BANBURY DISTRICT HOUSING COALITION

There are differing views about Coffee Mornings. Some see them as little better than what they see as another legalised form of blackmail, the sponsored whatever. Some support them reluctantly because they like the hosts, or because they like the cause for which the event is being held. Some actually enjoy them.

It seemed likely that everyone who attended the one held at Barn Close, Burdrop on 18th August came into the last category. Thanks to good weather, so cleverly arranged by the Friths and the cheerful generosity of those who came (and indeed of some who could not but kindly sent donations) and the labours of the helpers £137.65 was raised for the Coalition's project to provide guarantees to prospective landlords for deposits and rent in advance which homeless people are often unable to find.

NATURE NOTES

24 June. Big Dragonflies, probably Southern Aeshnas are now hatching from our pond. The nymphs seem to need a plant with leaves narrow enough for their legs to span, so they can clamp tightly enough to withstand the dragonfly's struggle to emerge. They were using the leaves of Water Soldiers today. After emerging, the dragonfly clings to the nymph case for about four hours while its wings slowly expand before it is ready to fly. The freshly hatched Dragonflies are not as brightly coloured as they eventually become.

25 June. When we got up this morning there was a Cat sitting on the window ledge nearest to the Flycatchers' nest in our Pyracantha. I think that it must have been there for some hours, keeping the birds away from the nest for when I looked into it, I found that the young ones had died, probably more from cold than lack of food.

26 June. Saw a Squirrel being harassed by two Magpies. The Squirrel hid in the Ivy that covers the trunk of the tree while the Magpies approached along separate branches. The Squirrel would make a dash first at one then the other, forcing them to give ground, each time returning to take cover in the Ivy. The Magpies soon decided that there was no future in this and flew away.

8 July. A Bumble Bees' nest in a retaining wall in our garden was raided by a Badger last night. Instead of trying to get to it through a crack in the wall, as the bees do, the Badger chose to dig down to it from the flower bed above.

12 July. Today I saw a cream-coloured House Sparrow in a flock that were eating food put out for poultry.

25 July. This morning I found a Wasps' nest about eight inches in diameter hanging in our Hornbeam hedge. Never having seen a nest in such a place before, I rang up an expert on insects who told me they are probably Norwegian wasps and that he had seen six similar nests this year.

26 July. This morning I picked up a female Horntail under our Cedar tree. Although harmless it looks fierce. A bit like a huge Wasp with a long ovipositor with which it had, I expect, been drilling holes in the Cedar to lay eggs.

4 Aug. In our lawn, which is looking quite colourful not having been cut for ten days, we counted thirty two different plants, excluding grasses. Not all of them were wild flowers as a few had seeded themselves from the garden.

BFORD FERRIS PARISH COUNCIL

* * *Pollution from Used Motor Oil* * *

Three items below which were discussed at the meeting of Council held on the 28th June may be of interest to members of the Parish.

Applications of the Grant Scheme for repairs to listed buildings have been received from Cherwell District Council and can be obtained from the Clerk (8393).

Wardshire County Council have informed us of a scheme to remind motorists to dispose of **USED MOTOR OIL** more carefully or face a fine of up to £20,000! The County Council's Cycling Officer says:

"People may not realise that just **ONE PINT OF USED OIL CAN POLLUTE 100,000 GALLONS OF DRINKING WATER.**"

The scheme is aimed at people, such as motorists who change their own oil, who may not know it is wrong - and illegal - to pour used oil down drains. The County Council has nine waste reception points with oil banks where used oil can be disposed of quite safely without any danger to the environment. The nearest for Sibford residents would be at Alkerton.

Cherwell District Council have taken a further look at the verges in Main Street and have decided that they cannot risk clearing right back to the wall because it is felt that this might further weaken the wall. They have agreed to spray the verges instead but so far this work is still outstanding.

BRILLIANT THE DINOSAUR

It is difficult to avoid dinosaurs this summer. Steven Spielberg's film "Jurassic Park" is playing to full houses with terrified parents clutching their sophisticated offspring. The BBC is screening a generous selection of less technically accomplished movies under the banner "Dinomania", but Sibford School provides living proof that the diplodochus is alive and well and roaming the Cotswolds, or, to be strictly accurate, the mythical seaside town of Clademouth. Among the many imaginative aspects of the show was the twelve page programme laid out like provincial newspaper - "Estuary Tidings" - and crammed with informative articles, advertisements and the colossal cast list.

The weather was perfect on Tuesday 6th July, the night I went to the first official performance, but I heard that such was the demand for tickets, that even the dress rehearsal was a sell out! As a charming preamble to the performance of Richard Stilgoe's witty and inventive show the audience was serenaded by Sibford Choral Society who, under their conductor Mark Paine, were on particularly good form in Matyas Seiber's Three Hungarian Folk Songs. After enjoying the singing, and some excellent strawberries and cream, we were ushered in to the darkened and crowded auditorium to meet some of the citizens of Clademouth.

The "children of the town" assembled, which took some time, as we are talking about a "cast of thousands". Richard Stilgoe, composer and conductor, took his place on the rostrum to generous applause, but instead of raising his baton, a tape of "Sailing By" and a worrying weather forecast emerged from the loudspeakers. As the show got underway, the audience immediately warmed to Kelly Wright, who was outstanding as the narrator, her excellent diction always perfectly audible (not, alas, true of all the principal characters, even though they had the benefit of radio microphones). Thanks to Kelly, the plot, concerning the Banks children's discovery of a friendly and intelligent diplodochus unearthed by a freak storm, was relatively easy to follow and the principal children, played on the night I was there by Rachel Davis, Jeremy Thomson and Adam Keeling, had a very good grasp of their roles and the stagecraft necessary to perform confidently.

The musical preparation was excellent and the production by Mark Paine and his team of helpers found ingenious solutions to most of the problems, not least the revelation of "Brilliant" himself, an enormous creature peopled by the tiniest to the tallest children in the school and village. The only way to turn him round at the end of the show was to remove his awesome head and searchlight eyes and transfer them to the rear end of his anatomy. Clever animals these dinosaurs - indeed, Brilliantly clever!

Richard Stilgoe kept a tight rein on his well-drilled orchestra, and was a model of clarity, giving every lead to his talented cast. The music was tuneful and memorable, with witty lyrics that deserved to be heard a little more clearly in some of the numbers. Sibford School is to be warmly congratulated for the energy, ingenuity and sheer hard work that went in to mounting such an ambitious project. The show was warmly received by a large and enthusiastic audience and I am sure the many participants greatly enjoyed the privilege of working with a top professional like Richard Stilgoe. Verdict: Absolutely Brilliant!

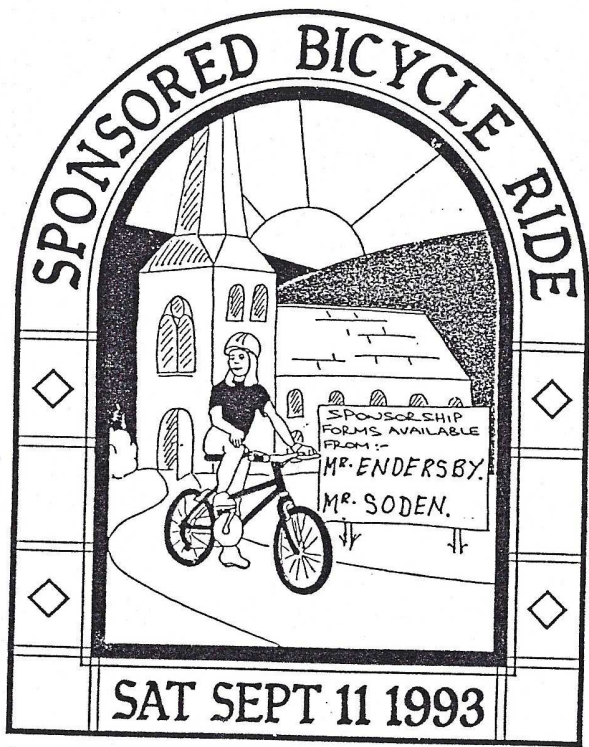



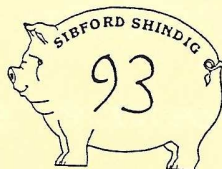
