Nature Notes



December 18th. While walking home this evening I was surprised to hear the "wang-wang" of a Swan's wings as it flew over in near darkness.

December 24th. My old bird book says that Blackcaps migrate to the Mediterranean area to spend the winter, but in recent years some have wintered in southern England. On this cold morning I saw a male Blackcap feeding on an apple that is still hanging from the tree outside our kitchen window.

January 4th. I measured a total of 31.40 inches of rain in 1992 with almost 19 inches of that falling in the second half of the year. February was, as it often is, the driest month with 0.84 of an inch and July the wettest with 4.47 inches.

January 12th. One of the Nuthatches that frequent our garden ventured onto the window-ledge today. They react strongly, becoming quite noisy and agitated if they see a Cat.

January 14th. While we were watching the Blackcap, I presume that it was the same one that I saw in December, a group of Long-Tailed Tits made their way through our garden ignoring the bird table where other Tits were feeding. The only time that I have seen Long-Tailed Tits feed on a bird table was during a cold winter about 50 years ago, when they came to our table at Woolman Cottage on the Hook Norton road from the adjoining orchard which is now Cotswold Close.







SIBFORD FERRIS PARISH COUNCIL

There was a Council meeting on Tuesday 12th January when the following matters came up for discussion.

The Parish Precept for 1993/94 was set at £1895 and details leading to this decision will be given at the Annual General Meeting due to be held in April.

It was decided to enter into a BUS PASS SCHEME with Midland Red whereby retired people living in the Parish issued with a pass will be able to travel to Banbury at half fare. This scheme will be adopted for one year in the first instance and reviewed again when the full extent of the demand will be better known. Passes for those people who have already expressed an interest will be available as from 1st April.

A letter has been received from Mr. Houchin of Thames Water acknowledging the problems that some residents have been experiencing with dirty water. Necessary work of either transferring customers to an alternative main or replacing a new main altogether will begin shortly. Roof tanks are also going to be cleaned out where there has been a build up of deposits. This will all be done at Thames Water expense. This shows the benefit of tireless campaigning on the part of one or two people in the Parish to whom the Council are grateful.

The Clerk has details of various Carers Self Help Groups which exist in the Banbury area. If anyone would like a copy of this leaflet please contact 8393.
