising moments but the ladies (with some assistance from the men) coped magnificently, their culinary results being greatly appreciated by the visitors.

As for the future, on 16 December the volunteers will provide a home-cooked Christmas Lunch; the aroma of hot mince-pies may well persuade Santa Claus to drop in. A lunch-time knees-up at a local hostelry is being planned for 30 December, as is a visit to the Pantomime on 13 January.

It is anticipated that after January the Day Centre will meet weekly rather than fortnightly. We hope that a few new volunteers will now come forward so that each volunteer need attend only once per month on average. 




